Victoria Urges Ottawu To Action Because of United States Delay

Would Have Fraser River Run Completely Abandoned and That of North Encouraged Instead, It Is Intimated in Provincial Government Circles

VICTORIA, March 10:-As a result of further objection on the part of the United States Senate to ratify the treaty negotiated five years ago between Canada and the United States for preservation of the salmon fisheries of the Fraser River, British Columbia will urge upon Ottawa the complete abandonment of the salmon run on that river and the development of northern fisheries in place of it. This is intimated in government circles here.
