Northern Marine District Announced

Digby Island Marine Station at Last to be Center of Northern Waters; Appointments being made and Full Staff Here Soon.

(Special to The News via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)

VICTORIA, Dec. 29 .- It has been definitely announced here that the Prince Rupert marine district is to be separate from the Victoria district. This decision has just been reached by the Department of Marine and Fisheries at Ottawa and comes with a number of changes that have been adopted in the department. recently. The change will take effect on January 1.

Captain Saunders will continue in charge of the Digby Island marine depot which will be the actual headquarters for the new ed. district. W. L. Stanford, of Victoria, is to come as chief engineer and a full staff of officials is also to be selected to leave here for Prince Rupert at once.

The Development of The Great Northland.

During this month of December the Government proposed to summon to a conference at Ottawa from all quarters men who have an intimate knowledge of the far North. This conference is for the dual purpose of discussing the possibility of increasing the country's meat supply- and also the transportation problem in these difficult latitudes. The herds of musk-ox, buffalo, reindeer, caribou and other wild animals fit for food which roam in the vast uninhabited spaces of the northern interior it is proposed to make use of commercially on a much larger scale than is being done at present. With a world shortage of meats, and consequent high prices, the present should afford the best possible opportunity to make the development of these herds commercially successful. The one great drawback just now of course is transportation. The distance is too great and the country too, difficult to consider bringing the animals out on the hoof, and there are no railways.

Bank Clerks Want To Form a Union.

In Montreal, Toronto and other of the larger cities in eastern Canada there is just now a definite movement towards unionising the bank clerks. Hitherto such a course of action has been considered "not professional." But bank clerks, like many others, are finding that they cannot live in 1919 on a 1914 salary, with still less prospects of being able to do so in 1920. Besides, bank clerks was to get married when they want to, and not when the boss says so. But to certain of the financial executives the word "union" brings with it the possibility of a strike. And

what would happen if the bank clerks went out because they wanted domesticity and a raise in wages? The most important thing to the average man would be that no one could get a pay cheque cashed, although the serious thing would be that the business of the whole country would be tied up, and that if not settled quickly, there would be no pay cheques at all. In "the right to strike" bank clerks would hold a more formidable weapon with which to enforce their demands than any other union. But






