Northern Marine District Announced

Digby Island Marine Station at Last to be Center of Northern Waters; Appointments being made and Full Staff Here Soon.

VICTORIA, Dec. 29.—It has been definitely announced here that the Prince Rupert marine district is to be separate from the Victoria district.

Captain Saunders will continue in charge of the Digby Island marine depot which will be the actual headquarters for the new district.

The new district will include all the waters north of Egg Island in Queen Charlotte Sound.

This is one of the points that the Prince Rupert delegation which has been in Ottawa for some time has been striving to attain and their efforts have met with success.

FIXED WHEAT PRICE RAISED

Canadian Wheat Board Boosts Price of Grain in Storage; Will Permit Import of U. S. Product.

WINNIPEG, Dec. 29.—The Canadian Wheat Board has made the following important announcement: "The price of Manitoba No. 1 Northern wheat to mills in Canada is raised from \$2.30 per bushel to \$2.80.

In order that the consuming public may have the advantage of a supply of the cheaper flour in the United States, permits will be issued for the import of American products."

Bread to Increase.

OTTAWA, Dec. 29.—Reports received here from all over the country indicate that the price of bread will increase from two to three cents a loaf owing to the advance in the wheat and flour prices authorized by the Canadian Wheat Board.

Admiral Jellicoe's Report to be Made Before End of Year to Government.

FAVORS IDEA OF NAVY UNDER DOMINION CONTROL

OTTAWA, Dec. 29.—The recommendation of Admiral Jellicoe as to the naval policy best suited to the new world conditions as they affect Canada, is expected to be in the hands of the Government between now and the end of the year.

Sir Robert Borden was at the 1918 conference, when he cited Australia as an example of the successful working of such a navy in conjunction with the Imperial Navy.

FLATLY DENIES ANY DOLLY VARDEN DEAL

Head of Taylor Mining Co. Makes Plain That no Thought of Sale is Entertained.

A. J. T. Taylor, the president of the Taylor Mining Co., which owns the Dolly Varden Mine at Alice Arm, flatly denied the report that the Dolly Varden sold or that any deal was even pending, in Vancouver Friday last.

Since the completion of the railway this summer the mine has been shipping steadily and though the most of the ore has gone to the Anyox smelter, some quantities of extra high-grade rock have gone to Tacoma.

LOYD GEORGE DEFENDS AUSTRALIA'S VOTE

SEVERE CONGESTION OF TRAFFIC AT DOCKS IN GREAT BRITAIN

He entered the Chinese Cafe last evening and, evidently, soon got in some altercation with the attendants.

Many Deaths From Methylated Mixture

Police Arrest Five Men of Organization Peddling Poisonous Liquor. Over a Hundred dead and many Blinded.

(Special to The News via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)

NEW YORK, December 29.—Federal authorities have arrested five men whom they claim to be the heads of the organization responsible for the recent widespread sale of wood alcohol concoctions in five states.

Eighty-four persons have died during the past forty-eight hours and scores of others are suffering from paralysis and blindness due to drinking wood alcohol "whisky," according to reports received from nearly every city in the east and Chicago.

The toll taken by the poisonous liquor is highest in New England where sixty-five deaths are reported. In Chicopee, Mass., 34 men and two women are dead. In Springfield three men and one woman. Holyoke, nine men, and in Greenville, one man. In Hartford, thirteen who were reported poisoned have since died and in Thomsonville two men are dead.

BAD SLIDES IN BULKLEY CANYON

CORPORATION CONTROL BAD FOR PIONEER

Advocates Institution and Support of Free Miners' League.

PRINCE RUPERT IS GOOD CENTRE MINING OPERATIONS

A letter has been received at the Daily News office from W. W. Rush of Seattle, Wash., dealing with mining conditions in Northern British Columbia. The letter goes into the discussion at great length of the values of a Free Miners' League and the curse of corporation control. The corporations, Mr. Rush maintains, do much to hinder the development of the prospectors and keep them from their just due. They control railroads and smelters and thus tie the small man right up.

He suggests that a good strong Free Miners' League would have much power in breaking this corporation rule and could bring in facilities on a co-operative basis that it would be impossible to, otherwise, have. Such an organization, having behind it a large number of citizens, would also demand government recognition.

The development of the mineral wealth of the province and especially of Northern B. C. would also be much stimulated by the establishment of an ore sampling plant by the government at Prince Rupert. The great mineral belts in the north would find a suitable centre in Prince Rupert and the city could be made a great mining town.

PRINCE ALBERT TAKES PREMIER ORE TO TACOMA

First Shipment From Rich Mine Since Last Spring; 225 Tons.

The "Prince Albert" sailed at 10:30 Saturday night for the south via the southern Queen Charlotte Islands. The big freighter had 225 tons of Premier gold ore valued at \$450 per ton which she brought down on her last trip from Stewart. This ore she will take to the smelter at Tacoma, being the first shipment from the Premier since last spring.

Besides her cargo of ore the "Prince Albert" took down a part cargo of fertilizer which will be discharged at Vancouver. It is expected that the "Albert" will be back by the middle of next week when she will proceed to Stewart for another cargo of the rich ore.

MILLED MOLYBDENUM WORTH \$2,000 A TON

The discovery of the valuable application of molybdenite to the manufacture of high speed steel at Sheffield, England, of course, will give a fresh impetus to the search for this metal in British Columbia. Its concentrates were worth during the war about \$2,000 a ton in Canada, and a higher figure in the United States.

So far two main deposits in British Columbia have been described as producers, although reports of its location have been made from a number of points in various parts of the country. The two referred to are at Lost Creek, in the Nelson mining division, and at Alice Arm. Skeena mining division.

The metal, which is used chiefly in steel manufacture, is a sulphide of molybdenum, Mo. S₂, which has to be concentrated to 80 or 90 per cent, in order that the product may be marketed.

With suitable concentrating mills the tonnages of low grade ore in British Columbia could be developed, and a regular production maintained.

"PRINCE RUPERT" GONE INTO LOCAL DRYDOCK

Annual House-Cleaning of Big Vessel Commenced This Morning.

The "Prince Rupert" left the G. T. P. dock this morning shortly after 8 o'clock for the drydock where she will at once begin her annual overhaul. The ship is in sound condition at the present time and the most of the work will consist in thoroughly cleaning all sections of the big coaster. She will go on the pontoons for a few days while at the dock when the hull will be scraped and painted.

The "Prince John" arrived also on Saturday and will go into the dock for repairs, the "Prince Albert" taking her runs to Stewart and the Islands.
