Interior Rancher Found Dead From Late Bernard McEvoy Was Promin-Rifle Bullet After Being Missing For Several Days

At 7:30 Saturday evening last Wakefield left his home on horseback and, bidding his wife goodbye, said that he was going for a ride. Later that night he was seen riding loward Round Lake. Nothing having been seen of Wakefield subsequently the police at Smithers were advised that he was missing. Early the next morning, a police search was instituted by twenty-five men on horses. At 11 o'clock that morning the body was found in the bush. Alongside the body was a rifle containing and empty shell. A piece of stick had evidently been used by deceased to release the trigger. The late Mr. Wakefield was one

of the early pioneers of the central interior. ### THE YEAR'S BUSINESS REVIEWED


