In a statement issued today, S. J. Hungerford, vice-president in charge of operations and construction, stated that falling off in traffic has reduced the amount of work available in the railway shops. It has been necessary, as a consequence, to dispence temporar-

ily with a number of employees. The number of men affected was not stated nor was any estimate of the number offered.
