U.S. Governments Proposals To Ensure Industrial Peace

Tentative Report Issued by Industrial Commission which asks for Criticism and Suggestions. Calls for Thorough Understanding and Closer Relations Between Capital and Labor.

(Special to The News via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)

WASHINGTON, December 30.—With their tentative plan of a strike court to insure industrial peace, members of the President's Industrial Council today advocate criticisms and suggestions on their work. Their tentative report divides roughly into three parts:

First: The Commission declares that the final solution of the nation's industrial problems depends upon the establishment of a thorough understanding and a much closer relationship between capital and labor.

Second: Pending the growth of this relationship, it proposes to establish machinery for the purpose of stopping industrial conflicts. This machinery will consist of a national tribunal of nine members, and twelve regional tribunals, with broad powers to adjust and enquire into the causes of strikes.

Third: The Commission considers that in the railroad industry there should be some merging of the responsibility for the regulation of rates and wages. The principle of collective bargaining upon which the first industrial conference split, is recognized.

Gompers and Freedom.

WASHINGTON, Dec. 30.—The failure of the President's Industrial Conference "to recognize definitely the organizations of the workers and their trades unions as the basis for representation is a fatal omission," Samuel Gompers declared in a statement discussing the tentative report of the Commission. Gompers added that the Conference should recognize this point in order to make possible a conference on co-operation and wages, which can be expressed only through organizations of their own making.

Gompers said that any plan to establish or maintain anything like fair relations between workers and employers must avoid compulsory features, declaring that the mass of America's workers were "American citizens and under that sovereign citizenship they are free men to whom proposals for compulsory labor are repugnant."

CANADA'S BACON GETS BIG PRICE

Food Controller, H. B. Thompson Declares Canadian Producers Have Chance of Their Lives.

HAS PREFERENCE IN THE BRITISH MARKET

(Special via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)

TORONTO, Dec. 30.—H. B. Thompson, formerly chairman of the Canada Food Board, after having spent some eight months with the Canadian Mission to Britain, in an interview said that the farmers and livestock producers of the Dominion have the chance of their lives to establish themselves in special lines against all comers in the British markets. "Canadian bacon has unquestionably gained the goodwill of the British people," said Thompson, "and it commands a better price than the American product."

OFFICER WAS NOT KILLED BY RAIDERS

Jury Find was Accidentally Shot By One of His Own Men Firing At Raiders on Vice Regal Lodge.

DUBLIN, Dec. 30.—Lieutenant Boast, the officer of the guard who met death in Sunday night's shooting affray near the Vice Regal Lodge in Phoenix Park, was accidentally killed by a bullet from one of his own party, according to the verdict brought in by the jury at the inquest into the death.

NOTED DOCTOR DIES

To Sir William Osler was Attributed Statement That a Man Should be Chloroformed at Sixty.

OXFORD, Dec. 30.—Sir William Osler, the noted physician, who has been ill for several weeks, died here yesterday. Sir William Osler is famous for his alleged statement that a man should be chloroformed at the age of sixty. That he was misquoted was afterwards proved, but not before the false statement had brought upon his head a whirlwind of disapproval from all over North America.

COAL OPERATORS MEET IN CHICAGO

Discuss Findings of Commission in Wage Settlement of Coal Strike. Say Not Bound by Findings.

CHICAGO, Dec. 30.—The representatives of the Coal Operators in the bituminous fields met to discuss their attitude towards the findings of the Commission appointed by President Wilson to adjust the wages of miners after the settlement of the recent nationwide strike. The operators assert they have not committed themselves as to accepting or endorsing any decision which the President's Commission may reach.

PILFERAGE OR THEFT?

The Difference is Defined by New York Court.

Most marine or transportation insurance policies indemnify the policyholder against "theft" but refuse to admit liability for pilferage. Sometimes there is not a very clear line of demarcation between the two. A case involving this point was settled in a New York court this week, when an insurance company refused to admit liability for the theft of five pieces of cloth stolen from a package of twelve pieces. The company contended that as only part of a package was stolen, this constituted pilferage.

The shipper sued, however, and the court sustained him, ruling that the distinction drawn by the company was too fine. He defined pilferage as a petty theft.

TENDER "NEWINGTON" LEAVING FOR DIGBY

VICTORIA, Dec. 30.—The light-house tender Newington, Captain Hiltun, is leaving here in a few days for Prince Rupert, where she will be attached to the new marine agency. She will make her headquarters at Digby Island in future. Plans are being made to house the staff necessary for the marine department officials and their families, for which purpose the Quarantine Station buildings will probably be utilized. A derick scow for lifting buoys is also being despatched north immediately.

TO SUPPLY THE DEMAND

TORONTO, Dec. 30.—Railway officials state that sixty carloads of alcoholic liquor are already on the Quebec border waiting for New Year when the prohibition restrictions are to be removed, for immediate despatch to points in Ontario.

SENATE SATISFIED

ROME, Dec. 30.—The Senate passed a vote of confidence in the cabinet by 417 to 43 following a lengthy explanation given them of the recent London Conference.

NINE MONTHS FOR KINGSTON AND MACDONALD

Brady and Green Were Acquitted When Trial Finished This Morning.

The "Tide" theft case was finally disposed of this morning when Judge Young brought in his decision finding Kingston and MacDonald guilty and acquitting Jacob Green and Paddy Brady. The trial has been going on in the county court for several days. Kingston and MacDonald will each serve nine months in the Okalla prison farm.

The witnesses examined at the court trial included as well as each of the accused, J. H. Hilditch, owner of the launch from which the theft was made. Thos. Shimizu, the Japanese restaurant man to whom the stolen goods were sold, George Russell, employer of Jacob Green, who was alleged to have been implicated in being the driver of the car that carried the goods, and Lum Bing, who testified to giving drugs to Kingston and MacDonald.

Harry Kingston pleaded guilty and gave King's Evidence. He seems to have been a leading spirit in the robbing conspiracy and suggested it to Red MacDonald. Paddy Brady put a good account of his movements and how he happened to be connected with the affair at all. Jacob Green said that he knew nothing about a theft but had been merely hired with his car and had turned the \$5 he received for the services over to his employer.

In closing, Judge Young stated that he was convinced from the evidence that MacDonald was guilty. He felt that he had been associated with Kingston since the very first suggestion of the theft and had assisted him. He also did not believe that MacDonald told the truth about not taking drugs by injection. His evidence was also shifty and he had by no means the appearance of an innocent man.

POLICE AFTER WOOD ALCOHOL MERCHANTS

Arrests Made in Both New York and Chicago—Tin Lined Suitcases Found.

NEW YORK, Dec. 30.—Six men are in custody here and are alleged to be the ringleaders in the conspiracy to flood New York, New Jersey and New England with the poisonous substitute for whisky. Both federal and city authorities are united in a vigorous pursuit of the purveyors of the poisonous beverage, which has caused deaths by the score and hundreds of cases of blindness and illness.

Tin Lined Suitcases.

CHICAGO, Dec. 30.—The police held today nine men in connection with the sale of wood alcohol colored to resemble whisky. Tin lined suitcases filled with whisky, so called, were found in the room occupied by these men.

General Election Two Years Hence

Dominion Governments Program Does Not Foresee Dissolution Before End of Term.

(Special to The News via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)

OTTAWA, December 30.—No general election until 1922 and possibly 1923 is the programme of the Dominion Government unless some internal trouble not now foreseen should develop. The necessity of Sir Robert Borden leaving for a prolonged absence, and the decision of his colleagues to carry on meanwhile is taken to signify that the purpose of the ministry is to defer as long as possible an appeal to the country.

When Parliament meets, a ministerial caucus will be asked to approve of the plans which have been made to bridge over the absence of the Prime Minister. However, it is said to be the purpose of the government to tackle whatever problems come along and call for legislative action and not to make Sir Robert's illness an excuse for deferring any important questions that call for solution.

It is possible that the naval programme may be submitted at the coming session, although until Admiral Jellicoe's report is in the hands of the government, no policy for Canadian naval defence can be decided. The enquiry into the tariff, looking towards a general revision, will not take place until after this session.

NEW YEAR'S EVE CELEBRATION TO BE COSTLY

New York Restaurants Charge Fancy Prices for Accommodation on Festive Occasion.

NEW YORK, Dec. 30.—Seekers after Jazz are enjoying paying as much as \$15 to secure a place at hotel and restaurant tables for New Year's Eve, although one well known hotel manager said that he was only charging \$75 a plate for this occasion. Hundreds of the high livers will herd their own hootch and take their chance in consuming it as the clock nears midnight, while those not having a private supply with which to drink success to the new year will have to swallow sweet cider.

FUEL SITUATION

Use of Coal in Pulverized Form Will Make Available Large Supplies Now Valueless

The fuel situation in Canada is one which must be faced in an effort to overcome the annual threatened shortage and the constantly rising price of coal.

Canada possesses immense coal reserves. Unfortunately, much of it is unsuitable for locomotive purposes, owing to its tendency to spark, also, owing to its high moisture content, it rapidly disintegrates on exposure to the atmosphere. Again, at the mines, both below and above ground, in mining the coal and in handling it, a vast amount of slack is created, which, up to the present, has been considered as waste.

A process for utilizing this slack coal, as well as run-of-mine coal, has for some time been under development. By this method the coal is pulverized until approximately 85 per cent will pass through a 200-mesh screen and 95 per cent through a 100-mesh screen. After the coal has been pulverized, it is fed from the bins by screw conveyors and blown into the furnace.

Good results have been secured by cement plants, by the metallurgical industries, and on locomotives. In the heating of large buildings the use of pulverized coal has proved an economical fuel.

The Commission of Conservation, Ottawa, has issued a report on "Pulverized Fuel, its Use and Possibilities," by W. J. Dick, M. Sc., which explains in detail the use of pulverized coal and its advantages.

BELGIAN SHIP WRECKED NEAR CAPE RACE

Twenty of Crew Drowned and Shore Strwn with Bodies; Gale Prevents Rescue.

PASSENGERS AND CREW OF REID BOAT SAVED

(Special via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)

ST. JOHNS, Newfoundland, Dec. 30.—Twenty of the crew of the Belgian steamer "Van Driel" lost their lives when the vessel was wrecked at Stedshot, near Cape Race. The shores of St. Mary's Bay are strewn with the bodies of those and other members of the crew who sought safety in small boats. On the bridge of the steamer, of which only a small portion is above water, five of the survivors made an ineffectual try for help while terrific seas were breaking over them. Their lives were in momentary danger, but the strength of the gale prevented all attempts at rescue. One by one they were washed off the bridge by the huge breakers which flashed over the unfortunate ship.

Eighty Saved.

ST. JOHNS, Newfoundland, Dec. 30.—Word reached St. Johns today of the rescue of eighty persons, being the passengers and crew of the Reid liner "Dundee" who took refuge on a rocky islet in Bonavista Bay following the wreck of the steamer on Christmas day. They were on their pocky refuge with little food and water for several days before the weather moderated sufficiently to enable them to be taken off. The terrific gale and high seas made the quicker relief of these persons impossible.

Subsidising the Family.

The experiment being tried by the New South Wales Government in arranging for the establishment of a fund for the maintenance of the children of the workers' families will be watched with keen interest by parents throughout the Empire. In these days of high costs, this equalising payment would be very welcome in homes outwith New South Wales. The disadvantage under which the married man labors compared with his single brother, is notorious. And the more so the man with the family growing larger and bigger all the time. The cost of raising a family in this generation is considerably more than in the last and is increasing. Children are an asset to the state and ought to be the most cherished possession of every parent. But many find they can't afford them and frankly say so, although if they knew it, they cannot afford not to, financial embarrassments notwithstanding. That the State should in this fitting way recognise the responsibility which the parents have taken upon themselves in these days is only right and proper.

Taxing the Bachelors.

There have been at many times proposals to tax the single men. They have usually no one to keep except themselves, while on the other hand a family of four, six or eight have to be fed, housed and clothed off the same amount of wages which the single man receives. The inequality is apparent. Many men, of course, would be quite willing to be taxed to preserve their single blessedness, either from not knowing any better or for some other reason. And as many more are quite willing to be married, but cannot see the way clear. They are those of little faith. The knowledge that a man's wages were to be according to the necessities of his family would ease the strain under which every paterfamilias suffers if not all the time, at least some time or other.

Increased Cost of Wheat.

The advance authorised by the Canadian Wheat Board in the prices of both wheat and flour, with its consequent rise in the cost of the loaf is a thing that concerns everybody, but the family man most of all. This constitutes an indirect tax on the whole community, but which will be felt directly, as everyone eats bread. It will affect the man with the family most, because he has to pay for the more loaves. A rather strange thing in connection with this order is, however, in order that the consumer may have the advantage of the cheaper flours of the United States, permits for the importation of the American products will be issued. This is notwithstanding the balance of trade already being heavily against Canada. Canada does not want to import American flour. She wants to export Canadian flour—but not before her own wants are supplied. Standard flour only is being milled in Canada now, but the standardisation in the United States has lapsed and white flour is being milled there, as in pre-war days. Under these permits, the cheaper American white flour will compete against Canadian standard flour. That is, of course, provided the American flour proves to be cheaper at the present rates of exchange, which any further importation from the United States will not help to strengthen.

No Titled Aristocracy.

That the usual batch of knighthoods and other so-called dignities are to be withheld from this democratic Dominion by King George at this time of the year customary for their bestowal upon exalted subjects, will no doubt cause serious disappointment in certain quarters. It is the wish of the people of Canada, however, expressed by Parliament, and the King has deferred to the wishes of the people. Not that it really mattered much, however, whether knights and baronets here were as common as colonels in the southern States, but the whole idea of titles belongs to a by-gone age. In Canada a man is judged by his worth as a man, not by his name. The relics of past centuries and the feudal age have little interest for Canadians. To them belongs the present—and the future.

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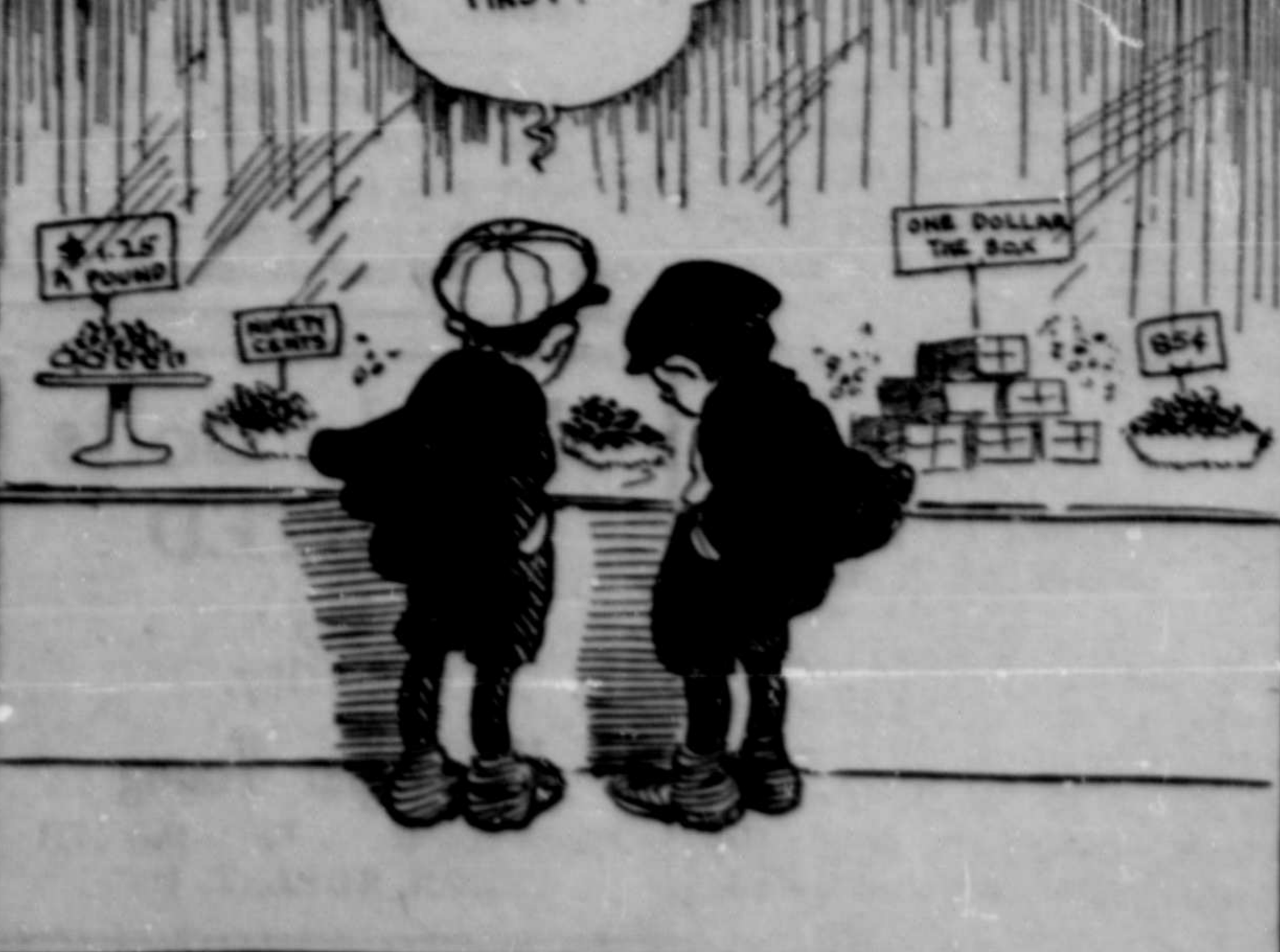

CALGARY OIL BEDS CLAIMED YET UNTAPPED

Expert's Report on Way to British Capitalists States no Wells Yet Down to Real Reservoir.

It is possible that the oil-fields in the vicinity of Calgary, that in 1914 were the scene of one of the greatest orgies of speculation this country has ever seen, may yet develop into a producing area on an extensive scale. The Financial Post understands that British capitalists have been investigating the possibilities of the district and that at their instigation, the British Government recently retained one of Canada's leading oil men, and a pioneer in the Calgary field, to make a thorough investigation of the district. His report is now on its way to England, and in it he states that of the sixteen wells in the Turner Field district near Calgary not a single one has yet been drilled to the spot where he believes the big oil pool exists.

The report states that in this particular area there are sixteen wells, projected, partly drilled, or completed. Twelve of these reach to the first oil sands, and four go further to the second bed of oil sands. Twelve of them have struck oil and seven have struck both oil and gas. Only six, however, are producing wells, and their daily production amounts to about \$1,000.

Yet of the twelve wells, which include the famous Dingman wells not one has been driven below the oil sands, down to the crust of the great anti-cline, which this expert believes is the roof of a large oil reservoir. He calls it the "basic horizon of the oil pool."

If the opinions of this expert are borne out by further investigations the statements made by other oil men who have explored Alberta from north to south will be confirmed. In Peace River, while oil is now being pumped from the oil sands at about 1,200 feet, geologists are advising the operators to go further down to 3,000 and 4,000 feet if necessary to the basic oil strata.

SMITH INCREASE REFERRED TO 1920

Present Council Not to Start Increasing Wages—Too Near End of Term.

The City Council has decided to raise no more salaries during the short term of office that still remains for it. This was the recommendation brought in by the board of works last night in the matter of the application for an increase by H. Smith, caretaker at Fairview Cemetery. The request for increase was referred to the incoming council.

Ald. Casey expressed the views of some others at the council board when he stated that an eleventh hour increase of wages would look like playing the game for re-election.

LARGER ASSESSMENT ROLL FOR THIS YEAR

Assessed Valuation \$21,425,046; Increase of \$300,000.

The report of the city clerk on the 1920 assessment roll was received at last night's council meeting. The roll this year totals \$21,425,046, assessed valuation, an increase of more than \$300,000 over last year. The clerk explained that this increase was due to new buildings at the dry dock and along the waterfront.

POLICE CHIEF TO ENUMERATE BAD CHINESE

That is the Final Decision of the City Council in Chinese Census Affair.

ALD. CASEY SAYS HE IS THROUGH WITH COMMISSION

The chief of police on request of the mayor is to compile a list of persistent offenders against the provisions of the Drug Act which will be submitted to the immigration authorities with a view to deportation of some of the worst members of the Chinese race in the city. As an outcome of the long standing Chinese census proposal, this was the decision reached at last night's council meeting, being moved by Ald. Casey, seconded by Ald. Perry and carried unanimously.

The matter was tabled last week till the Immigration Department and the city solicitor had been heard from in regard to the legal aspect and effectiveness of such a census. Last night a letter was read from Dr. N. M. McNeill, local immigration officer. He stated that he had been advised that the city could not deport Chinese on its own initiative but that complaints could be lodged with the immigration authorities about vexed cases and such action would probably be taken.

The city solicitor said that it was not within the power of the city to take such a census and the Chinese would not be compelled to answer. Though it would probably be an action in the direction of crime prevention, still it would discriminate against the Chinese in particular. As the worst of the Chinese criminals have two or three names anyway, it would be simple to dodge a census taker and the census would be of little effect in the direction for which it was intended.

Ald. Perry at first made the motion that this latest correspondence be forwarded to the Police Commission for their perusal, but Ald. Casey stated that he would refuse to be a party to referring anything more from the council to the present Police Commission and Ald. Perry assenting, the motion was changed as stated.

STREET LIGHTING IS AGAIN BEFORE COUNCIL

Retail Merchants Anxious for It But do Not Show Much Action.

Another letter from the Retail Merchants' Association regarding the improved lighting of Fulton, McBride, Second and Third Avenues was read at the Council meeting last night. It was the opinion of this association that the work should be financed by municipal bonds rather than local improvement bonds. Ald. McRae explained that this work would

have to be done under local improvement.

In the matter of taking a census it was the opinion that this was up to the Retail Merchants' Association as they were the ones so anxious for this improvement. The matter was referred back to the association.

VALVE CLAIM WAIVED

The recommendation of the public utilities committee that the claim to the General Electric valve be waived as it stands at Shawatians was adopted by the council last night. This is the last echo of the ancient dispute between the city and the big supply company.

Sport Briefs

The water in Morse Creek is now high and it is possible that if the cold continues skating may be enjoyed on the sheet of ice that used to prove so popular before the Salt Lake was so prominent in local geography.

Tonight the single men meet the married men in a game of basketball at the rink. Each side is quite enthusiastic as to the result and a good game is promised with a good deal of rivalry. This is an extra game, the next regular game of the season being on January 6, when the Sons of Canada meet the Callies.

Victoria caused much surprise in some hockey circles when the news arrived that the capital team had beaten the Seattle aggregation in the first game of the season. Tonight the Victorias will have a go at the Vancouver team in the Vancouver Arena and if they win it will give them a good start for the season.

Jack Kearns has received sixteen offers already for the appearance of Jack Dempsey in a fight for the world's championship. These range from \$100,000 to others with the sky the limit. They come from all parts of the world, but especially France, Britain and America. Kearns states that no offer has yet been officially accepted or contracted for, but he admits there will probably be a championship match sometime before the middle of 1920 with Georges Carpentier.

It may not be known generally that the Patrick brothers who have made such records as players and managers in Pacific coast hockey teams and are now practically king-pins in the game are natives of the southern part of the province. The boys were raised in the Kootenay country and lived at Nelson. They learned the game in that country and made names for themselves in intermediate hockey in the Slokan country when mere youngsters. William, Ernest and Jack Crawford of Alice Arm and Stewart were team-mates of the Patricks in the early days and were themselves no slouches at the puck game.

MAY ABANDON BOUNTY

And Substitute Royalty if Oil is Found.

Reports from Ottawa indicate that should Peace River and Nor. Alberta oil areas develop into great producing oil fields, it is likely that the Government will cease paying a bounty on petroleum production in Canada, and may even demand a royalty on each barrel produced.

The bounty was originally granted to encourage exploration for oil in this country, and it is felt that if the land leased from the Government should become productive of oil, it would be no longer necessary to continue the bounty. As the Government derives a revenue from the lease of oil lands, the effect of a royalty would be to tax production on a dual basis.

STILL ANOTHER SAW MILL FOR TELKWA

TELKWA, Dec. 29.—Under the stress of high prices prevailing for lumber of all kinds and the impossibility of procuring building material even at the prices now asked, many lumber mills have risen to break the forest solitude during the past year. The end is not yet, and this district is to have still further plants to draw from. Following discussions carried on during the past few weeks, the Pioneer Lumber Company was formed from a partnership between Messrs. Jos. Bourgon, R. E. Wakefield, Emmett Wakefield and E. C. Garger, well-known farmers of the Round Lake district, and it is the plan to establish a mill and cut lumber for the settlers of the district as well as for the various points along the railway.

The mill will be located about a half mile east of the main road at Hubert, and the plan for the mill has already been ordered. It is expected to arrive on the ground about the end of next month.

DOMINION FINANCES

Total National Debt is Approaching \$2,000,000,000 Mark.

(Special via G.T.P. Telegrams.)

OTTAWA.—Ordinary expenditure by the Dominion last month exceeded ordinary revenue. Expenditure was \$43,486,000; revenue, \$31,618,000. The heavy expenditure, however, is largely accounted for by a large payment on November 1 of interest on war loans. During the eight months' period closing with the end of November, ordinary revenue was \$218,027,000; ordinary expenditure, \$202,536,000. Increase in net debt during November was \$32,963,000, as compared with \$20,394,000 in November of last year. The total net debt of the Dominion is now \$1,817,839,000.

This will save a long walk around Conrad Ave. and down Eighth for the children of the Seal Cove School.

Synopsis of Land Act Amendments

Minimum price of first-class land reduced to \$5 an acre; second-class to \$1.50 an acre.

Pre-emption now confined to surveyed lands only.

Records will be granted covering only land suitable for agricultural purposes and which is non-timber land. Partnership pre-emptions abolished, but parties of not more than four may range for adjacent pre-emptions with joint residence, but each making necessary improvements on respective claims.

Pre-emptors must occupy claims for five years and make improvements to value of \$10 per acre, including clearing and cultivation of at least 5 acres, before receiving Crown Grant.

Where pre-emptor in occupation not less than 1 year, and has made proportionate improvements, he may, because of ill-health, or other cause, be granted intermediate certificate of improvement and transfer his claim.

Records without permanent residence may be issued, provided applicant makes improvements to extent of \$100 per annum and records same each year. Failure to make improvements or record same will operate as forfeiture. Title cannot be obtained in less than 5 years, and improvements of \$10.00 per acre, including 5 acres cleared and cultivated, and residence of at least 2 years are required.

Pre-emptor holding Crown grant may recede another pre-emption. If he requires land in conjunction with his farm, without actual occupation, provided statutory improvements made and residence maintained on Crown granted land.

Unsurveyed areas, not exceeding 20 acres, may be leased as homesteads; title to be obtained after fulfilling residential and improvement conditions.

For grazing and industrial purposes areas exceeding 640 acres may be leased by one person or company. Mill, factory or industrial sites on timber land, not exceeding 40 acres may be purchased; conditions include payment of stumpage.

Natural hay meadows inaccessible by existing roads may be purchased conditional upon construction of a road to them. Rebate of one-half of cost of road, not exceeding half of purchase price, is made.

PRE-EMPTORS' FREE GRANTS ACT.

The scope of this Act is enlarged to include all persons joining and serving with His Majesty's Forces. The time within which the heirs or devisees of a deceased pre-emptor may apply for the land under this Act is extended from one year from the death of such person, as formerly, until one year after the conclusion of the present war. This privilege is also made retrospective.

No fees relating to pre-emptions are due or payable by soldiers on pre-emptions recorded after June 15, 1918. Taxes are remitted for five years.

Provision for return of moneys accrued, due and been paid since August 4, 1914, on account of payments, fees or taxes on soldiers' pre-emptions. Interest on agreements to purchase town or city lots held by members of Allied Forces, or dependents, acquired direct or indirect, remitted from enlistment to March 31, 1920.

SUB-PURCHASERS OF CROWN LANDS.

Provision made for issuance of Crown grants to sub-purchasers of Crown Lands, acquiring rights from purchasers who failed to complete purchase, involving forfeiture, on fulfillment of conditions of purchase, interest and taxes. Where sub-purchasers do not claim whole of original purchase price due and taxes may be distributed proportionately over whole area. Applications must be made by May 1, 1920.

GRAZING.

Grazing Act, 1919, for systematic development of livestock industry provides for grazing districts and range administration under Commission of Annual grazing permits issued based on numbers ranged; priority for established owners. Stock owners may form Associations for range management. Free, or partially free, permits for settlers, campers or travellers, up to two head.

Its Motto of Preparedness Should be Applied to Protection of Public Health.

"There hasn't been a fire in the city for months," said a citizen the other day. "It seems a waste of money to keep up a fire department that does nothing."
