Exorbitant Rates of Present Administration Denounced— Log Rolling and Back-Scratching Decried-Would Lift Plane of United States Public Affairs

CHICAGO, June 27:—A biting attack upon Republican rule in the United States through three administrations and a plea for a vote on repeal of the Eighteenth Amendment were laid before the Democratic national convention today in the keynote speech of Senator W. Barkley of Kentucky.

Barkley denounced President# Hoover and the Republicans for "exorbitant and indefensible rates" DIED HERE of the Smoot-Hawley tariff act and promised to lift tariff making above the sordid processes of log rollers and back-scratchers."

The keynoter urged that the convention recommend the passage by Claude Allan Kirkendall, Manager Congress of a resolution submitting a repeal of the Eighteenth Amendment for ratification by the people through state conventions whose delegates should be chosen upon this issue alone.

Barkley proposed that the Democrats should solve the tariff problem by inaugurating friendly international conferences with a view to re-opening normal trade channel in the world and make the tariff morning in the Prince Rupert Gencommission a fact-finding body for Congress.

The keynoter further advocated consideration of a five-day week or a six hour day as a possible solution until his recovery was despaired of of employment problems.


