

Cantabs Defeat Oxford By Five Boat Lengths In Annual Oar Classic

Victors Had Things in Hand All the Time and Came Through With Expected Win-Time Slow in Nineteen Minutes, Eleven Seconds

PUTNEY-ON-THAMES, March 19:-Cambridge University defeated Oxford by five lengths in the annual eight-oared race today over a four-mile course. The distance was covered in the slow time of nineteen minutes, eleven seconds. The Cantabs had the race in hand all the way and came through winners as thye had been expected to do. A good deal less interest than usual was taken in the event this year.
