BUSH FIRE THREATENS TO DESTROY ARROWHEAD

VANCOUVER WORKERS TO STOP WORK ON MONDAY

Trades and Labor Council Declared Last Night in Favor of a General Strike to Start on Monday---Street Railway Employees Will Vote Tonight About Joining Them---If They Do All Factories Using Electrical Energy Will Have to Stop Work.

(Canadian Press Despatch)
 Vancouver, June 2.—A general strike will take place in Vancouver. It was decided by the meeting of the Trades and Labor Council last night, which ratified the proceedings of the special meeting held a week ago to consider the best means of helping the carpenters of Vancouver to enforce their demands.

Starts on Monday
 The strike will start on Monday morning. It was reported at the meeting that several thousand workmen are ready to throw down their tools at the word of command and go out to join their comrades of the carpenters' union, unless a settlement is made in the meantime between the carpenters and

the Master Builders' Association. **The Only Hope**
 The only hope now, is that when the matter is discussed and voted on in the individual unions tonight at special meetings, that the men will refuse to obey the dictates of their leaders. But this is regarded as a faint hope, as it is certain that most of the delegates on the Trades and Labor Council had mandates from their unions.

Public is Alarmed
 The public is very apprehensive of the step threatened, as it is evident it will affect the general welfare of the citizens in a severe manner. It will mean practically a stoppage of the entire industrial activity of Vancouver.

Especially apprehension is felt over the question of the street car men's action. They are to vote on the question tonight. The B. C. Electric Railway is a vendor of electric power to most of the Vancouver factories. Included in the men's union are the powermen employed at the sources of electrical energy.

What It May Mean
 If the car men decide to join the strike, then not only the street transportation but the supply of power for the factories will come to a stop. Thousands of workers who would otherwise continue at work will be obliged to quit. The car men's decision will be handed out either late tonight or tomorrow morning.

BIG BUSH FIRE AT ARROWHEAD

Fifty Men Unequal to Task—Flames are Spreading. Unless Wind Changes Town is Doomed.

(Canadian Press Despatch)
 Victoria, June 2.—At Arrowhead, B. C., a bad bush fire is raging. All day yesterday fifty fire fighters were engaged and were unable to cope with the flames which are spreading.

Help has been summoned from neighboring towns. No lives have been lost but unless the wind changes the town of Arrowhead will be destroyed.

TAKEN ILL SUDDENLY

Guest of Premier Hotel Has to Postpone Journey South

Late last night Mr. Robert Bright, a guest at the Premier Hotel, was taken suddenly ill. No time was lost in sending for Dr. McNeill who arrived promptly, and advised the removal of the patient to the General Hospital. Mr. Bright had intended to proceed south with the Prince Rupert this morning, but was advised by the doctor not to attempt the journey. His illness is not understood to be severe, but he may require some days rest and medical attention.

PRINCE RUPERT'S PRINCELY PROSPECTS FROM PANAMA

Opening Up of World's Greatest Canal and Linking Up of the G. T. P. Transcontinental Together Mean Prestige for Prince Rupert, Says W. H. Magee in His Lecture at the Empress Theatre Last Night.

In 1915 the Pacific Coast will see the greatest doings of the whole century. Prince Rupert will be in on those doings, a regular topnotcher. For by that time Prince Rupert will be linked up with the East by a line of continuous steel, and the Atlantic and Pacific oceans will be linked by the Panama Canal. Somewhere round San Francisco will centre the celebration which will attract all the world and his wife. A forecast of this great event, and its significance to Prince Rupert was given by Mr. W. H. Magee in his lecture last night in the Empress Theatre on "The Panama Canal."

On Sound Footing
 After giving a brief resume of

the history of this short route across the continent, and the attraction it has had for the imaginative minds amongst commercial men for many years, Mr. Magee who has studied the canal thoroughly, told how through the foresight of Theodore Roosevelt the Panama Canal Zone ten miles wide, has been secured for the United States right across the Isthmus for \$40,000,000 and how after the lamentable and criminal mismanagement of the canal works under the French Company that first exploited it, the canal scheme has been set on a sound footing, and carried to its present prosperous stage within three years of completion, by the American

Dismal Failure Once
 Piteful conditions prevailed during the period of mismanagement. Vast sums were subscribed in France. All materials had to be bought there. Graft flourished, and tons upon tons of costly machinery was ordered in France only to be dumped in swamps on the Isthmus. Insanitary conditions prevailed amongst the workers, and plagues of small-pox, typhoid, and malaria decimated the camps. Most pitiful is the grim black and white sketch drawn in a word or two by the lecturer of a bright young French engineer who went out to Panama at that time with his wife, and four pretty daughters. CUSTOMS STILL ON THE CLIMB

Increase of May Over April is \$3425.87

That Prince Rupert's trade is continually on the increase is easily proved by the figures of the Customs Department returns from month to month. They are always steadily climbing upwards.

Returns for the month of May have just been issued. They show a total of \$13112.64 for Customs receipts during the month. For the month of April the figures were \$786.77, thus the increase of May's receipts over April's is \$325.87 quite a substantial sum. Noticeable to the Customs Officials this spring is the vast increase in their dealings with settlers' effects. Home-makers keep pouring into Prince Rupert and bringing their goods with them. Everything is done to facilitate their coming. It is not their money at Prince Rupert needs so much for themselves and their earning power to help build up the city.

TO KNIFE RECIPROCITY BY SPLITTING DEMOCRATS

Opponents of the Closer Trade Measures Making a Final Effort—President Taft Trying to Keep Forces Together—Debate Wednesday

Toward this critical contingency President Taft is now devoting

his attention. He is holding daily conferences at the White House in an effort to keep the Republican and Democratic Senators in line for the pact.

The debate in the Senate on the reciprocity bill is scheduled to open next Wednesday.

STRIKE WITNESSES MUST WAIT UNTIL MONDAY

Govt. Agent McMullin Received Wire Today From Victoria That They Need Not Leave—Another Hardship on Them

Government Agent McMullin received a telegram late last night stating that it would be unnecessary for the witnesses in the strike case to leave Prince Rupert until Monday. One or two of the Special Constables summoned, however, left by the Prince Rupert this morning. The others will go south by the Prince George on Monday.

Defence Inconvenienced
 About eighty witnesses for the defence are in town and were ready to go below with the Prince Rupert this morning. On hearing that they would not be required to leave until Monday they were faced with the commissariat problem. Many of the men have come from upriver and distant districts to attend the trial, and these have no work here. How to feed them was the question.

Consulted Govt. Agent

Six tenders have been received, several of whom expressed their willingness to construct the vessels in Canada.

Plankway Completed Tonight From McBride to the Circle

Work has been pressing on apace on Eighth avenue which is being planked from McBride street round to Hays Cove Circle where it links up with Seventh avenue. This linking up will be completed tonight, and the new plankway will be a great convenience to residents in this district. Messrs. J. A. Meeker & Co. are the contractors for the work.

SEARCHERS FIND DEAD BODIES

All were Victims of the Mysterious Fire at Silverton Yesterday—Ten were Injured.

Nelson, June 2.—Search among the ruins of the Windsor Hotel at Silverton which was destroyed by fire yesterday morning produced a few charred remains.

Apparently they are of the four men, Robert McTaggart, Robert Fairgrieve, one unknown man believed to be a foreigner, and a fourth whose identity is unknown. At present there are ten injured in the hospital at New Denver.

IMPERIAL DELEGATES WANT TO BE CONSULTED

Want to Know Why the Dominions Were Not Consulted Over the Treaty of London, Better Known as the Anglo-American Arbitration Treaty

(Canadian Press Despatch)
 London, June 2.—The Imperial Conference today debated the motion introduced by Hon. Andrew Fisher, Premier of Australia, regretting that the Overseas Dominions had not been consulted in reference to the declaration of London in regard to the arbitration treaty with the United States.

Sir Edward Grey promised that they should be consulted before the next Hague conference and pointed out that not to agree to its ratification would be a great blow to the cause of arbitration.

A MAIL SERVICE SOON FOR PORCHER ISLAND

Post Office Inspector D. H. Fletcher Will Visit Island to Investigate Conditions and Routes—Leaves by a Launch This Afternoon

This afternoon Mr. D. H. Fletcher, Post Office Inspector for the District, is to make a trip across to Porcher Island to investigate the conditions over there as regards mail service. Mr. Fletcher intends leaving in the Knox launch with Mr. F. Davis.

Mail Service Sought
 For some time the residents of Porcher Island have been very anxious to have a regular mail service, and have taken every opportunity to make their desires in this direction known to the department. With a rapidly growing population, and increases of business every where in these districts just now, it has not been easy to cope with the needs of all places as quickly as residents have wished. Probably Porcher Island will very soon have the desired service now.

Mail by Claxton or Rupert
 Up to the present mail communication with Porcher Island has been either by Claxton or Prince Rupert whenever a Porcher Island boat was coming over. And the trip by boat was frequent-

ly long and sometimes even perilous. Mr. Fletcher will make a thorough investigation into routes, conditions and possible means of communication with the Island's most populous parts, and will devise the best and most frequent mail service possible.

THOUSANDS NOT HUNDREDS

News Staff is Scared Lest Mack's Muse Should be Aroused

In a Calgary news item in yesterday's Daily News telling how a local clerk purchased a property on Seventh avenue, seven years ago for \$825, and sold it yesterday for \$105,000, a headline stated that he had made thus cleared twelve hundred per cent profit. LAUNCH KNOX OVERDUE TODAY

Expected Last Night from Kitsum with Scow of Gravel

Some anxiety was expressed on the waterfront this morning regarding the gasoline launch Knox, which left for Kitsum yesterday in charge of F. Davis her owner, to unload a scow of gravel and tow it back to Prince Rupert.

The launch and scow were expected back last night, but did not arrive, and it was thought that delay might have been occasioned by the state of the tide hindering the handling of the scow. Enquiries made about one o'clock this afternoon resulted in the statement made at the boat house that the Knox was still out, and no news of her was available, but that she was expected every hour. Another launch has been sent out to look for her, though there is not believed to be any reason for serious anxiety, as Mr. Davis is an experienced launch owner on these coasts.

THE GRAND TRUNK ASSESSMENT

Owing to the near approach of the time when the citizens will be called upon to vote on the above question to bind the city to an agreement covering a long period of years, and owing also to the evident reluctance shown in certain quarters to discuss the question with the citizens, the Daily News will print a series of editorial articles dealing with the various aspects of the question.

In so doing, there is no desire to sway the minds of the electors either for or against the proposed settlement. The aim will be to state the case fairly, without prejudice, without exaggeration, and without rhetorical appeal, letting the issues be clearly seen, and allowing the facts to make their own appeal to the individual mind. Our chief concern is not which way the electors will vote, but that the electors may know what it is they are voting for or against.

Article No. 3.—How the General Assessment is Affected.

The first and most obvious effect of any alteration in the assessment of the Grand Trunk Pacific property is upon the assessment of the private lot-owners. At present the lands within the city limits are owned by three classes of ownership, viz., the Grand Trunk Pacific Railway company, the Grand Trunk Pacific Town and Development Company, the Provincial Government and the private lot-owners. For practical purposes of civic revenue, there are only three classes, for the Government-owned lots are exempt from taxation. Later on, there will only be two classes, for the Development company is formed not to hold and develop the lots, but to sell them to private lot-owners. The permanent sources of taxation will be the Grand Trunk Pacific Railway company, and the private lot-owners. The question at issue in the assessment dispute is, "In what proportions shall the burden of taxation be divided."

According to the opinion of the Assessor appointed by the Provincial Government, the proper proportions in which the taxation should be divided, taken on a basis of the relative value of the property owned by the railway company and the private lot-owners (including the Development company) was in the ratio of \$7,129,500 for the railway company and \$5,043,142.50 for the private lot-owners, (including the Development company). This at last year's rate of taxation meant a tax bill of \$101,497 for the company and \$75,657 for the private lot-owners. This gave the city, after the Court of Revision was over, and the assessment records signed, an estimated revenue of \$177,154.

In other words, out of a total revenue needed of \$177,154 the independent assessor, appointed by the Provincial Government, declared that a just division based on the value of the holdings of the parties, would require the railway company to contribute \$101,497 to the citizens' \$75,657.

Now it is evident that if instead of a contribution of \$101,497 the Grand Trunk Pacific Railway company is only to make a contribution of \$5,000 a year as President Hays proposed, or \$25,897 as the Board of Trade suggested, or \$30,000 a year as the late city council proposed, or \$15,000 a year as the present city council proposes, that the private lot-owners will have to pay the difference.

Assuming that the financial needs of the city are no greater this year than last—and this fiscal year has twelve months in it to the seven of last year—then in order to raise a revenue of \$177,154, the citizens will have to raise in addition to last year's share, the difference between the amount of the settlement arrived at, and the amount levied on the railway company last year.

Thus if the suggestion is adopted by the citizens that the Grand Trunk Pacific's assessment be reduced to \$15,000 a year for ten years, in order to raise \$177,154, the citizens will have to contribute \$162,154 instead of \$75,657 as last year. As the city grows and larger revenues

are needed during the currency of the ten year agreement, the proportion of taxation would grow larger for the citizens and smaller for the railway company, for the reason that the citizens' share would increase, while the company's would remain stationary.

That this first and most obvious outcome of the proposed agreement is realised by the city authorities, is indicated in the recently issued assessment for the present year. In some cases the assessor has doubled and trebled the assessment of the privately owned lots to prices exceeding even the speculative value of the properties. On the whole area of privately owned lots the total assessment has been increased from \$4,700,822.50 to \$7,820,830.

That this is not the result of any general advance in values is seen by the fact that the Grand Trunk Pacific's property is now reduced from \$7,291,000 to \$2,819,500. Even this sum is being protested by the railway company, which in its notice of appeal states that its properties are "grossly over-assessed."

This may be taken either as an honest expression of belief that its lands are not worth that figure, or it may be an effort to still further compress the assessment so as to be prepared in the event of the proposed agreement being voted down by the citizens.

The citizens have a right to vote to reduce the company's assessment. If a sufficient inducement were offered them, it might even be good policy so to do. But it should be clearly explained to the citizens by those who submit the agreement to the people, that every dollar so exempted will have to be made up by the private lot-owners.

BABY VICTIM OF SWEATSHOP

Works for His Living by Hooking Eyelets on a Card

A baby aged two and a half years, who "works" for his living by hooking eyes on a card for his poor, working mother, has been discovered in London.

This little victim of sweated child labor—surely the youngest in the country—is mentioned by a writer in the Empire Review for April on "The Problem of the Child."

"I have seen a baby of two and the writer, 'so unchildlike at thirty months that he had not the curiosity to look up from his work as we talked with the mother.

"Gravely and industriously—this baby toiler placed hook after hook in its place on the card, saving a few minutes every hour to the mother who earns 3s. a week at the most monotonous, weary, treadmill type of 'woman's work' that exists. There are twelve hooks and eyes on each card, and the worker is paid 10d. for every gross of cards. First she sews the hooks on to the cards and the child links each hook with an eye. Then the eyes are stitched in.

POLICE RECORD IS EXCELLENT

Prince Rupert's Behavior Has Been Exemplary of Late

From the police point of view Prince Rupert is in a most satisfactory state. At the meeting of the Police Commission held yesterday afternoon in the City Hall Chief Vickers presented his report showing no formidable list of serious offences for the past month, but only the usual list of minor lapses.

The report showed the city to be orderly and law-abiding under Chief Vickers' administration of police matters, and Mayor Manson complimented the Chief on this condition of affairs. Chief Vickers mentioned in his statement that a keen watch is kept upon the movements of all classes of undesirable, and that they have little chance of obtaining a foothold in Prince Rupert, as they are kept on the move continually.

Amongst other matters of minor importance, dealt with were the estimates of the cost, some \$650 in all, of the new police offices and court room. It is noteworthy that this new building has not yet been the scene of any trial

for a serious offence, though it has been occupied now for several weeks.

Present at the meeting which was over in less than an hour, were Mayor Manson, Commissioner Kirkpatrick, Commissioner M. M. Stephens, and City Clerk Woods, Secretary of the Commission.

YOUR PLANTS NEED EXERCISE

Food, Fresh Air and Frolic for Flowers

Each new importation of French materials and each new output of domestic summer fabrics shows a decided preference for pink in every conceivable shade, with coral in the lead.

CALLA LILY CAKES

A New and Dainty Sponge Cake for You

Three fresh eggs beaten together, then add one tablespoonful of hot water; into this beat slowly one scant cup of granulated sugar. Add to the mixture one cup of sifted flour, one teaspoonful of baking powder, and one teaspoonful of vanilla, also a pinch of salt. Drop the batter by scant teaspoonfuls into buttered tins, forming round, flat cakes, not touching one another. Bake quickly, but not brown, as they must be soft and pliable. Press together from the outside while hot into the form of a lily. Fill the cavity thus formed just before serving with whipped sweetened cream, place a small piece of orange peel in the centre of the cream for the stamen, and use a strip of Angelica for a stem. This recipe will make forty-eight cakes, and served on a dessert plate to each guest with a cup of cocoa or coffee makes a delicious and artistic refreshment for an afternoon party.

been six weeks in that pestilential place when all were dead. Conditions now are very, very different. Sanitation is as nearly perfect as modern science can make it.

Once 40 Days Now 10 Hours

It means an outlay of \$375,000,000 to complete the canal, but the difference in time between the steamer journey at fullest forced draught speed through the Magellan Straits, and through the completed canal, is as forty days to ten hours. It will take only ten hours for an ocean steamer to cross the Isthmus. The benefit of the canal to the world's commerce is of course evident. Among its less noticeable advantages is the fact that its effect will be to act as a wholesome check on transcontinental railways that might otherwise rack-rate transportation facilities.

Rupert Will Rejoice

From Prince Rupert's peculiarly advantageous position on the great trade route round the world, and the fact that the harbor here is so superb, Mr. Magee confidently predicts that Prince Rupert will naturally assume the place of honor as guest in the world-wide rejoicings when the Canal is complete. Fresh crowned with the achievement of her own nearer and dearer ambitions on the completion of the Grand Trunk Pacific, our city will be able most appreciatively to share in the jubilation of the world's commercial centres in 1915, the more so because the Panama Canal means to Prince Rupert an increase of seaward trade only to be paralleled by the prosperity brought from landward by the railway.

Mayor Manson Presided

With a graceful compliment to the present municipal government of Prince Rupert, which made Mayor Manson modestly hang his distinguished head, Mr. Magee concluded his interesting lecture. The Mayor was unfortunately compelled to apologise for the slender audience and his apology constitutes a distinct rebuke to Prince Rupert. The address was given by Mr. Magee under the auspices of the Board or Trade the members of which realise the importance to Prince Rupert of the Panama Canal. But evidently present-day Prince Rupert prefers the picture show. It will be a different story in 1915.

HUMBOLDT CO. WIN THEIR CASE

White Pass Railway Must Now Climb Down

After three years of litigation, during which the case was carried to the court of appeal of the District of Columbia, the Humboldt Steamship Co., of Seattle, has won its fight against the White Pass and Yukon route, which was charged with discrimination in rates from Skagway to interior Alaska points. The ruling of the court of appeals will mean that all railroads operating in Alaska will be compelled to file a schedule of rates and classifications which will be open to the public in protection.

The court holds that Alaska is a territory of the United States within the meaning of the Act of Congress regulating commerce.

Up to 1905 the White Pass & Yukon refused to quote rates to Dawson, Fairbanks and other interior Alaska ports and refused to work in connection with the Humboldt Steamship company.

The Humboldt company was compelled to secure the local rates from Skagway to the interior, which it is alleged were higher than the through rate offered by the Alaska Steamship company and the Pacific Coast company.
