

United States Abandons Efforts In Far East Crisis — British Evacuation Ordered

WASHINGTON, D.C., Feb. 22:-The State Department of the United States announced Saturday night that it had abandoned all efforts to bring about peace in the Sino-Japanese crisis. The United States would now concentrate, it was stated, in protecting its nationals at Shanghai and other points of conflict.

LONDON, Feb. 22:-The British government issued orders on Saturday that arrangements be made for the evacuation of British citizens from Shanghai owing to war conditions there between China and Japan.






