Piled Up Twelve Miles Off St. George's in Blinding Rainstorm Yesterday—Valued at \$1,600,000 and Fully Insured—Passengers Are All Safe

HAMILTON, Bermuda, March 14:-The Canadian National steamship Prince David lay today on a treacherous coral reef, twelve miles off St. George's, where she struck on Sunday. Eighty-four passengers and the crew of 140 had been safely transferred in lifeboats to the steamer Lady Somers of the same line. The vessel is believed to be total loss. Valued at \$1,600,00




