## ARRESTS EXPECTED

Officers Believed to Be Hot on Trail of Lindbergh Kidnappers and

Col. Schwarzkopf Remains at Head of Investigation-Secret Service Helping

HOAX IS REVEALED

HOPEWELL, May 17:-Col. Norman Schwarekopf, superintendent of New Jersey state police, announced today that John one of the Norfolk negotiators in the Lindbergh kidnapping case, had written a complete confession that all the people with whom he had told of negotiating at sea and all the boats on which he said he had met them were creations of his own imagination.

TRENTON, N.J., May 17:- Despite the assassination of Premier Inuome criticism which has been voiced at his handling of the case, Jol. H. Norman Schwarzkopf, head of the New Jersey state police, will continue to direct the investigation into the kidnapping and murder of Charles Augustus Lindbergh jr., it was announced yesterday. The offer of the United States secret service of assistance has been accepted but its operations will be under

Col. Schwarzkopf's direction. It was said last night that officers were hot on the trail of a gang of five men and one woman, who are supposed to have received the \$50,000 ransom which was paid over on behalf of Col. Lindbergh and who are suspected of the kidnapping and murder. Arrests are expected momentarily, it was stated. Dr. John F. (Jafsie) Condon, who paid the \$50,000 over at a rendezvous in the Bronx, is personally assisting the police in efforts to

identify the abductors. The search was also being carried on by coastguard vessels for the ship which Norfolk intermediaries claimed to have met to negotiate with representatives of the supposed kidnappers and which since the finding of the baby's body was said to have dropped out of sight.

## NEW DEAL FOR MINE

Premier Does Not Believe Tough Oakes Property in Ontario is Worth \$195,000

Our latest official information in regard to the Tough Oakes Burnside property in Ontario was contained in the Premier annual report in which H. A. Guess, vicepresident and managing-director outlined the position fully, explaining that results so far after expenditure of \$180,000 on exploration did not justify payment of the amended option price of \$195,000, says Financial News. The first payment was due July 7, 1932. Mr. Guess stated that the owners had been requested to further reduce! the option price.

It is learned on good authority!
that since the date of the report a
new arrangement with the owners
has been effected and that work is
proceeding with a view to preparing the mining plant and mill for
operation. Details of the new arrangement are not yet available.

An independent engineer who examined the property last January for the owners showed 35,485 tons of ore reasonably indicated assaying \$14.20 per ton. Premier engineers estimated that this ore would give a net return of \$5.71 per ton or \$202,619 for the total tonnage. Cost of preparing mine and mill for production was estimated at \$102,475 which would have left \$100,144 whereas the option payment as the agreement then stood would have been \$195,000. It was pointed out further that Premier had no chance of getting back the \$180,000 spent in locating this ore unless as the result of further expenditures further ore should be





