ANOTHER JAIL-BREAKER IS CAPTURED
LINDBERGH CHILD TO BE RETURNED TO PARENTS SOON

Detective David Maxwell of Burnaby Critically Injured in Gun Battle With Bandit Bagley

Notorious Desperado Escapes Following Duel in Burnaby Woods—Daring Events Lead Up to Locating of Bandits Late Saturday Night

VANCOUVER, March 28:—Detective David Maxwell of the Burnaby police was critically injured and is now in hospital following four bullets being fired at him by William Bagley, jailbreaker, bank robber and all around bad man, late Saturday night in the Burnaby woods. Bagley escaped but the police are hot on the trail of the notorious desperado, who is under sentence of 14 years' imprisonment for robbing the Harrison Hot Springs Hotel last spring.

PASSING OF IRISH PEER

Sir Horace Plunkett Dies At His Home In Surrey At Age of Seventy-Seven

LONDON, March 28.—Sir Horace Plunkett, well known Irish industrialist, died at his home in Surrey Saturday afternoon. He was seventy-seven years of age and had lived in England for the last few years although his interests were in Ireland where he was born.

CROP PROSPECTS ARE BRIGHTENED

WINNIPEG, March 28:—Crop prospects for the 1932 season were much brightened at the end of the week as a result of 24 hours fall of sleet and snow in most parts of the prairies. The moisture will do the soil a great deal of good.

BIG GALE IN SOUTH

Three Lives Lost in Puget Sound as Result of High Wind

SEATTLE, March 28:—One man was killed and two youths are missing and believed drowned as a result of a gale which swept the Puget Sound region the latter part of last week. Roy Williams, aged 30, was killed when a tree fell across a building in which he was sleeping at Cle Elum. Two Everett youths are believed to have been drowned when their canoe capsized in the rough waters of the Sound between Everett and Whitby Island. The upturned canoe has been found.

NO TERMS MADE YET

Peace Parley at Shanghai Still in Session Under British Chairmanship

SHANGHAI, March 28:—There has been another session of the conference on Sino-Japanese matters between Chinese, Japanese and foreign powers' representatives, it being announced after adjournment that there had been no definite accomplishment. The British minister continues to act as chairman of the parley. "There is no material advance in negotiations but the outlook is still hopeful," it was stated following Thursday's session.

HALIBUT BIDS UP

Prices Take Gratifying Upward Bound as Catches Totalling 34,000 Pounds Are Sold

Halibut prices on the local fish exchange took a gratifying upward bound this morning when the buyers paid from 12c and 4c to 13.7c and 6c for three catches aggregating 34,000 pounds. The fish is being shipped this afternoon to the fresh fish markets of the east. The boats receiving these surprisingly high prices were as follows:

BENNETT IS CRITICIZED

Government Going Wrong Way in Endeavoring to Solve Problems—Mackenzie

BRANTFORD, Ont., March 28:—Capt. Ian Mackenzie, Liberal member of Parliament, told an audience here that the Bennett government was going the wrong way in endeavoring to solve the problems of Canada. He charged the government with strangulation of commerce by erection of high tariff walls.

Local Man Came Near Winning Fame and Fortune in McConnell Creek Country Many Years Ago

Twenty-six years ago H. F. Glassey of Prince Rupert prospected McConnell Creek, which has become famous recently through the operations of Mickey Brown and his associates, who for the first time have reached bedrock and found the gravel very rich. Mr. Glassey and partner went down 90 feet and then gave it up as a bad job. Mr. Brown went down something like 150 feet before he struck the rich gravels which contained the gold. In six pails of dirt he is said to have taken out 125 ounces of gold.

SALVAGE IS ATTEMPTED

MONTREAL, March 28:—Salvage of the steamer Prince David, which was wrecked two weeks ago on a coral reef near St. George's, Bermuda, is considered feasible, it was stated at headquarters of Canadian National Steamships here Saturday. Attempts to save the vessel will be commenced at once, it was stated.

Mr. Brown was in the country for 11 years. Last year he was helping out old Pete Jensen and was attracted by the gold taken and the formation of the country. This induced him to return this spring. He struck water in the hole he was drilling and then he and his partner went across to help old Pete and that was the hole that went down 90 feet in 1926. Mr. Glassey says there is 70 miles of country similar to the 10 miles staked by Brown in hydraulic leases. Gold can be found almost anywhere there. At present the country is covered with snow and it will likely be on the ground for a month more. In regard to the cost of getting into McConnell Creek, the airplane will carry 1600 pounds for \$400 so that less than the suggested \$2,500 would carry a man through the season and bring him out again. American capital is interested in the present operations.

Kidnapped Baby Safe On Boat Off Norfolk Intimated Last Night

Personal Representative of Col. Lindbergh Reported to Have Made Contact With Kidnappers During Twenty-Four Hour Airplane Trip

NORFOLK, Va., March 28:—Following a twenty-four hour airplane trip by John Hughes Curtis, prominent citizen of Norfolk, who is said to have been acting as a personal representative of Col. Charles A. Lindbergh, reports that the kidnapped twenty month old son of the famous flyer was safe on a boat off Norfolk were confirmed and it was further intimated that the child would be returned to his parents within the course of the coming week. Curtis, who had left here Saturday afternoon with Newport News as his supposed destination, returned at 5 o'clock yesterday afternoon. Curtis refused at first to make any comment regarding his trip other than that he had "made progress." It was later intimated that he had made contact through intermediaries with the kidnappers. Stating that he had "been up all night and quite evidently fatigued, Curtis went to bed at his home immediately after returning.

DAMAGE TO FURS DONE

Fire in Cordova Street Premises, In Vancouver Saturday Afternoon

VANCOUVER, March 28.—Damage to dressed furs estimated at \$3,000 was done Saturday afternoon when fire broke out in the premises of A. Nickoff & Son in the Metropolitan Building, at the corner of Horner and Cordova Streets. Most of the damage was caused by smoke.

STALIN IS NOT WELL

Eminent German Specialist on Way to Moscow to Attend Dictator of Soviet Russia

BERLIN, March 28.—An eminent German specialist on internal medicine is reported to be on his way from Berlin to Moscow, having been invited by the Soviet government to attend Joseph Stalin, the Soviet dictator. Some surprise was expressed at the report that the 53-year old Stalin was not well since it had not been reported previously. The dictator is a man of strong physique and he has been living a simple life since assuming the leadership of the Soviet government.

THREATEN ABDUCTION

Mrs. Richard Porter Davidson Ordered to Pay \$2000 or Lose Her Daughter

WASHINGTON, D.C., March 28:—The epidemic of extortion threats continued here yesterday when Mrs. Richard Porter Davidson received a telephone call during which it was demanded that she leave \$2000 at a designated place, failing which her six-year old daughter would be kidnapped.

Viscount Bury Breaks Leg in Fall Off Horse

LONDON, March 28.—Viscount Bury suffered a broken leg as a result of being thrown from his horse while hunting with the hounds on Saturday.

SEATTLE MEETING

Huge Mass Gathering of Unemployed to Be Held in Puget Sound City

SEATTLE, March 28:—The civic utilities committee has approved plans in connection with a huge mass meeting to be held here on Tuesday night by the Unemployed Workers' League at the Civic Auditorium. The Auditorium will be given free for the meeting and there will also be free street car transportation to the meeting for unemployed workers.

Shot in Vancouver; Condition Serious

Jack Clynne Alias Sol Herrin Unable to Give Account of What Happened to Him

VANCOUVER, March 28:—Jack Clynne alias Sol Herrin was admitted to the Vancouver General Hospital on Saturday in a critical condition from a bullet wound in the back. He was taken in charge by the police in the east end but was unable to give any coherent account of what had happened. The police are continuing the investigation.

BALDWIN TO BE MADE PEER SOON

LONDON, March 28:—It was reported here yesterday in political quarters that Rt. Hon. Stanley Baldwin, former Prime Minister and now Lord President of the Council in the National government, is to be elevated to the peerage shortly. Mr. Baldwin will lead the British delegation to the Empire economic conference in Ottawa this summer.

SPIRIT OF CONFIDENCE

In Britain the spirit of confidence has returned. Conditions touched rock bottom months ago when the credit of the nation sank so low that many wondered what was about to happen. Then a change came over the people. It had been coming but it took the big political campaign to firmly establish a new idea in their minds. They seem to have decided then that they must help themselves if they were to bring back better conditions.

The government of the country balanced its budget and declared its intention of fostering home industries. It appealed to the patriotism of the people to pay their taxes immediately in order to enable the country to carry on. The response was immediate. The people had faith in their leaders and money poured into the public coffers. The price of securities began to stiffen and as the weeks advanced, money began to flow into the country for investment. The British were once more on their feet.

CANADIAN CONFIDENCE

In Canada we are not quite as far advanced as they are in Britain. We have not felt the pinch so badly as they did in John Bull's Island. It has taken us longer to realize that conditions have changed and that we must do business on a different basis.

Prince Rupert people have been slow to adapt themselves to the new conditions. The grocers led the way by giving us food just as cheap as anywhere, consistent with quality. Other merchants have followed or are following. The result is bound to be beneficial. Very soon we shall find fish prices stiffening, salmon canneries will be operating, the mills will be cutting lumber and we shall be once again showing activity. Every dollar produced in the district will be an impetus to business, just as every dollar sent out of town which could be expended here will be a hindrance.

WHAT ARE FRILLS?

The question of "frills" in connection with the work of the schools is at present more or less agitating the public mind. When frills are mentioned it is usually assumed that reference is made to manual training and domestic science. One recent correspondent seems to have assumed that the commercial course is a frill. Then comes another correspondent who considers French, Latin, history and botany as frills.

The Vancouver Province, in a recent editorial article says:

"There are, of course, no such things as educational frills. The phrase is a catchword and nothing more. It has no real meaning. What is a frill to one may be essential to another. Wallpaper is useless on a bridge, but may be a very proper covering for the wall of a room. So a great deal depends on who is viewing the situation and from what angle he is looking at it. It must not be forgotten that there is a good deal of snobbery about education. It came from the top down, and still bears many evidences of its origin. It was once the privilege of the few. Now it has spread and leavened the whole lump, or most of it, and is regarded as the right of the many. But our education is not yet democratic in a proper sense. Relics of its old aristocratic rags still cling to it, and it has never been properly adjusted to the needs of the many."

DARROW AT HONOLULU

To Conduct Defence in "Honor Murder" Case—To Ask Continuance

HONOLULU, March 28:—Clarence Darrow, noted Chicago criminal lawyer, has arrived here from the mainland to conduct the defence of Mrs. Granville Fortescue, her son-in-law, Lieut. Massie and two United States seamen in the notorious "honor murder" case. The trial was set for today but Darrow has asked for a continuance for a few days at least in order to enable him to prepare the defence more thoroughly. Owing to overwork soon after arriving, Darrow is now confined to bed with illness but his condition is not serious. Physicians have suggested that he adopt himself to a more leisurely gait in view of the weather to which he is not used. It may be necessary to delay the start of the trial beyond April 4, the date now set.

IS DEAD IN SAN DIEGO

David L. Drake, Noted American Electrical Engineer, Passes Away at Age of 82

SAN DIEGO, March 28:—David L. Drake, noted American electrical engineer, died here on Thursday at the age of 82. Since 1924 he had lived in retirement here. During his active career, Drake devised many of the electrical appliances which are now in common household use.

OPERA MAY BE CLOSED

Metropolitan House in New York Has Exhausted Capital and Reserve Funds

NEW YORK, March 28:—The Metropolitan Opera House, seat of grand opera in United States, is facing the prospect of remaining closed all next season owing to financial circumstances.

It is revealed that losses of the past season have entirely exhausted capital and reserve funds which amounted to \$550,000.

Clarence MacKay Ordered to Take Lengthy Holiday

NEW YORK, March 28:—Clarence H. MacKay, president of the Postal Telegraph Co., owing to the necessity of a lengthy period of recuperation from a recent serious illness with intestinal influenza, will have to relinquish active direction of his important business affairs for the time being at least, it is announced. His physicians have ordered him to take an extended period of rest.

MacKay is the husband of Anna Case, noted opera singer, and the father-in-law of Irving Berlin, popular song writer.

Hoovers Attend Sunrise Easter Sunday Service

WASHINGTON, D.C., March 28:—President and Mrs. Herbert Hoover attended a sunrise Easter Sunday service in pouring rain yesterday morning at Arlington National Cemetery. Due to the effects of the wetting, they were unable to attend regular service later in the morning in their own church.

Schumann-Heink Slightly Better

Aged German Prima Donna Has Been Seriously Ill in St. Louis Hospital

ST. LOUIS, March 28:—The condition of Madame Schumann-Heink, aged German prima donna, who has been seriously ill here, was reported last night to be slightly improved. She is a patient in a local hospital.

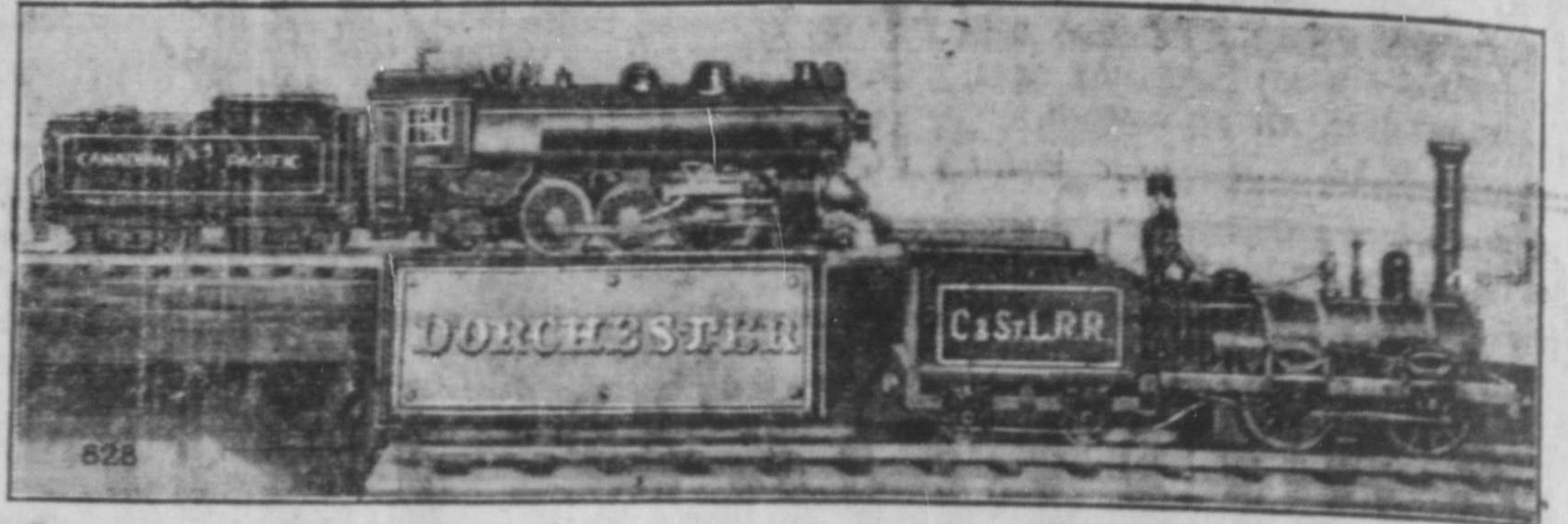

The Old and the New



The two models have been showing at the Chateau-de-Ramezay, Montreal, recently in an exhibition of a century of locomotives. Right, is the "Dorchester", operated in 1836 to 1850 on the Champlain and St. Lawrence Railroad between St. John's and La Prairie, Quebec, the first train to run in Canada. Left, is the 2300 type Canadian Pacific Railway locomotive, a model of the great machine that draws modern passenger trains across the Dominion. Comparison of the two locomotives will bring home the immense development in the past 100 years. The four driving wheels of the "Dorchester" were 48 inches in height. The six driving wheels of the 2300 type locomotive are 75 inches in height. Engine and tender weight of the "Dorchester" was just over 10,000 lbs; of the 2300 it is 648,300 lbs. Tractive force of the "Dorchester" is not given, but it must have been greatly less than the 45,000 lbs of the Canadian Pacific engine. Engine and tender of both locomotives had respectively eight wheels and twenty wheels. A further indication of the vast spread in operation values between the old and the new is seen in the figures of the latest and most powerful Canadian Pacific engine, the "8000" type, capable of pulling a freight train of 150 cars, or over a mile in length.

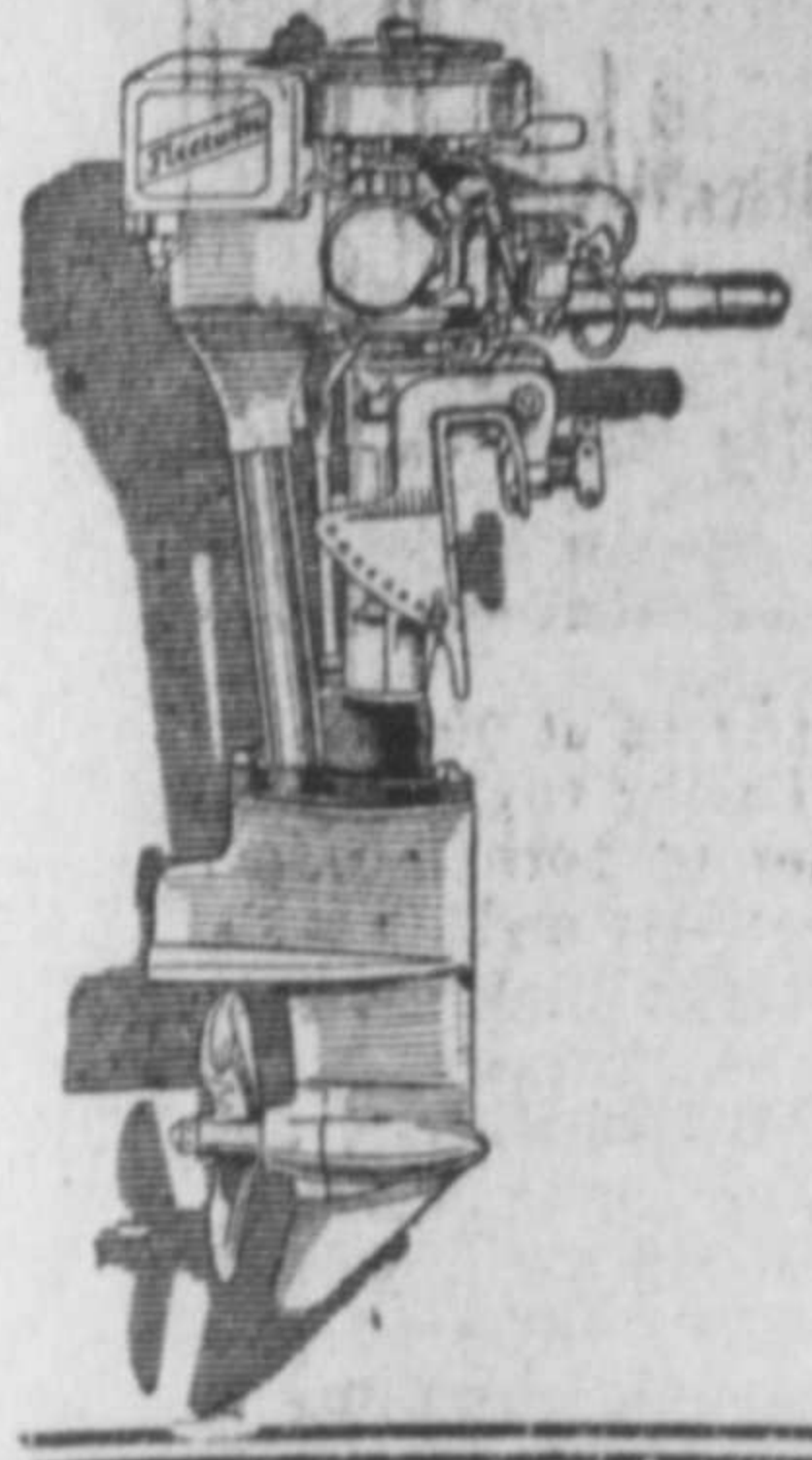

Thomas Cliff in command, was here from 7:30 to 8:30 yesterday morning on her way from Vancouver to Skagway with a cargo of 1600 tons of freight including lumber, coal, gasoline, piling and general. It is the first of three voyages the Nootka will make. She has taken the place in the C.P.R. steamship service of the veteran freighter Princess Ena, which has been withdrawn from service and is being offered for sale by the company.

Formerly operated on the Great Lakes, the Nootka arrived on this coast three or four years ago, and has been mainly engaged in freighting from the West Coast of Vancouver Island. She was built at Port Arthur in 1919. The vessel is 251 feet three inches long 43 feet, 9 inches beam and 20 feet, 3 inches deep. Her gross tonnage is 2089 and net 1201.

HOLLYWOOD, March 23:—Ben Lyon, husband of Bebe Daniels, moving picture actress, and himself a noted screen star, has received a threatening letter, accompanied with a demand for money. The police are endeavoring to trace the source of the letter.

FREEING OF AL CAPONE

United States Authorities Seeking to Offset Efforts of Chicago Gangland

WASHINGTON, D.C., March 23:—Governmental authorities are devising secret plans to offset a movement which is designed to prevent Al Capone, Chicago gangster leader, from having to enter Leavenworth Penitentiary to start serving an 11-year term of imprisonment for income tax law evasion.

The Senate judicial committee has been advised that criminal organizations of Chicago are attempting to obtain Capone's freedom by gaining control of public officials.

Capone is being held in Cook County jail pending decision in his appeal proceedings which have so far failed.

DEATH LIST IN TORNADO

No Less Than 350 Lives Taken By Storm in Alabama—Thousands in Hospitals and Homeless

SHANGHAI, March 23:—There are 800,000 less people in Shanghai today than when the recent hostilities commenced. Thousands of Chinese refugees, who fled to the interior, have not yet returned.
