NEW REGULATIONS FOR FISHERIES

RELIEF MATTERS AFFECTING THIS PROVINCE EXPLAINED

Export of Sockeyes To Be Allowed Each Year After Mid-September

Ogden Channel is Made Seining Area—Provision Made to Prevent Molestation of Fish by Stoning, Shooting, Clubbing and Such Practices

OTTAWA, Feb. 11:-Under amendments to the British Columbia coast fisheries regulations approved by orderin-council this week, the export of fresh sockeye salmon from the province will be permissible after September 15 of each year. The amendment is designed to benefit the salmon fishermen of the Fraser River area.

A further amendment extends northward to Seymour Narrows and Yucalta Rapids the area on the east coast of Vancouver Island where there is an annual closed season for blueback trolling.

New amendments also prohibit the molestation of fish in streams by stoning, shooting, clubbing or other means.



SMALLPOX

School Board to Ask Mayor and Medical Health Officer to Take Preventative Steps

At the suggestion of Trustee D. C. Schubert, the school board, at its meeting last night, decided to take up with the mayor and medical health officer the advisability of taking measures to prevent outbreak in Prince Rupert of smallpox which was said to be epidemic in Vancouver.

Mr. Schubert stated that Victoria and other points in the south had already taken steps to safeguard against outbreak of the malady. In Victoria people were not allowed to land unless they could show that they had been vaccinated within two years. Mr. Schubert explained that he was not suggesting inoculation of children but merely felt that some measures of safeguard Thursday, Feb. 11, 1932 might be taken to prevent an outbreak of the disease in Prince Rupert which so far was free from it.




