TO PROBE WOODBINE

Affairs of Portland Canal Mining Company Expected to Come to Head This Month

Affairs of the Woodbine Gold Mining Co. Ltd are expected to be brought to a head this month on the return to the coast of Hugh McGuire, the managing director, who has been in Toronto in connection with the deal with Missouri Ridge Gold Mines Ltd, which proposes to take over Woodbine properties in the Portland Canal district on a share agreement between the shareholders of the two companies.

Some shareholders of Woodbine have protested to the secretary of state and are seeking an investigation of Woodbine affairs for several years back. The secretary of state will require guarantees of costs before selecting an inspector to conduct an investigation.

Demonstrations In Italy Follow Murder Attempt

People of Rome Give Thanks That Life of Il Duce is Again Spared

ROME, June 7.—Street demonstrations took place in different parts of the city yesterday following the interception of the attempt on the life of Premier Mussolini. Students cheered and sang and demanded justice. The people gave thanks that the life of Il Duce had again been spared.

It is expected that the would-be assassin will be tried and executed. The culprit, when questioned, stated that he wanted to get rid of Mussolini in order to pave the way for an Italian republic.

ALL HOPE GIVEN UP

Stanislaus Hausner is Believed to Have Perished on Ocean Flight

NEW YORK, June 7.—Virtually all hope has been abandoned for the safety of Stanislaus Hausner, young Polish-American aviator, now overdue two days on a projected flight from New York to Warsaw. His wife alone holds hope that he may be safe in some isolated spot.

KILLED IN APARTMENT

Eleven Dead and Twelve Missing Following Disastrous Fire and Explosion

CLEVELAND, June 7.—Eleven persons are known to be dead and 12 are missing following an explosion and fire which swept a downtown apartment early today.

APPOINTED ASSESSOR

D. J. Matheson, City Treasurer, to Again Act This Year

After a discussion of some length, the city council decided last night to re-appoint City Treasurer D. J. Matheson as assessor for 1933. If Mr. Matheson desires expert assistance in connection with the making of assessments, more particularly on improvements, it is probable that he will be given it.

Ald. Casey urged the advisability of going outside of the City Hall staff for an assessor this year so that an independent assessment might be made on the basis of the real values of land and buildings all of which would involve a great deal of work.

Ald. Collart, who moved the appointment of Mr. Matheson, felt that Mr. Matheson, with the assistance of the city engineer in the valuation of buildings, should be able to carry out the work. This would simplify matters and would obviate the spending of additional money in a year like the present when it could ill be spared.

Ald. Pillsbury questioned if the city engineer would have much time to give to the work of assessments. He believed that some outside assistance would be required.

Ald. Macdonald and Ald. Linzey thought that an equitable assessment as possible should be made but did not think that the city could afford the heavy fees that might be required by engaging an expert. If the city engineer were relieved of some of the clerical duties of his department, possibly he would be able to assist in the valuations.

Many Buildings

City Engineer Good stated that there were approximately 1600 buildings which would have to be inspected. To make the proper valuations, it would be necessary to have full time services.

If the city could not afford to do the job right, Ald. Rudderham felt that it would be as well to leave matters as they stood. He proposed that, if possible, Mr. Matheson be provided with an assistant.

Ald. Collart's motion that Mr. Matheson be re-appointed was seconded by Ald. McCutchen who did not think it should be necessary to go beyond the city hall staff to have the assessment work done.

After some further discussion, the motion re-appointing Mr. Matheson was passed, the understanding being that the question of assistance would be taken up later.

DOUKS ARE SENT DOWN

Seventy-Three More Draw Three Years' Imprisonment From Nelson Magistrate

NELSON, June 7.—Seven adult Doukhobors, who were arrested on Sunday in the nude at Thrums, are now in jail here along with eight children.

On Saturday Magistrate John Cartmel sentenced 73 Doukhobors, who had pleaded guilty to a nude display a week ago, to three years' imprisonment each.

WILL MEET DE VALERA

Irish Free State President Asks For Conference on Subject of Oath of Allegiance

LONDON, June 7.—The British and Irish Free State governments are to confer over the vexed question of the Free State's bill to abolish the oath of allegiance to the King and its relation to negotiations at the Imperial economic conference at Ottawa.

Rt. Hon. J. H. Thomas, Secretary for the Dominions, and Lord Hailsham, Secretary for War, left last night for Dublin where today they will confer with President Eamonn de Valera at the latter's invitation.

Subsequently de Valera will come to London and conversations will be resumed here Friday.

MEMBER OF HOUSE DIES

Thomas McMillan, Liberal Representative of South Huron, is Killed By Horse

STRATFORD, Ont., June 7.—Thomas C. McMillan, Liberal member of the House of Commons for Huron South since 1925, died in hospital here today from injuries suffered late yesterday when he was crushed by a horse in a stable at his home. He was 68 years of age.

Entering the House of Commons for the first time in 1925, after having been an unsuccessful candidate in 1921, the late Mr. McMillan was re-elected with increasing majorities in 1926 and 1930. He was a retiring but popular member of the House of Commons.

Four Flying Boats Leave 'Peg For Pas

Four Detroit flying boats, which were originally reported to be on their way to the Wolf Lake gold fields in the Southern Yukon, instead of flying west, turned north from Winnipeg a few days ago and flew to The Pas. It is understood that the machines may be coming west later to be used in connection with the investigation of reported gold finds on Scurvy Creek.

ROAD WORK REQUESTED

City Council Invites Minister of Public Works to Come Here

The city council decided last night to again request the provincial government to resume relief work on the Skeena River highway here, coupling with the request an invitation to Hon. R. W. Bruhn, minister of public works, to come here at an early date and meet the council to discuss the situation.

The matter came up with the reading of a letter from the minister of public works in reply to a request made by the council that men at present being kept in the relief camp be permitted to work out their board, lodging, clothes and cash allowance at the rate of 50c per hour. The minister stated that the request involved a matter of policy and had been referred to the unemployment relief committee of the government.

Ald. Macdonald offered the suggestion that the government be asked to resume the work here and that the minister be invited to visit the city.

Mayor Orme stated that he had already personally invited Mr. Bruhn to come here and that he had said he would but had not stated definitely when.

Sentence Upon Woman Suspended

Mrs. Marchelton, Who Threatened Policemen With Knife, Given Warning By Judge Young

Sentence on Mrs. Grace Marchelton, who pleaded guilty to a charge of attempted assault with intent to cause grievous bodily harm, was suspended for one year by Judge F. McB. Young in County Court yesterday afternoon. The charge arose out of an incident on Saturday night when Mrs. Marchelton visited the city police station and threatened the officers there with a butcher knife. The judge warned the woman and explained that the officers had been acting within their duties by summoning her into police court if she failed to send her child to school.

W. E. Fisher acted as crown counsel and W. O. Fulton appeared for Mrs. Marchelton.

Timbermen of Province Making Efforts to Win Japan-China Trade

Would Restore Large Market Across Pacific Which Was Formerly Enjoyed—Object is to Enlarge Sale of Lower Grades

VICTORIA, June 7.—The possibility of British Columbia sending a lumber trade delegation to the Orient with the object of enlarging the sale of lower grades of lumber from the Pacific Coast to China and Japan is under consideration by the timbermen of the province, according to an announcement made by Hon. Nelson S. Lougheed, minister of lands. British Columbia some years ago enjoyed a large market for lumber in the Orient but of recent years it has been falling off seriously.

TERMS OF ALDERMEN

City Council Passes Resolution Requesting Option For Municipalities

The city council, by majority vote last night, adopted a proposal of Ald. Casey that a resolution be submitted to the Union of British Columbia Municipalities at its annual convention in Nelson late this month requesting the provincial government to give the option to municipalities to decide whether their aldermen shall sit for one or two-year terms. At present the two-year term is set by provincial statute and the municipalities have no option in the matter.

In advancing his resolution asking for option for the municipalities, Ald. Casey expressed preference for the one-year term which he believed was favored by the majority of the community. He felt that better service was given under the one-year term system. Aldermen were liable "to go to seed" if permitted to sit for two terms without appealing to the people.

Ald. Pillsbury and Ald. Rudderham favored Ald. Casey's resolution, believing that the people should have the right to decide the duration of the term.

Ald. Collart and Ald. Macdonald spoke in favor of the two-year term. In the first year new aldermen gained experience which made them possibly more valuable in the second year. The plan also insured that at least half of the members of the council would be trained to their civic duties. Ald. Collart thought that the council would be (Continued on Page Four)

Big American Liner Is Due Here Friday

Making her first call of the season at this port, the Admiral Line steamer Dorothy Alexander, which is being operated on a special tourist excursion service to Alaska during the summer, is due to arrive here Friday morning from Alaska and, after a couple of hours' stay, will sail for Victoria and Seattle. The vessel is due at 9 a.m. but, later in the summer, will arrive here at 7 a.m.

The Dorothy Alexander is scheduled to make calls here on the mornings of June 10 and 20, July 11 and 22, August 1, 12 and 22 and September 2. She will be the only vessel of her line to make scheduled calls here this summer and will come here southbound from Alaska on each voyage.

McConnell Creek Ground is Frozen; Cannot Wash Yet

PRINCE GEORGE, June 7.—H. K. Henry, deputy mining recorder, who arrived here a few days ago from McConnell Creek, says that there is no water yet for washing gold there and the ground remains frozen. The discovery of the past winter is situated at an elevation of 4800 feet and it is too early yet to pass judgment upon the possibilities of the area. About fifteen men are at present on the creek.

Brazil and Argentina will carry South America's pennants into the 1932 Olympic Games in 10 of the 14 classes of competition. The two countries, joined perhaps by a rowing team from Uruguay, will have nearly 100 men at Los Angeles, and in the contingent are a handful of track competitors with real possibilities for putting South America on the Olympic map.

Age of the Latin-Americans is Juan Carlos Zabala, Argentine youngster, who, competing in his first Olympic, figures to be one-two-three in the marathon run. He has covered the conventional route of more than 26 miles in two hours, 19 seconds. Another Argentine, Alberto Zorilla, must be reckoned with in any summation of swimming prospects, for he won at Amsterdam the 100-metre free style event. He has trained for every event up to and including 400 metres.

Brazil has a pole vaulter, Lurdo Castro, who can do better than 13 feet five inches and holds the South American title, at a fraction better than that height. The Argentine Hector Berra, an all-round athlete, will compete for the Olympic pentathlon crown; he already holds the continental decathlon title.

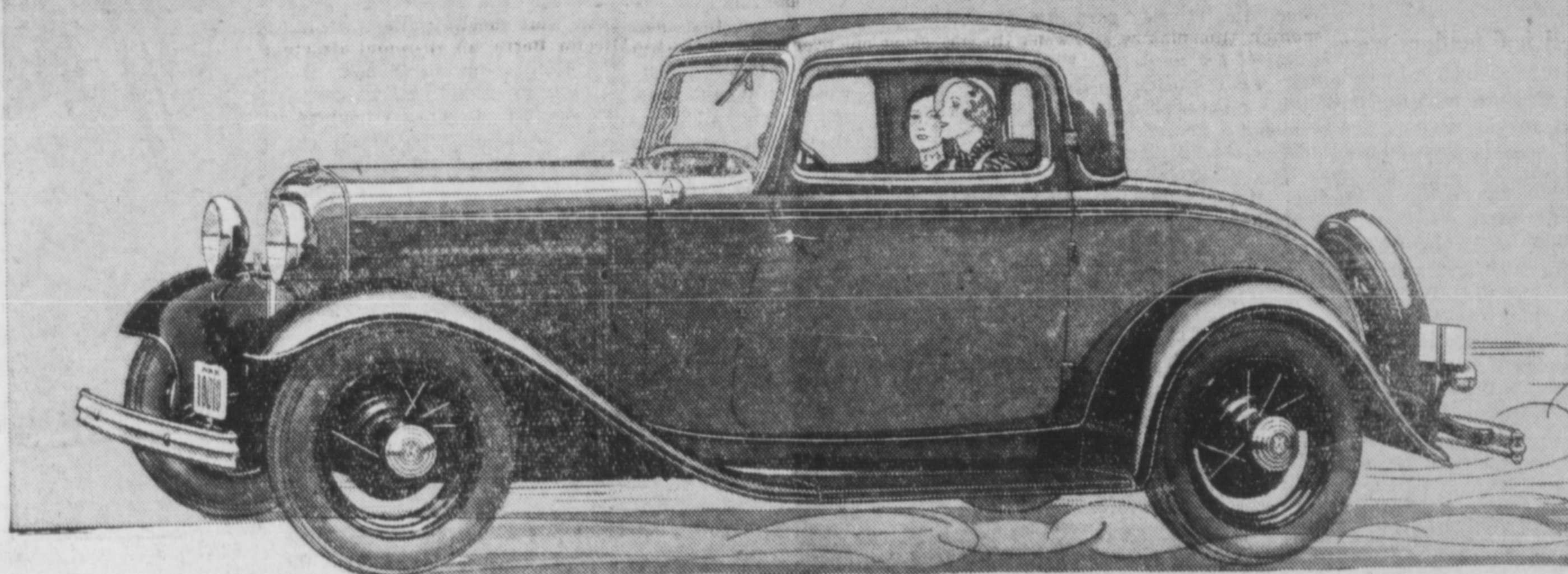

LOST LIFE IN FINLAY RIVER

Two Men Arrive in Prince George Reporting Drowning of Fred Firth While Coming Out

PRINCE GEORGE, June 7.—H. K. Henry of Camrose, Alta., deputy mining recorder at McConnell Creek, and Mike Miller of Grimshaw, Alta., have arrived here from the McConnell Creek country, reporting the drowning of their companion, Fred Firth of Edmonton, in the Finlay River near Fort Graham while the party was coming out. The fatality occurred on May 22 and Firth's body was not recovered.

The three men were sent out

from McConnell Creek on account of provisions running short for a crew of men to which they belonged. They had rafted down to the confluence of the Ingenka and Finlay Rivers but on the latter river they ran into a log jam. Henry and Miller were able to jump clear but Firth went in the water and was never seen again.

MID-SEASON GARDENING HINTS

Dahlias

Dahlias rank with gladioli as the most popular plant grown from tender tubers, corms, etc. They are particularly desirable in the perennial border where they may be used in any location calling for tall upright plants.

Plant dahlias at any time after the soil has become warm up to July 1. Do not make the mistake of placing dahlias too close together. They make heavy demands on soil moisture and on plant food. They will not thrive in shade. Preferably place them about four feet apart.

Prepare the soil to a depth of at least ten inches. Apply a complete plant food at the rate of four pounds per hundred square feet and work it into the soil. It is best if part of the plant food is worked into the soil that is placed around the tuber. Set the tubers about six inches deep.

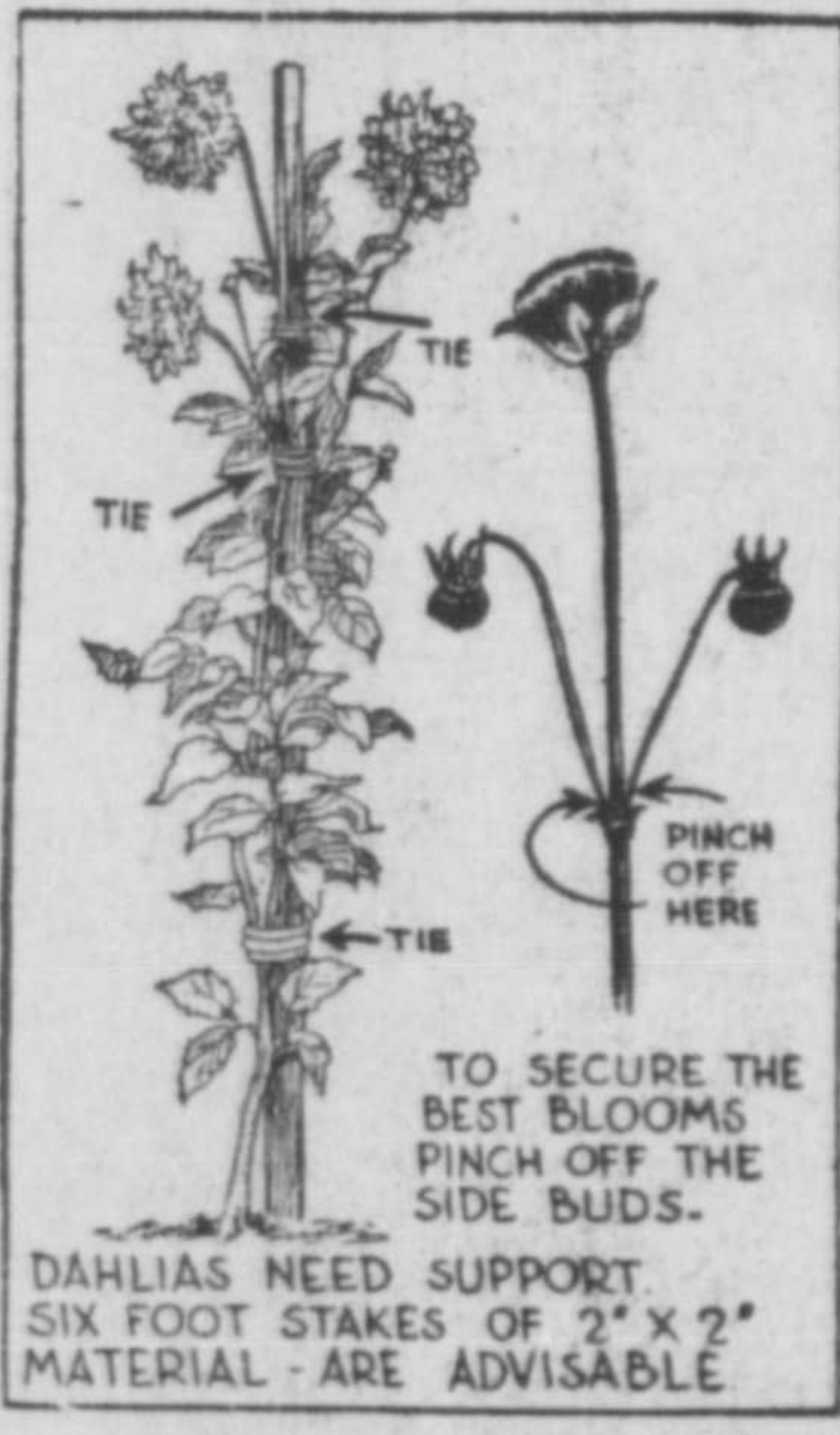
Cultivate often until the buds appear, to maintain a good mulch. After the buds appear, care must be taken to give only very shallow and light cultivation, or the new tubers will be injured.

To secure best blooms, it is advisable to permit only the most hardy shoot to remain, and when this is three or four joints above the ground, pinch out the top, which causes the plant to branch out. Leave the end bud on each branch, but remove the side buds that appear at each set of leaves.

Six to eight weeks after planting apply plant food about the plant at the rate of four pounds per hundred square feet.

Dig dahlia tubers before the soil freezes. Clean them well and store in shallow boxes of sand in a cool place where they will not freeze.

Garden Hints

Start giving the garden commercial fertilizer; light dressings are often the best system.

Roses, currant bushes and snow balls are favorite nurseries' plant life. Clean them with nicotine sprays and you will save a lot of work in the garden.

Ants are a common garden pest. Kill them with carbon bisulphide or some of the proprietary anticides before their burrows wreck valuable plants.

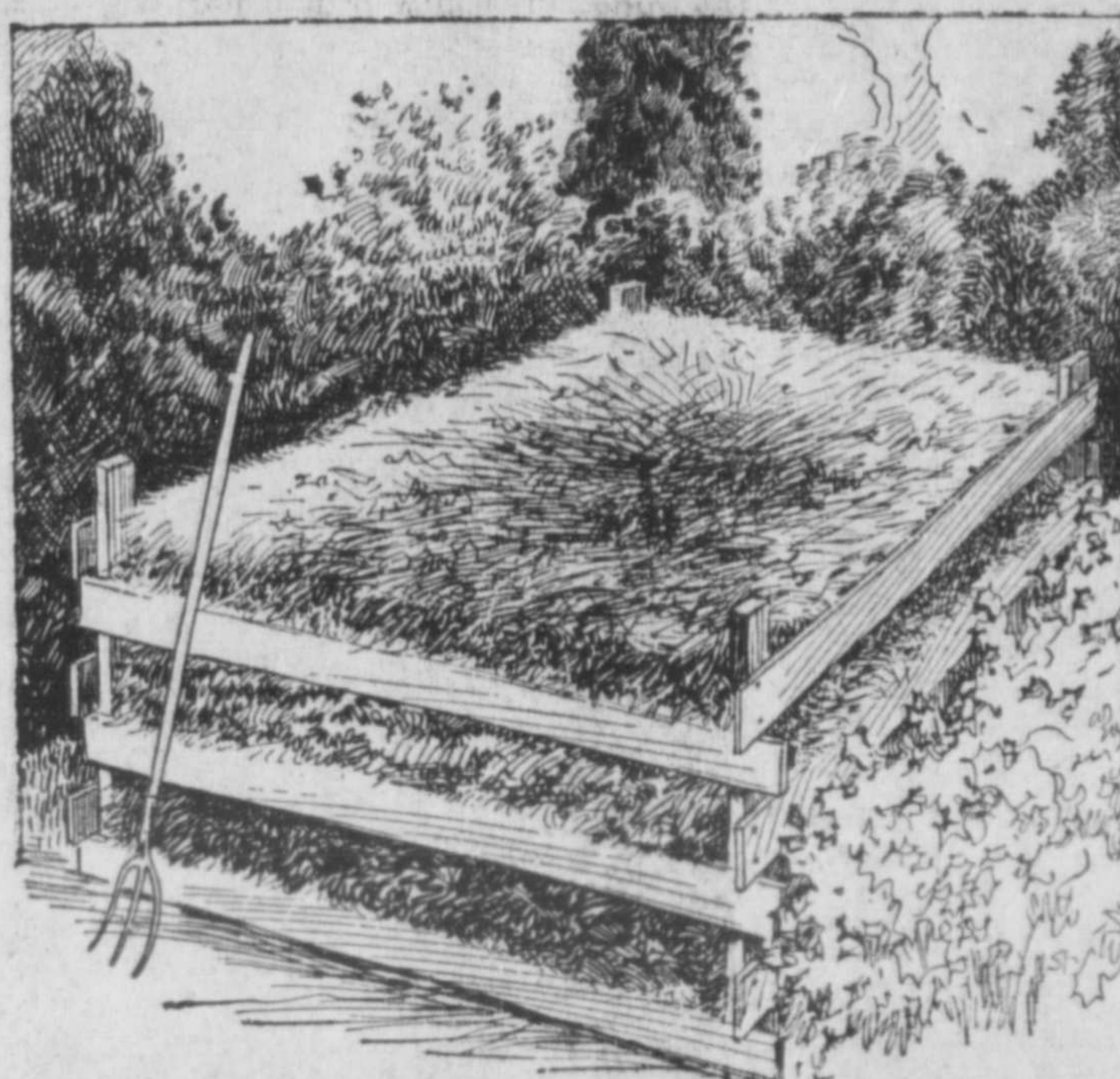
Thin your candytuft if you want good spikes and plenty of bloom. It won't give good spikes if it is crowded.

A dressing of wood ashes about the asters will be helpful. Sprinkle it on the cucumbers to drive away bugs and a rain will wash it into the soil as fertilizer.

Don not let dandelions go to seed on the lawn. It merely means thousands more dandelions. Jerk the blossoms off with a rake if you can do no more. Ask in dandelion winemakers to clear the lawn.

The Compost Pile

Humus is important because it adds greatly to the water-holding capacity of sandy soils and makes clay soils more workable. About the average home there is sufficient plant material such as leaves and grass clippings to make a compost pile which would supply all of the humus that can be used advantageously about the home.

Place the compost pile in a secluded corner. Shrubs may be used to shield it from view. The plant material to be decomposed should be put down in layers, with thin layers of soil between. A few handfuls of lime and complete plant-food should be sprinkled in the plant material as it is put on the piles. A small quantity of decayed material or manure scattered through the pile will hasten decay. The compost pile should not be allowed to dry out.

Annuals For Window and Porch Boxes

As warm weather approaches the question of porch and window boxes arises. What shall be put in them this year? For bloom, the answer is annuals. For the most and continuous bloom petunias are the most satisfying. The small flowered forms such as Rosy Morn, Rose of Heaven, Heavenly Blue and others cover themselves with a sheet of color from June till killing freezes. They need only sun and ordinary attention in the way of being supplied with moisture to flourish.

Of larger bloom and more trailing habit that makes them ideal to droop over the sides of boxes are the balcony type petunias in varying colors. The old fashioned double petunia is an excellent window box plant also. In fact almost any of the petunias are ideal material.

For prim formal effect, the dwarf double French marigolds and the miniature zinnias give fine effect, the regular little bushes being studded with bloom all summer. For the edge of the box for drapery sweet alyssum or trailing lobelias will fill the bill excellently.

For shaded boxes, tuberous begonias give a wonderful show and the fancy leaved caladiums give a beautiful display of color. For foliage effect in shady boxes nothing is finer than Boston ferns. For vines of the trailing type nothing takes the place of the trailing vincas.

The new double yellow nasturtium is an ideal sunny window box plant, according to reports, as it is semi-trailing in habit, will droop over the edge of the box and give a wealth of golden bloom all summer. An old-fashioned annual usually

grown as a house plant which is fine material for a shady box is the minulus or monkey flower. This must be started indoors ahead of time as the seed is powder like and needs careful handling. In vines of sufficiently slender growth and of trailing habit the maundias and thunbergias offer good material.

The annuals should be started at once to be of good size for transplanting when you get around to putting out the window and porch boxes. Any annual of spreading habit makes good window box material.

Avoid annuals which make too erect growth for this purpose. No great height is desired in window box plants.

Dandelions

Lawns may be kept dandelion-free, if seeded in an area where there are no roots of old dandelion plants remaining in the soil and if the grass is kept in a vigorous condition.

Young dandelion plants get started in bare and thin areas in the lawn. When one examines small dandelion plants, it is evident that such plants cannot make a start if a thick mat of grass is growing about them.

The important steps in maintaining a vigorous stand of grass that will prevent the inroad of weeds and will tend to crowd out those already in the lawn are as follows:

1. Feed the lawn at regular intervals with a complete plant food.
2. Water the lawn whenever the soil becomes dry. Soak it thoroughly and do not water again until the need becomes evident.
3. Cut grass regularly. Do not cut the grass closer than one and one-half inches from the soil surface and do not allow it to become more than three inches in height.

Feeding encourages dandelions to grow more upright. In this position they are cut each time the lawn is mowed. Cutting greatly reduces their vigor, while it encourages the grass. This difference is due to the difference in method of growth. The growing area of the grass blade is

located at the base and is not removed when the lawn is mowed.

On lawns relatively free of dandelions it is best to remove the dandelion plants with a sharp implement such as an asparagus knife. If the dandelion root is cut at a depth of five inches it will not produce new growth. When it is cut at this depth by inserting an asparagus knife under it and lifting the dandelion plant as well as a portion of the sod, the entire root of the dandelion is often pulled from the soil. The small area of sod should then be replaced.

SPLITTING UP JOBS

City Council Discusses Ways and Means of Spanning Out Employment

In answer to a question by Ald. Casey, it was intimated by the chairman of the board of works and utilities committee at last night's council meeting that those departments had gone as far as it was deemed advisable in the matter of "splitting up" jobs in order to provide additional employment. Ald. Casey still felt that there were points where the board of works might further extend this principle under the existing emergency so far as employment is concerned.

In the matter of taking on men for the jobs being split up, the council expressed itself as being in favor of giving work as far as possible to ratepayers who had not gone on direct relief but who, being out of work, would need some financial assistance in meeting their taxes. No hard and fast rule was, however, set down, this being left in the hands of the public works department.

NEW PLANE IS VISITOR

Pilot James Dodson Here With Savoy-Marchetti Amphibian

James Dodson of Seattle, who is on an aerial tour of Alaska with his Savoy-Marchetti amphibian flying boat, arrived here at 11 o'clock this morning from Ketchikan and is returning north this afternoon. During its stay here, the plane is tied up at the hangar of the Northern B. C. Airways.

Pilot Dodson came north from Seattle two or three weeks ago and has been as far up the coast as Wrangell. He is not engaged in commercial work but it is merely a pleasure flight. Accompanying Dodson is his mechanic, Burras Smith.

This is the first Savoy-Marchetti plane to visit Prince Rupert. The ship was built especially to participate in national aeronautical races at Los Angeles two years ago. It is equipped with a 100 h.p. Kinner engine.

Pilot Dodson was formerly with the Pioneer Airways at Ketchikan and is well known here. He was the pilot of a Stinson Detroit plane which crashed last year with a fishing party on a lake near Ketchikan, Steve Selig being killed at the time.

Repairs to the Boston Cafe Block, damaged by fire three weeks ago, have been commenced by Mitchell & Currie, contractors. There is no word yet as to what will be done with the Phye building which was damaged at the same time.
