## RECIPROCITY BILL PASSES THE SENATE COMMITTEE

### WHICH WILL BE THE FIRST GOVT. WHARF OR G.T.P. DOCK?

**President Hays Does Not Presume to Criticize the Government, But is Inclined to Put His Money on His Own Horse---Is Pleased With His Trip Over the New Line Which Will be Open to the Public in a Few Days Now---Had Speedy Run**

"Nothing but the Railway Board's permit is needed now," said President Hays just off the special train which whirled him and his party eastwards along the steel yesterday. "I know how anxious the public have been to have a passenger service started on the G. T. P. along the Skeena, and I am glad that we can promise this a few days now."

**Line in Good Shape**  
 Mr. Hays was well pleased with the progress of the steel under General Superintendent Mehan. The track for the first 100 miles is in excellent shape for comfortable travelling.

"You saw us leave at eight a.m.," said Mr. Hays, "and as you know we have arrived back this evening at about nine o'clock. I think we made a very speedy trip showing the line to be in good order for the swift handling of trains."

**Visited Govt. Dock**

On Wednesday afternoon Mr. Hays paid a visit to the Government Wharf at the foot of McBride street. Asked what he thought of that great enterprise now in full swing, the president of the road said: "Well, I see they have a great number of very fine piles lying ready to be placed, and I saw that several were in position. But they seem to be getting on rather slowly. I suppose they are having a hard

problem to get a place for every pile and every pile in its place." "As a man accustomed to seeing construction work done on a large scale, how do you think they are getting along with the wharf, Mr. Hays?" "Well, of course it's not for me to criticise," remarked Mr. Hays with a twinkle in his eye, "but they seem to be getting on rather slowly. Of course they have difficulties. These great piles are tremendously hard to handle I understand."

**Race the Dry Dock**

"Which do you think will be ready first, Mr. Hays, the Government wharf or the Grand Trunk dry dock?"

"Now that's rather a question," said Mr. Hays with a decided smile. "I shouldn't venture to try and show the Government how to do their work but do you know I rather fancy we shall give that Government wharf quite a run for its money when we get our dry dock going ahead. The wharf has had a long start but if it is to be complete before our dock it will have to go some."

It has been organized with a capital of \$10,000,000. Sir Henry Pellitier is chairman. The site of the new wharves and dry dock will be at Sydney, N. S. It is expected that the company will tender for vessels for the Canadian navy.

### RECIPROCITY UP AT WASHINGTON

**Bill Passes Senate Committee by 10 to 4 with Root's Amendment Added.**

(Canadian Press Despatch) Washington, June 9.—Today the Canadian reciprocity bill was declared ready for consideration by the United States Senate. The Finance committee voted today 10 to 4 to report the bill next Tuesday without any recommendation, and with Senator Root's amendment added to the effect that wood pulp, paper and mill board shall not be admitted free of duty to the United States from Canada until these products are permitted free of duty from this country into every Province of Canada.

The opponents of the measure are hoping to divide the Senate on the pulp wood amendment.

### CITY SURRENDERS FIGHT TO KEEP THE BAYS OPEN

**Ald Smith Dictates a Letter to the Ottawa Counsel, Ordering That the City's Opposition be Withdrawn from the Railway Board --No Harbors Will be Left for the Small Craft---All are included in Phrase "From Mile 0 Westerly."**

"I am instructed by the City Council of the City of Prince Rupert to inform you that the City of Prince Rupert does not intend to take any further steps to push the protest filed by the City against the Grand Trunk Pacific Railway Company's application for the approval of their plans for railway extension from Mile 0 westerly."

Above is the letter dictated by Alderman Smith to the City Clerk to be forwarded to the Minister of Railways at Ottawa Alderman Smith's motion that this letter be sent, was seconded by Alderman Clayton, and carried by the council. Not without a struggle, however.

#### Battle for Bays

Three aldermen did make a stand for the preservation to Prince Rupert of harbors for the "mosquito fleet." They were Alderman Newton, Alderman Douglas, and Alderman Hilditch. From Hays Creek to Seal Cove the battle raged. One by one the defenders of the bays gave way. Alderman Newton stood firm for a spell. Alderman Hilditch put up a vigorous fight, and Alderman Douglas got in a whack or two. But with skillful word play D'Arcy Tate pursued the defenders, and shaken in determination by the discouragements of the City Solicitor the trio relinquished their stand.

#### Hays Creek Closed

In view of the dry dock and other works to go ahead at Hays Creek the bay there must be closed. Alderman Newton wanted to know how the water was to get out. Mr. D'Arcy Tate said a culvert was planned. It would be impossible, he told Alderman Newton to make this culvert big enough to let small craft through.

Cow Bay and Cameron Cove it was agreed by the council would have to be filled up. But the three aldermen mentioned put up a good fight to save Seal Cove. Mr. D'Arcy Tate said that Seal Cove was to be left open meantime.

**"No Further Steps"**  
 "The use of the phrase 'no further steps' shuts us off altogether from protesting," said Alderman Hilditch.

"You can protest again," said City Solicitor Peters.

"We are not proposing any development at Seal Cove at present," said Mr. D'Arcy Tate. "When we do, we will send the plans intended to be filed and you can protest again."

"We agree that Cow Bay and Hays Creek must be filled up," said Alderman Hilditch, "but we want Seal Cove."

"I object to a protest being lodged against plans which are not filed," said Mr. Tate. "There is time enough for a protest when the plans are filed."

The City Solicitor to Alderman Hilditch. "You have no right to protest against plans which are not filed. That will prevent you from protesting afterwards if you want to."

Mr. D'Arcy Tate: "If we intend further development we submit plans before filing. We are bound to do so by the Railways Act."

Alderman Hilditch: "It is no use filing plans after the work has been done, and the places are filled up."

The City Solicitor: "I think President Hays will agree to write me a letter to the effect that these plans will be filed."

Mr. Hays: "Certainly. In other words to the effect that I will abide by the law."

**Remove Protest so Far**  
 "Might we not simply agree to remove the protest to works

as far as Overlook street?" said Alderman Newton.

"No," replied Mr. D'Arcy Tate, "that would leave a document on file with the Minister of Railways which is a protest. That is what we want to get rid of. If you want to protest again next week you can do it."

Mayor Manson: "What would be wrong with withdrawing the present protest, and then writing next week saying we desired to be communicated with should the Railway Company want to carry on development at Seal Cove?"

Alderman Douglas: "But Seal Cove is almost closed up already."

Alderman Smith: "Seventy-five feet of it is left open."

Alderman Hilditch: "Might I ask Mr. Hays if he has any intention of closing up this opening?"

Mr. Hays: "Not the slightest, Mr. Hilditch. You have the idea that you are giving away rights that you may need later. This you cannot possibly do because we are bound by law to supply you with plans before we go on with future development."

The motion was carried after Mr. Hays had suggested that he should write a letter to the city council to the effect that he would do no development until plans were submitted to the city council. The letter was filed by the City Clerk.

Alderman Clayton: "In other words Mr. Hays, you will write a letter agreeing to keep the law."

### LONDON BIRBECK BANK SUSPENDS ITS PAYMENTS

**Financial Troubles Have Dogged Its Footsteps Since the Run Made on It Last Fall—Deficiency May Come up to \$3,750,000—Official Receiver is Now in Charge**

(Canadian Press Despatch) London, June 9.—The Birbeck Bank, one of the older British financial institutions with head offices in High Holborn has suspended payment, and an official receiver is now in charge.

Adverse rumors have caused the present troubles. Last fall these rumors were afloat, and a run was made on the bank which the directors met and survived. Since then repeated rumors of the bank's difficulties have caused it to announce a suspension.

**\$1,875,000 Short**  
 The directors in a statement announce that the deficiencies are \$1,875,000 on a total liability of \$34,380,000, but the authorities who are at work on the books think the total deficiency will total nearer \$3,750,000.

### CAPTAIN SEARS IS ACQUITTED

**Jury After Five Minutes Bring in a Verdict of Not Guilty of Manslaughter Charge.**

(Canadian Press Despatch) Victoria, June 9.—After being out but five minutes, the jury which has heard the case of Captain Sears charged with manslaughter, brought in a verdict of not guilty.

Sears was master of the steamer Iroquois, which was wrecked off Sidney harbor on April 10th. The lives of twenty-five passengers were lost. The charge was made that Sears left for the shore without doing all he could to save the passengers. He was arrested and charged with manslaughter.

### IN THREE MONTHS—FROM WHEN?

It has been understood that the agreement made with the Grand Trunk Pacific officials, provided for the starting of work at machine shops, round house, station building, etc., within three months. That has been the chief consideration to merchants and workmen anxious for a railway payroll in the city.

But this is what the agreement says:  
**CLAUSE 8.**—"The Railway company will within a period of three months from the date of ratification of this agreement by the Legislature, commence the erection of its works within the city limits, consisting, etc."  
**CLAUSE 9.**—"The Townsite Co. will, within a period of two years from the date of ratification of this agreement by the Legislature, commence the erection of a first class hotel, etc."  
**CLAUSE 14.**—"The parties . . . doing all things necessary to obtain such ratification at the NEXT SESSION OF THE SAID LEGISLATURE."  
 The next session of the said Legislature will be FEBRUARY and MARCH 1912.

**DECORATIVE PILLOW SQUARES**  
Pretty Plan that is Neat and Easy to Carry Out

The smartest and easiest finish for decorative pillows is made by cutting the cover two inches and a quarter larger on all sides and a quarter larger on all sides of the pillow. Have two pieces the same size and turn in a quarter of an inch all around.

Sew the two pieces together back to back, putting the line of sewing on the edge, leaving an opening on one side for the pillow. Now run an inner square to form a two inch border to the cover. If the pillow is not well stuffed it will be necessary to make this square an inch and a half smaller than the pillow to give it fullness.

The inner square may have the stitching turned in sharp corners, but an easier way and holding the material firmer is to run the lines from edge to edge of cover in each direction, forming small stitched squares at the four corners.

George E. Lerner, the undefeated champion walker of the world from one to ten miles, got his first glimpse of Toronto the other day.

George Goulding, the Canadian walking champion, who will be Lerner's opponent, was one of the first to grasp the Englishman's hand.

Sam Langford of Boston and Tony Caponi of Chicago, have been matched to fight 15 rounds in Winnipeg on June 15.

Battling Nelson and Charles Neary both figure that they can come back, and have signed to box in Milwaukee July 4.

Jim Flynn has decided to go on the stage. Jim has been a good old trial horse, and is entitled to a little easy money.

Jake Schaeffer, Jr., son of the late billiard "wizard," gained a lead of 75 points over Marcus Catton, son of the late William Catton, in the first block of a 600-point match at 18.2 the other night. Young Schaeffer counted 200 points and averaged 7 11-22, while Catton counted 125 points and averaged 4 17-27.

Jim Flynn, the Pueblo fireman, who knocked into prominence by knocking out Al Kauffman recently at Kansas City, is to be the next American fighter to go abroad for ring honors. His opponent is to be Sam McVey, the colored fighter. T. S. Andrews, American representative for Hugh McIntosh, has received a cable instructing him to sign up Flynn for a 20-round match at Paris, June 24. McVey recently met Sam Langford in Paris.

Captain W. E. Forbes, of the 73rd N. B. Regiment, a member of the Canadian Birdy team, secretary of the D. R. A., that he is unable to go to England. Color Sergeant C. M. Hodson, 103rd Regiment, Calgary, will take his place on the team. It is rumored that there is a strong possibility that Sergeant C. W. Russell, G. C. F. G., may also be unable to take the trip.

The Vancouver Jockey Club has announced as one of the features of opening day, Saturday, June 10, the first steeplechase race ever run at Minoru Park. It will be known as the Inaugural Steeplechase and will be at a distance of two and a quarter miles over fourteen jumps. The race will be confined to horses owned by members of recognized hunt clubs and will be the forerunner of a regular series of cross-country events. The course is practically completed now and but little work is required to put the jumps in first class condition. About a dozen starters are expected.
