CLAUSE 8.—"The Railway company will within a period of three months from the date of ratification of this agreement by the Legislature, commence the erection of its works within the city limits, consisting, etc."

CLAUSE 9.—"The Townsite Co. will, within a period of two years from the date of ratification of this agreement by the Legislature, commence the erection of a first class hotel, etc."

CLAUSE 14.—"The parties . . . doing all things necessary to obtain such ratification at the NEXT SESSION OF THE SAID LEGISLATURE." The next session of the said Legislature will be February and March 1912.

### AN ANALYSIS OF THE AGREEMENT

This latest agreement, to which Mr. Charles M. Hays has given his assent, is even more lavish towards the company than the last.
