JIM HILL GETS A CHARTER FOR ANOTHER BRANCH

GERMAN AVIATORS FALL SIX THOUSAND FEET

Herr Schendal Had Just Broken German Record for Altitude When He Lost Control of Monoplane—Swiss Aviator Falls, but Escapes

(Canadian Press Despatch)
 Johannsthal, Germany, June 10.—Before the horrified gaze of thousands of sightseers, two aviators, Herr Schendal and his mechanic Herr Moss, fell from the clouds a distance of nearly seven thousand feet and were dashed into almost unrecognisable pulp, last night.

An Altitude Record
 Herr Schendal on Tuesday last won fame by breaking the German record for altitude. In his monoplane he rose to a height of 6,594 feet. Last evening he set out to go even higher. His machine rose in the air and circled about rising higher and higher, until the scientific observers proclaimed that their instruments showed he had broken his previous record.

In Moment of Victory
 Still higher the tiny machine climbed the clouds. As the watchers tense with excitement looked, they saw the little machine flutter and turn over. Its tail sank till

WILL START A FUND TO PURCHASE AMBULANCE

Dr. Eggert Hands Over to Hospital Board the Grand Trunk Co's \$500 Cheque—Cost of Auto Ambulance Considered

Agreeing that an ambulance is most certainly necessary now to perfect the efficiency of Prince Rupert's General Hospital, the Hospital Board last night decided to refer the matter to the Executive Committee who will consider the cost of the vehicle, and upkeep. Meanwhile the cheque for \$500 donated by the G. T. P. Railway Co. has been handed over by Dr. Eggert, and it is now up to the citizens to subscribe the further amount necessary, about \$500.

Some little time has elapsed since Mr. Arthur Cuthbert tendered his resignation as Secretary of the Hospital Association. Formal acceptance of the resignation was recorded last night, and Mr. William Wright, Assistant Secretary was appointed Managing Secretary under the new By-laws.

Hon. President's Powers

Nothing further was done in connection with the idea that voting power should be given the Honorary President. While it has been felt by the Board that Mr. Manson who has taken great interest in the Hospital, might fitly have voting power, it was not thought advisable to make voting power a prerogative of all Hon. Presidents of the Board.

A cheque for \$40, the balance of the Laurier Fund was handed over to the Board by T. D. Pattullo, and amongst other minor matters the pricing and purchase of a Taylor Safes was left in the hands of the House Committee.

BAD SHOOTING AFFRAY AT COLD STORAGE WORKS

Homer Wood, while Crazed with Drink, used a Gun on Alexander Mathieson--When He Saw Mathieson Fall, He Tried To Blow His Own Brains out--Mathieson Escaped Volley, but Wood is Seriously Injured--Will Be Charged With Attempted Murder

With a desperate bullet wound in his head from the right ear to below his eye, Homer Wood, a plumber, late of the firm of Mathieson & Wood, is lying in the hospital in a serious condition, after attempting to commit suicide. If he recovers he will be charged with attempting to murder Alexander Mathieson, a brother of his former partner. The engine house of the Atlin Construction Co., at the Cold Storage plant is riddled with bullets, telling their tale of the man's desperate attempts.

"Yes," replied Mathieson, unsuspecting.

Drew a Revolver
 Suddenly pulling out a revolver, Wood said, "I'll shoot you, you—"
 He pulled the trigger three or four times at Mathieson who was quite unarmed and turned to run for safety. In running away, Mathieson tripped over a piece of machinery, and lay stunned for a few seconds.

Tried to Kill Himself
 Thinking he had killed Mathieson, the crazed man suddenly turned the weapon on himself. He was seen by Engineer Ralph Fisher to place the gun to his ear and pull the trigger. As he fell Fisher ran to him and saved him from falling from the platform of the hoist.

Wound Not Serious
 It was found that the bullet instead of entering the brain had come out through the forehead.

Dr. Tremayne was at once telephoned for and came in his launch, along with Chief Vickers. The doctor attended to the man's injuries, and conveyed him in custody of the police to the wharf. Mathieson, except for the fall is unhurt.

Will be Charged
 If he recovers as is very likely, Wood will be charged by the police, says Chief Vickers, with attempting to murder Mathieson, and also with attempted suicide.

There is no doubt that drink played a strong part in the crime. Not only was Mr. Wood partially intoxicated at the time, but he was brandishing a bottle of whisky a minute or two before the shooting started.

The affair caused a great deal of excitement among the hundred or more men at the works, who were just leaving work when the shooting affray began.

M. HAYS SIGNS THE AGREEMENT

Final Discussion Was Held in City Hall. City Seal Attached. Grand Trunk Co.'s Seal to be Affixed at Montreal.

Well satisfied with the settlement of the great G. T. P. assessment problem, the city council met later to ratify the agreement. Each alderman was supplied with a copy of the terms and with Mr. D'Arcy Tate representing the company the details were gone over.

During the discussion it was announced by 'phone that Mr. Hays and Mr. Chamberlin would attend for final discussion and arrangements. On their arrival several points were brought up and settled, and the signing of the agreement was then carried out. The City Seal was affixed last night but the seal of the G. T. P. cannot be attached until Mr. Hays reaches Montreal.

Though signed and sealed, the

agreement has yet to be approved by the citizens of Prince Rupert and ratified by the Legislature. It is set down that the improvements proposed are not to start until three months after the next session of the Legislature, but the aldermen believe from verbal statements made by Mr. Hays and Mr. Chamberlin that the work is to go on at once. The dry dock must go on in terms of agreement with the Government.

ORDER ARRIVES TO RENEW SAVOY LICENSE

By this morning's mail there arrived the judgment of the court and the mandamus to the License Commissioners instructing them to issue to Mr. A. J. Prudhomme a renewal of the license for the Savoy Hotel, and to report to the Supreme Court that they have obeyed the order.

The mandamus reads as follows: To William Manson, Vernor W. Smith and Joseph E. Merryfield, of the Board of License Commissioners in and for the City of Prince Rupert in the Province of British Columbia, and every of them, greeting:

City of Prince Rupert, and every of you, to grant said Alexander James Prudhomme for the said Savoy Hotel, a license to sell spirituous and fermented liquors in renewal of the license previously held by said Prudhomme for the said Savoy Hotel, between the 17th day of October 1910 and the 15th day of January 1911, without the insertion in such license of any condition, lest by your default the same complaint should be repeated to us; And how you shall have executed this Our Writ make known to us in our said Court at the City of Vancouver forthwith, then return to us this Our said Writ, and this you are not to omit.

Whereas this Honourable Court has been given to understand and is informed upon the complaint of Alexander James Prudhomme, licensed hotel-keeper of the City of Prince Rupert aforesaid, that he, a person claiming to be entitled under and by virtue of the "Municipal Clauses Act" and the By-laws of the City of Prince Rupert to have granted to him a renewal of the liquor license held by him for the Savoy Hotel from the 17th day of October 1910 until midnight

of the 15th day of January 1911, did apply at a general meeting of the Board of License Commissioners in and for the said City of Prince Rupert, to such of you, the said Commissioners, as were then and there assembled, to hear an application by him for a renewal grant of such license in respect of said premises at Prince Rupert aforesaid, and to determine the said application according to law, but that you, the said Board of License Commissioners in and for the said City of Prince Rupert, well knowing the premises, but not regarding your duty in that behalf, then and there wholly neglected and refused to grant said renewal of said license, without cause for so refusing, to the great damage and grievance of the said Alexander James Prudhomme, as we have been informed by his complaint made to us; Whereupon we, being willing that due and speedy justice should be done in the premises, as is reasonable, do peremptorily command you, the said Board of License Commissioners in and for the said

City of Prince Rupert, and every of you, to grant said Alexander James Prudhomme for the said Savoy Hotel, a license to sell spirituous and fermented liquors in renewal of the license previously held by said Prudhomme for the said Savoy Hotel, between the 17th day of October 1910 and the 15th day of January 1911, without the insertion in such license of any condition, lest by your default the same complaint should be repeated to us; And how you shall have executed this Our Writ make known to us in our said Court at the City of Vancouver forthwith, then return to us this Our said Writ, and this you are not to omit.

Who is to Blame for the Waterfront Fiasco?

There is one last question which might be asked in connection with the assessment problem, "Who is to blame for the waterfront fiasco?"

Although none of the negotiators, and few of the citizens perceive it very clearly as yet, the whole fight in the assessment dispute raged round the question of the waterfront. If the railway company could hold it idle until after the line is built, its leases will be worth many times over what they would bring today. If equitable taxation were exacted, then it would have forced the railway company to sell or lease a little of it to carry the remainder, and the city would have had a permanent payroll from factories and mills on the waterfront.

How little some of the negotiators were qualified for their work has been shown not only in their agreement, which is riddled with loopholes, but also in their comments since the agreement was made. Even an alderman who recently brought the council to its knees by his threat of having other means to make himself heard, never used those other means to enlighten the public about the economics of the dispute.

There is no suggestion of blame intended to apply to the members of the council. They were the people's choice. The work was forced on them. There was no strong and enlightened public sentiment to back them up. Undoubtedly they did the best they could. And they were sincerely of the opinion that the settlement they made was a good one for the city.

It was a hopeless task to take any heterogeneous body of men—a capable carpenter, a qualified dentist, a country editor, an excellent haberdasher, a good butcher—and set them up against a company of clever railroad chiefs and corporation lawyers, to debate a question of economics. The blame neither now nor in the future, can fairly be laid to them.

And even the most splendid leadership would have been handicapped unless it had strong and united backing from the citizens.

The blame goes much further back than January 14th, 1911. It antedates incorporation. It goes back to the time when the original plan of the townsite of Prince Rupert was known for a fact that the G. T. P. terminal was to be located on Kaien Island.

Though none of us were citizens of Prince Rupert then, the Provincial Government had a sacred trust to protect the interests of the future citizens of the town whose plans were then in preparation. One of those duties was to see that the citizens were not so situated that they would become the prey of corporations and monopolists.

How well they kept that trust is seen by the fact that the Provincial Government and the Grand Trunk Pacific divided up the whole of Prince Rupert's waterfront between them. As a consequence, not a stick of timber, nor a sack of potatoes, nor a loaf of bread can enter Prince Rupert without paying tribute to the Grand Trunk Pacific. With standing timber all round us, with everything, even to our streets constructed of lumber, and with a need for a permanent payroll in the city, we are obliged to import every foot of lumber, and pay tribute to the Grand Trunk for bringing it into the city over their water-frontage.

Contracts for millions of feet of lumber that could have been filled here, and would have given employment to hundreds of men, have been sent—many of them by the G. T. P.—to the mills of Washington, U. S. A. Why have we no saw mill on the waterfront?

Perhaps nothing could have saved the situation in the assessment dispute, and in other difficulties which have arisen and which will arise, save the taking away of the reins of municipal government out of politics and out of the hands of the butcher, the baker and the candlestick-maker, and vesting that authority in the hands of a commission of skilled municipal experts. A commission, composed of a skilled engineer with ample authority, an expert financier, and an expert business organizer, would have saved the city thousands of dollars and much bickering. It was the same Provincial Government that ran its pen through the city's demand for power to create a civic commission.

"It is unusual, and a new thing," said Mr. Bowser, as he murdered the people's charter. It was the same Provincial Government that denied to Prince Rupert citizens the right of the Initiative, the Referendum and the Recall.

As the author of the city's troubles, the Provincial Government of British Columbia, should not be overlooked.

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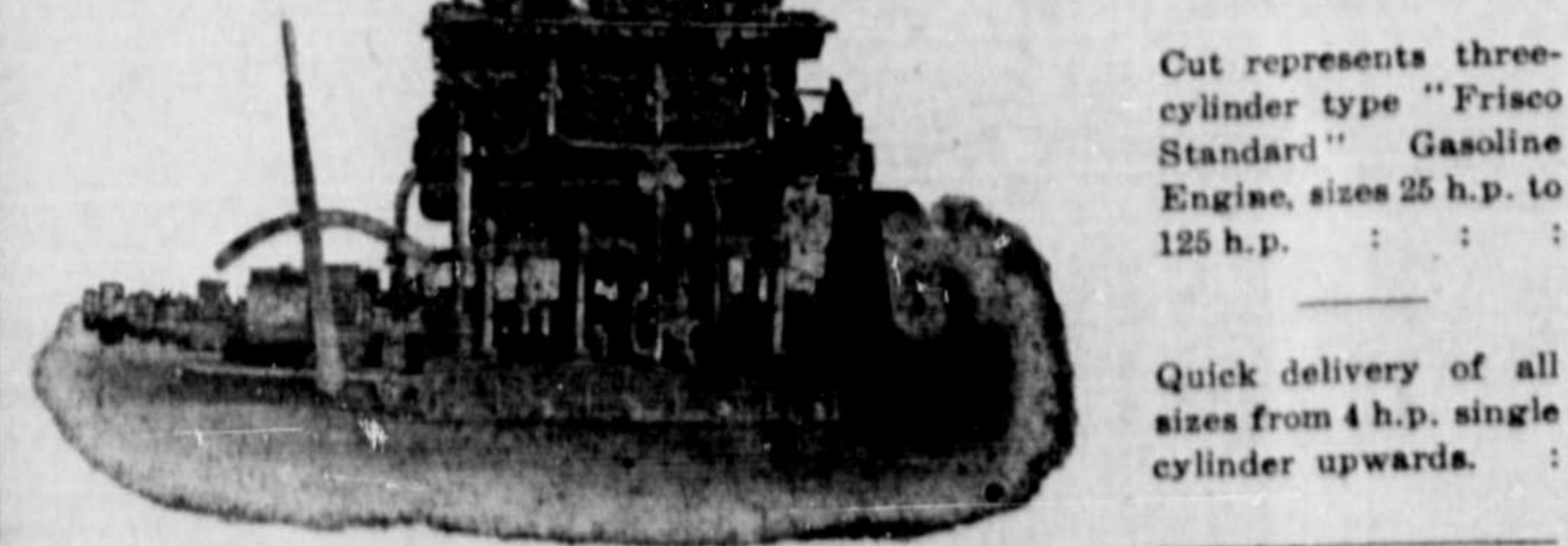

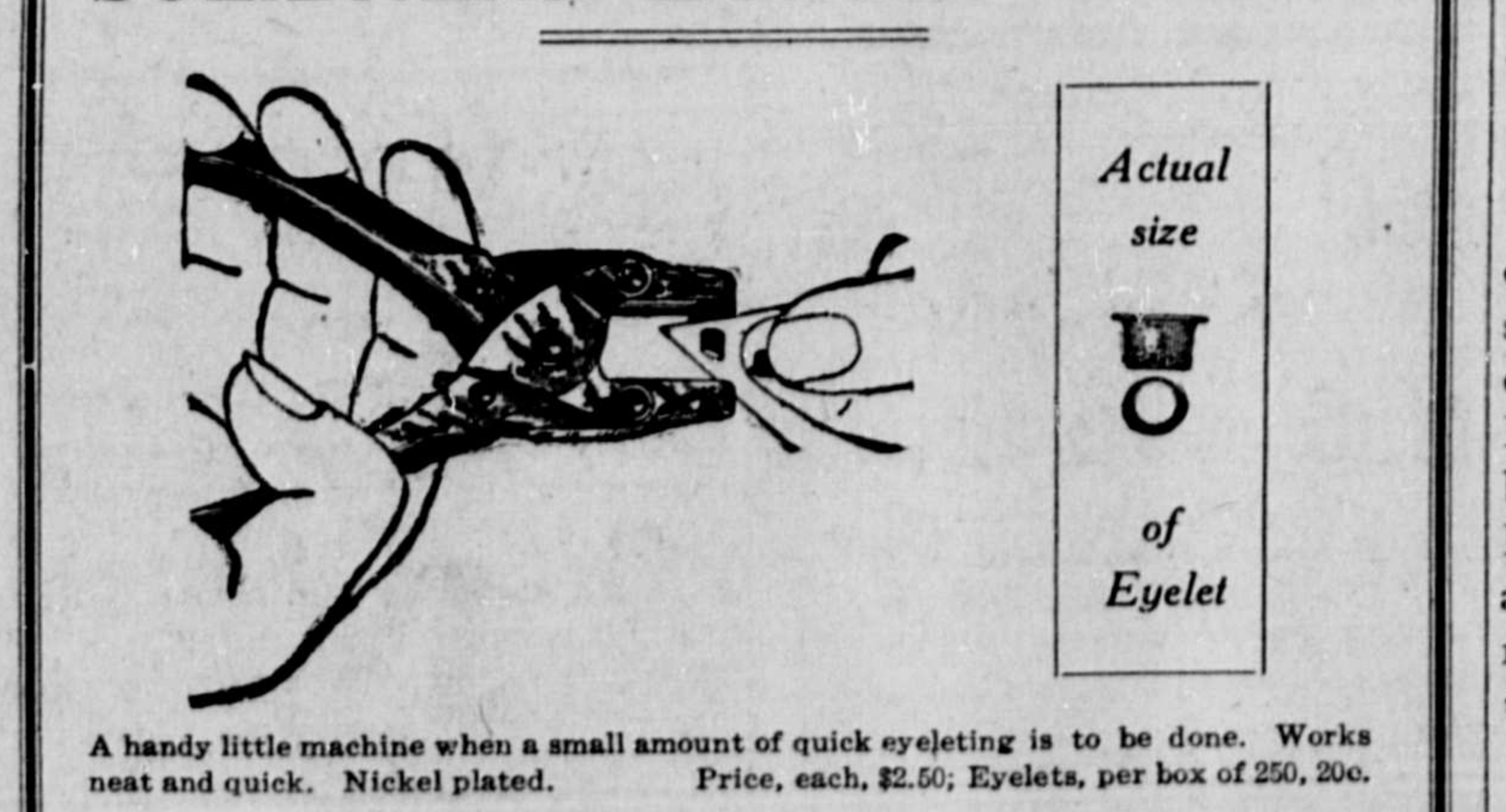
