SHANGHAI, China, Feb. 15:-Heavy gunfire crashed in the Chapei sector soon after dark tonight following a day of comparative quietness. Observers thought it might be the beginning of a big push in which 25,000 Japanese will be thrown against a Chinese army twice as big. The Chinese held all positions over the week-end and there was no change in the situation.






