SHANGHAI, Jan. 28:-The Oriental military situation became more intensified at midnight last night when Japanese naval forces began the occupation of Shanghai. Fighting broke out between Japanese and Chinese troops on the border of the international settlement. Fears are held that there will be more serious clashes as the occupation of one of China's most im-



Rupert. It is feared that the trio may have been caught on Hecate Straits in the severe storm which lashed this part of the coast at the end of last week.



Fishing Vessel "J.B." Is Swept By Flames Here This Afternoon

Was One of Older Local Craft-36 Feet Long and Formerly Named Volunteer-Flames Extinguished By Pumped Water

The local halibut boat J. B., owned and skippered by Capt. Mike Jensen, was almost destroyed this afternoon in Prince Rupert harbor by fire which broke out on the vesel as she was being warmed up in preparation for the 1932 halibut fishing season. The boat had been moored for he winter at the Cow Bay floats and was taken out into

the harbor about noon for a trial spin. Soon after she burst into flames which burned an hour on her. Rescue boats were able to pick up Capt. Jensen and bring him safely ashore but, owing to the intense heat, could not save the vessel for some time.
