ITALY SENDS PROTEST TO CHINA AT SINKING OF STEAMER

VERY BIG INCREASE IN TAXES

Amusements, Gasoline and Beer and Cut in Pensions Forecast

VANCOUVER, Feb. 24:-According to a Victoria dispatch to the Province, the government program will include reduction in government grants to municipalities amounting to a million and a half to two million dollars.

There will be an entirely new system of income taxation to be collected monthly on every income without other exemption than \$300 for each dependent. The rate would be one per cent for every \$1,000 income. The man getting \$1,000 would pay one per cent; getting \$2,000, two per cent, etc. Outside income from investments would be taxed under the ordinary income tax.

There will be 100% increase in the amusement tax, a large increase in the gasoline tax and a possible tax on beer and a substantial cut in the mother's pensions, according to the forecast.

No explanation is available in official circles at Prince Rupert in regard to the change.



ANOTHER JAP DRIVE FAILS

SHANGHAI, Feb. 24:—The Japanese army made one last serious drive against the Chinese at Kiangsan today and, when it failed to budge the Chinese, the centre of attack was suddenly shifted to the Chapei front this afternoon.






