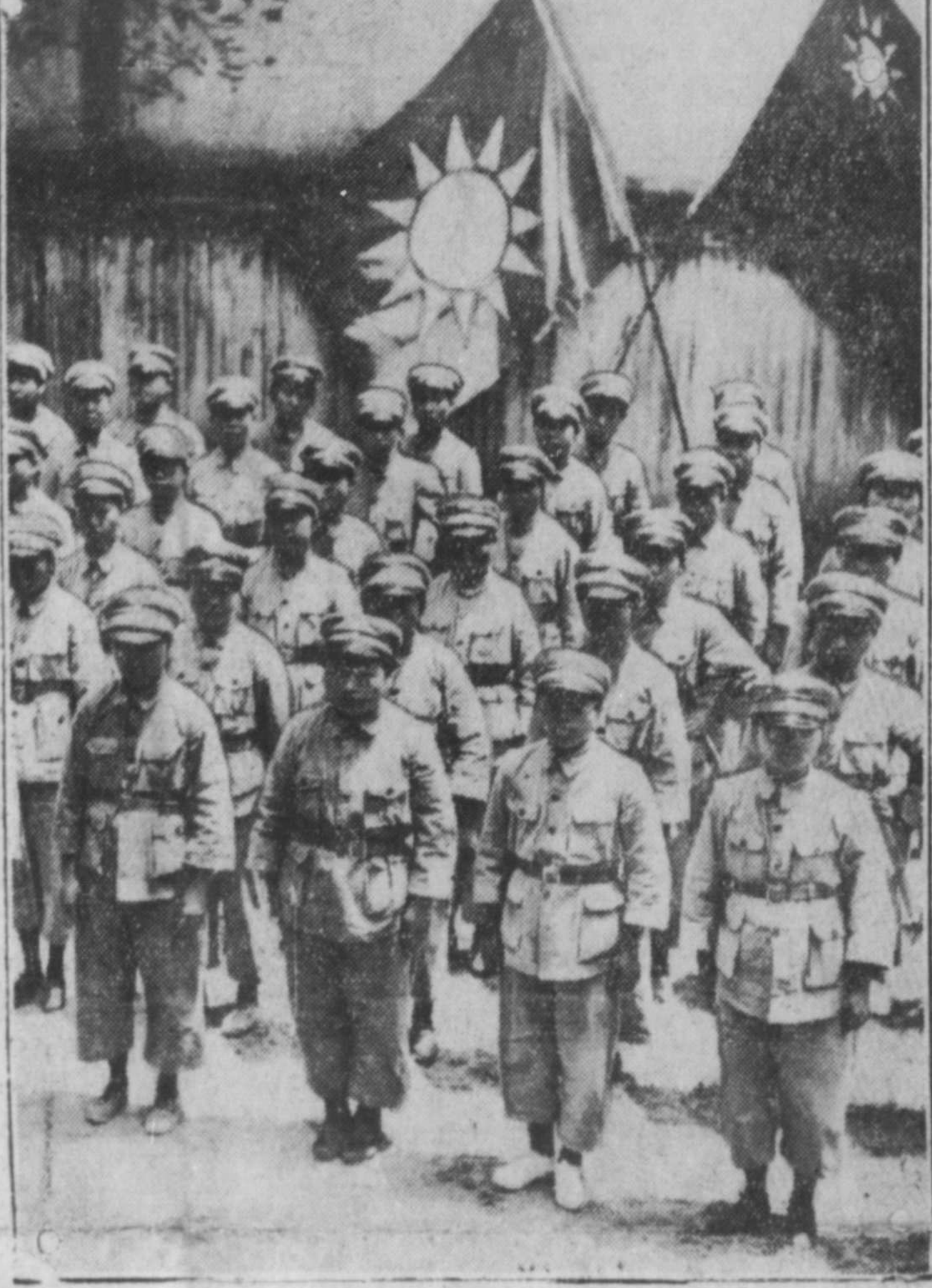

**KILLING A COW**

In the Indian state of Kashmir it is a crime to kill a cow. That is because to the Hindu the cow is a sacred animal and the Hindus are the virtual rulers of Kashmir although only a small minority of the population. The Moslems in Kashmir, who are usually the peasants and poorer classes, are not allowed to kill one of their own animals although they would like to do so. The punishment for breaking this law is seven years imprisonment.

Laws such as this, the result of religious differences, cause friction and the uppishness of the Hindus is a continual source of annoyance to their poorer neighbors.

In a country where such conditions obtain it is easy for communism to obtain a foothold and for communistic agitators to stir up strife.

**TESTING PUBLIC OPINION**

The provincial government seems to be sending out various taxation reports for the purpose of testing public opinion.

When a statement is given to the press in regard to certain proposed measures, there is usually a reaction. If the suggestion is not received with favor, protests come immediately. If it is a suggestion that meets with popular favor, there are favorable responses. In this way the feeling of the people is secured without committing the government to anything.

Judging from the tone of southern newspapers, the government is devoting its attention just now more to cutting down expenses than to increasing taxes. The scheme for income tax levying outlined a few days ago has been abandoned and the increases in taxes, it is intimated, may not be as great as were expected. While this is very much

## HARD TIME FOR A KING

Doctors Gave Him Too Much Medicine and He Died as Result of Cures

An interesting letter to the New York Herald-Tribune tells of what King Charles II. of England had to suffer as a result of the advice of fourteen of England's most prominent physicians of that day: King Charles was being shaved. With a sudden cry he fell backward and had a violent convulsion. As the first step he was bled to the extent of a pint. Next his shoulder was cut into and he was "cupped" for eight ounces more of blood. Next an emetic and purgative were given, and soon after a second purgative. Then came an enema containing antimony, saccharated bitters, rock salt, mallow leaves, violet, beet root, camomile flowers, fennel seed, linseed, cinnamon, cardamom seed, saffron, cochineal and aloes. The enema was repeated in two hours and a purgative given.  
The King's head was shaved and a blister raised on the scalp. A sneezing powder of hellbore root was administered, and also a powder of cowslip flowers "to strengthen his brain." The cathartics were repeated at frequent intervals and interspersed with soothing drinks of barley water, licorice, sweet almonds, white wine, absinthe, anise seed, extracts of thistles, mint, rue and angelica. A plaster of burgundy pitch and pigeon dung was applied to the King's feet. The bleeding and purging were continued, and to the medicaments were added melon seeds, manna, slippery elm, black cherry water, extract of flowers of lime, lily-of-the-valley, peony, lavender and dissolved pearls. Later came gentian root, nutmeg, quinine and cloves.  
As the King did not improve he was given forty drops of extract of human skull. A rallying dose of Raleigh's antidote was forced down his throat; this antidote contained an enormous number of herbs and animal extracts. Finally bezoar stone was given. Then, says Dr. Scarborough: "Alas, after an ill-fated night his serene majesty was so exhausted that all the physicians became despondent;" still, so as not to appear to fail in doing their duty, they brought into play the most active cordials and finally forced pearl julep and ammonia down the King's throat.  
(Incidentally Charles got "what was coming to him" for it was he who conferred knighthood on Henry Morgan and appointed him Governor of Jamaica after this greatest pirate of all times had slaughtered twenty-five thousand men, women and children in a single night in Panama.)  
Uncle Sam is very sick. His doctors have now assembled in Washington to cure the tired old gentleman. May God have mercy on him!  
Charles II. should have been put to bed, given rest, and let severely alone. Uncle Sam's case is not as alarming as that of Charles; he is simply suffering from nervous prostration, the result of living too high and an orgy of "prosperity." He has a record "hangover." What he needs is to give nature and economic laws a chance. He is in the gravest danger of his existence from the dopesters who would turn him inside out with economic emetics; bleed him with inflation, bimetalism and silver coinage; blister him with "debtures," "bonuses," "employment insurance," "subsidies" and "doles."
