Mill Rate Limit For City Raised As Well As Improvement Levy

No Objection to Measure Voiced in Legislature When Second Reading Given Yesterday-Present Curbs Will be Waived For Two Years, Pooley Explains

VICTORIA, April 2:- Proposed changes in the Municipal Act granting wider powers of taxation to municipalities in emergency times on a limited basis were not opposed on being given second reading in the Legislature yesterday. Hon. R. H. Pooley, attorney-general, explained that the bill would waive for two years the limit of twenty

mills for general taxation purposes, extending the limit to thirty-five mills. Municipalities will also be given power to levy on a maximum of seventy-five percent of improvement values in place of fifty percent as at present.

> Eugene Rousseau, formerly manager of the B. C. Packers at Lowe Inlet and well known in Prince Rupert, is again acting as general nanager this year of the British Columbia Fishermen's Co-operative Association which has been engaged in the salmon canning industry for the past two years. At the annual meeting of the association, held recently in Vancouver, L. H. C. Phillips, president, said: "All things considered, the 1931 operations were quite satisfactory, showing a surplus in spite of the fact that exchange on the pound sterling caused some losses in United Kingdom shipments. It was not expected that the year's results would be the same as if general business conditions had been normal." The association has definitely decided to operate its Vancouver cannery this season but no decision as yet has been made in regard to other plants.

Shipments of fish, fresh and frozen, from Prince Rupert during the 11 months ending November 30, 1931, aggregated 27,564,869 pounds, a decrease of 9,093,400 pounds from halibut.

John Dybhavn, general manager of the Massett Canners Ltd. cannery at Old Massett in addition to his other multifarious duties in the fisheries, is of the opinion that none of the canneries in the Queen Charlotte Islands district will operate this year, which is the big cycle year for pinks, unless the market for that variety of salmon improves very materially within the next few months. Mr. Dybhavn's plant was the only one in the district to operate last year and then it put up only a very small pack.

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
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
