WAR AT SHANGHAI HAS NOW ENDED

NON-CONTRIBUTORY UNEMPLOYMENT INSURANCE TABOO

Undeclared Armistice Between Japanese and Chinese Is In Effect

Stores Have Reopened in City and Defending Army Has Fallen Back Almost to Soochow—Invaders Are in Control

SHANGHAI, China, March 4:—War, which was never officially declared, seemed to have definitely ended in the Shanghai area today with an undeclared armistice. Stores were reopening after having been closed during the siege which lasted more than a month and the Chinese army had fallen back almost to Soochow.

There has been no fighting since orders were issued yesterday to cease hostilities by both the Chinese nationalist government and the Japanese military and naval commands following the evacuation of Shanghai by the Chinese.

The Japanese are now in control of the city.

DECISION SOON NOW

Governor Rolph to Announce His Finding in Mooney Parole on March 15

SACRAMENTO, March 4:—Governor James Rolph Jr. announces that he expects to be able to give his decision about March 15 in the case of Tom Mooney, labor leader, on behalf of whom application has been made for parole after years in penitentiary.

OLD BILL APPROVED

Changes of Presidential Inauguration and Congress Session Dates Adopted

WASHINGTON, March 4:—By a vote of 73 to 3, the Senate Wednesday approved a bill which Senator Norris introduced 13 years ago whereby Congress shall meet on January 3 following a presidential election. Under the bill the presidential inauguration is set for January 20 instead of in March.

EXPORT IS REQUESTED

Liberal Members Urge Government to Permit Pulpwood Being Sent From Province

VICTORIA, March 4:—Limited permission under proper safeguards to permit export of cordwood to the United States for pulp making was pressed upon the government yesterday by Liberal members in the Legislature.

APPEAL IS INSTITUTED

Proceedings Started on Behalf of Mrs. Winnie Ruth Judd

PHOENIX, Arizona, March 4:—Formal appeal proceedings against a death sentence imposed for first degree murder in the killing of her former friend, Agnes Lerol, have been instituted on behalf of Mrs. Winnie Ruth Judd.

AL SMITH IN FIELD

Candidate of 1928 Again Wants Nomination but Roosevelt Not Garner Considered More Likely

NEW YORK, March 4:—Former Governor A. E. Smith and Democratic presidential candidate in the 1926 election is again openly in the field for the party's nomination, it is announced. Either Governor Franklin Roosevelt or Speaker John N. Garner is, however, considered more likely to be chosen.

BUTTE, Montana, March 4:—Montana Democrats have decided in favor of sending their delegates to the national presidential convention unfettered and free to support the candidate they deem most suitable.

TO PERMIT EXPLOSIVES

New Form of Killing Sea Lions and Seals Being Legalized By Ottawa

OTTAWA, March 4:—Legislation has been presented to the House of Commons under which it will become legal to kill hair seals and sea lions, conceded to be an enemy of the commercial fisheries, by means of rockets and explosive materials.

PAYROLL IS DOWN

British Columbia Industrial Outlay In 1931 Smaller Than Two Years Previous

VICTORIA, March 4:—British Columbia's industrial payroll in 1931 totalled \$150,000,000, according to figures made available here. In 1930 it was \$172,000,000 and in 1929 \$190,000,000.

NEGOTIATING ON FISH DUTY

OTTAWA, March 4:—Negotiations are being proceeded with between the United States and Canadian governments concerning a reduction of duty on Canadian caught fish going into the United States, Premier R. B. Bennett told the House of Commons yesterday. He gave no details.

NO NEWS OF CHILD

Personal Appeal is Made to Kidnappers By Col. Charles A. Lindbergh

TRENTON, N.J., March 4:—Col. and Mrs. Charles A. Lindbergh issued an appeal direct to the kidnapers of their 19-month old son, Charles Augustus, today assuring them that "entire confidence may be placed in any promise we may make." The appeal is taken to suggest that Col. and Mrs. Lindbergh will pay the \$50,000 ransom without prosecuting the kidnapers if the child is returned safely to them.

There were no new developments during the night in the Lindbergh kidnaping case at Hopewell, N.J., which was again the all absorbing topic on all United States radio broadcasts.

Frequently during the night the following appeal authorized by Col. Lindbergh was read over the air on American broadcasting chains:

"Col. and Mrs. Lindbergh not only wish but hope that anyone knowing the whereabouts of the child will make every effort to communicate at once with them."

Throughout the night many stations of the National Broadcasting Co. and associated stations including KOMO of Seattle remained on the air in the hope of being able to aid in the quest for the child or to broadcast some news of developments to the anxious American public.

SENTENCE TO STAND

Al Capone Soon to Take Up Residence at Leavenworth Pen

CHICAGO, March 4:—Sentence of 11 years imprisonment on Al Capone for evasion of the income tax laws has been confirmed by the superior court. Capone is about to be taken to Leavenworth Penitentiary where he will start serving his long term.

WILL END ISOLATION

French Government to Open Information Bureaus in Various Countries of World

PARIS, March 4:—The French government announces that it intends to establish a press information bureau for the United States either in Washington or New York. Similar information bureaus for the dissemination of information regarding French affairs will also be opened in other countries, it is planned.

This move is being taken with a view to ending the diplomatic isolation of France.

HUGE SHARK IN FRISCO

Enormous Marine Monster Was 26 Feet Long and Weighed 4700 Pounds

SAN FRANCISCO, March 3:—A shark weighing 4700 pounds and measuring 26½ feet in length was killed in San Francisco Bay. An elephant gun was used in dispatching the marine monster which had been destroying fishing nets.

INQUEST PROCEEDS THIS AFTERNOON

Inquest into the death of Mrs. Agnes Catlette, who died suddenly on Wednesday morning at her home on Eighth Avenue West, is continuing this afternoon before Coroner Norman A. Watt, following the performing of an autopsy which was ordered by the coroner.

MOVE IS RUMORED

Reports Current That Post Office Will Vacate Present Location This Year

With the lease on the present post office building expiring in June of this year, there are persistent but unconfirmed reports current in the city that the local federal offices including the post office will be removed to another building. Among the buildings mentioned is the Federal Block where the post office was located before it was moved several years ago to the Dominion Block.

There is no confirmation available in official circles of any intention of the government to move the post office.

RECEIVED BIG SUM

Senator Raymond Admits Beauharnois Gave \$200,000 to Liberal Campaign Funds

OTTAWA, March 4:—Acknowledgment that he had received \$200,000 for the Liberal party campaign funds from R. O. Sweezy, former president of the Beauharnois Power, Light & Heat Co., in 1930 was given to the Senate investigation committee yesterday by Senator Donat Raymond. He had not solicited the contribution, however, the Senator declared.

COMMISSION ON RELIEF

Mackenzie King Makes Suggestion In House of Commons

OTTAWA, March 4:—Rt. Hon. W. L. Mackenzie King, leader of the Liberal opposition, suggested in the House of Commons this week the appointment of a national unemployment relief commission.

BRITISH STILL PAYING

Newspapers arriving from Britain tell of the wonderful manner in which the British people still are paying up their income taxes in response to a patriotic appeal by the National Government. From January 1 up to about two weeks ago the amount received was £114,810,000, as against only £70,571,000 at a similar date last year. The total receipts since the beginning of the financial year amount to £191,282,000, as compared with £149,918,000 last year. The surtax has also brought in over thirteen million pounds more this year than last. Customs collections were up three millions in one week. The figures are astounding in view of the generally depressed condition of business in Europe.

RELIGIOUS CONFERENCE

Commencing Monday in Washington a nation-wide conference is to be held under a distinguished committee of Catholics, Jews and Protestants for the purpose of trying to eradicate religious prejudices and to promote mutual understanding among people of all religious faiths. The gathering is a sign of the times. It is an indication that the spirit of tolerance is growing in the world and that in the course of a few centuries perfect religious, race and social freedom may be assured to all peoples.

ADDRESS BY DR. THOMSON

Gyro and Rotary Clubs Hear Instructive and Eloquent Lecture on Health at Luncheon

One of the most interesting and instructive addresses given to the local service clubs for some time was delivered yesterday afternoon at a joint luncheon of the Gyro and Rotary service clubs in the Commodore Cafe dining room. The speaker was Dr. H. S. Thomson, representing the Canadian Dental Hygiene Council. Contrary to expectations the address dealt with the conditions by which people might avoid the dentist rather than by which the dental surgeons might get business.

The visitor spoke on the health urge of the present day. People were all searching for health and, as a result, newspapers and magazines were publishing many health articles and vendors of cures were advertising all sorts of specifics, which in many cases were worthless.

Dental disease, Dr. Thomson said, was the cause of many diseased conditions, including malnutrition. Dr. Mayo had stated that 70% of all diseases originated in the mouth, and most of these were from the teeth. These diseases were largely the result of ignorance. Just as the campaign against tuberculosis had reduced the death rate from that cause 42%, so it was planned to rid the world of much sickness through giving people a knowledge of dental hygiene.

The Dental Hygiene Council, which he represented, was an organization of laymen, not dentists. An investigation "discovered that 97% of Anglo-Saxon people suffered from decayed teeth. In Central Europe the percentage was only 34 and among the Maoris of New Zealand only 1% suffered from the same cause. This set investigators at work to discover the origin of the trouble. Lack of a vegetable diet was at first suspected but then it was found that the Eskimos who never used vegetables had perfectly sound teeth. It seemed that natural uncooked foods contained the necessary minerals for the formation of teeth.

The crown of the tooth was the only part of the tooth which did not repair itself, the speaker said. It was 100% calcium phosphate and covered the tooth as far as the gum line.

This crown was formed before the child was seven years of age.

Development of Teeth
The speaker said that the crowns of the baby teeth began to develop before birth and the most important period was during the first three years of childhood. It was important that the mother should take mineral foods prior to the birth of the child and that the child should also be fed those foods which contained minerals, such as raw and cooked fruits and vegetables and dairy products and whole meal breads. Older people should eat similar foods because the same elements required to produce the mineral elements were required to continue them. If a mother did not eat foods containing natural minerals, the mineral from her own teeth was absorbed and used by the unborn child, for the mother was always sacrificed for the child. That was why a mother's teeth often gave trouble during childbearing. It was found on examination of a large number of young children that 84% of the crowns of teeth were imperfect when they came in. And yet people wondered why children had cavities in their teeth at the age of fifteen.

Part of the trouble with teeth was that they were no longer used as they were originally intended. That was the cause of a good deal of pyorrhea. The teeth must be used if they are to be kept healthy. To try to cure pyorrhea by using a certain kind of toothpaste was just as ridiculous as to try to cure tuberculosis by application of goosegrease to the chest. Boys and girls should be taught to use their teeth and to clean them. It should not be necessary to clean the teeth but owing to modern diet, carbohydrates lodged between them and with bacteria acids were formed which dissolved the crown of the teeth. Decayed teeth led to many other diseases.

The first thing necessary was to properly build the teeth by feeding the mother and child proper foods and then to maintain the teeth by continuing the use of proper foods containing minerals and to keep the teeth clean.

ADDRESS ON TEETH

Highly Interesting Talk Given By Dental Lecturer at Public Meeting Yesterday

"The three principal factors necessary to success in life are health, character and efficiency," declared Dr. Harry S. Thomson of Toronto, lecturer of the Canadian Dental Hygiene Council, in addressing a public meeting yesterday afternoon at Booth Memorial School. "At one time there was tendency to give efficiency the first place in importance but today health is conceded first place."

Dr. Thomson stressed the responsibility that parents owed to their children in the matter of giving them a fair start in life so far as health was concerned. It was a responsibility which existed even before the child was born.

The principal object of the Canadian Dental Hygiene Council, Dr. Thomson explained, was to teach dental hygiene and disseminate the story of better health. Dental hygiene was a matter of much importance since dental disease might be responsible for many human ailments such as lowered resistance, malnutrition and even mental disorders.

It was of primary importance that dental decay should be prevented and, if it occurred, remedied by filling of the teeth. Importance of the proper foods in the building of the teeth was stressed. The teeth consisted of two parts—the crown and the roots. It was of the utmost importance that the crown should be preserved for the ravages of decay were very rapid once it was penetrated.

Cleansing of the teeth was, of course, the primary means of preserving them and preventing decay. Tooth paste should not contain anything in the way of medicines. Ten cents worth of plain precipitated chalk was as good as any expensive tooth paste. Claims made for tooth pastes that they could cure anything were entirely fallacious and misleading.

What Causes Decay
Carbohydrates, such as starches and sugars, were the sole cause of tooth decay. Meats, vegetables and fruits never caused tooth decay. Indeed, fruits, vegetables, whole grain breads and dairy products were of great importance, particularly pre-natally, in the building of good teeth in the coming child. In cleaning the teeth Dr. Thomson pointed out the necessity of the sweeping downward through the crevices instead of across the teeth. Foreign matters could not be effectively removed by the cross movement of the brush.

Dr. Thomson then gave some interesting glimpses of modern methods in dental treatment. No longer would a dentist remove the nerve from a tooth before filling it and thus leave a "dead" tooth which was bound to develop pus to be later liberated throughout the system to possibly cause tuberculosis, malnutrition, lowered resistance or a myriad of other complaints. Dr. Thomson referred to the value of the x-ray in detecting abscessed teeth.

Before closing, Dr. Thomson referred to the perfect physical coordination of modern athletic champions such as Babe Ruth, Jack Dempsey, Gene Tunney, George Young, Bobby Jones and others, all of whom possessed full mouths of teeth and had never known what it was to have a cavity. It was the right of the child of today to have
