## HEAVY LIFE LOSS--MUCH DAMAGE DONE BY CHINA FLOODS

### Oriental Disaster As Result of High Water; Millions Are Homeless

Eight Hundred Villages Covered—Renewed Rains Cause Yellow River to Continue on Rampage, Governor Of Shantung Reports

SHANGHAI, China, Aug. 28: (CP)—Despite recent reports that floods on the Yellow River are receding, the Governor of Shantung reports that the disaster has reached grave proportions with three million refugees in the western part of the province alone. Eight hundred villages are under water and renewed rains have caused the river to rise again.

The declared aim of the new group is to express in provincial life the national Co-operative Commonwealth Federation principles.

### STEAMER STRANDS

Ss. Aleutian Returning to Seattle Under Own Power After Having Struck Reef

SEATTLE, Aug. 28:—Leaking through the engine room double bottom and in her oil tanks, the Alaska Steamship Co.'s liner Aleutian, which struck a shoal at Jorgen's Point on the north end of Vancouver Island Sunday night, was today returning to Seattle under convoy of the liner Victoria, another of the same company's ships. She has 150 passengers on board and had sailed from here Saturday afternoon for Alaska points. Survey and repairs will be made here following the arrival of the ship.

It is expected that the passengers will be transferred here to the Victoria which was enroute from Seattle to Alaska.

Both vessels are expected here tomorrow.

### DR. TELFORD NOMINATED

Vancouver Physician to Oppose George Pearson in Nanaimo Riding as C.C.F. Standard Bearer

NANAIMO, Aug. 28 (Canadian Press)—Dr. J. Lyle Telford of Vancouver was chosen Canadian Co-operative Commonwealth Federation candidate for Nanaimo-Alberni riding in the forthcoming provincial election at a conference here yesterday. He will oppose George S. Pearson, Liberal M.L.A. for Nanaimo in the last Legislature.

Dr. Telford spoke in Prince Rupert ten days ago at a public meeting under C.C.F. auspices, later visiting interior points.

### Four Halibut Boats Ordered In From Hecate Straits By Patrol Steamer on Saturday

On the allegation that they had halibut gear spread after the close of legal fishing in Area No. 2, the local halibut boats Toodie, Capt. Peter Wold; Rose Spit, Capt. Axel Olsen; Morris H., Capt. Charles Giske, and Kaien, Capt. Ole Stegavig, were ordered in from the Two Peaks halibut banks in Hecate Straits where they were found on Saturday afternoon by the Fisheries Patrol steamer Malaspina, Captain Henderson.

The fishing season in Area No. 2 was closed at midnight last Friday by order of the International Fisheries Commission, the quota for the year in the area having been reached. The owners of the vessels claim that they were not actually fishing for halibut but were rounding off their final trips of the season in Area No. 2 by fishing for black cod.

SENATOR ROBERTSON

Senator Robertson has signed off. He has clicked his last key, sent his last message, and is now possibly teaching telegraphy to the angels. Or possibly he is organizing the inhabitants of Olympus or speaking to them on the dignity of labor.

Senator Robertson was a telegrapher, became head of the telegraphers' union and graduated as a labor leader. At the age of forty-three he was appointed to the Senate of Canada and soon joined the Borden Union Government. At that time his duty was to see that production was not checked. He settled strikes and kept everyone working in order that the Allied forces overseas might have every possible support in the matter of supplies.

Just as the war ended Senator Robertson became minister of labor and continued the same position in the Meighen government until the election of 1921 when he retired to await the return of the Conservative party when he resumed his position in 1930 and continued until his health gave way two years ago.

The most difficult time the Senator experienced was in connection with the Winnipeg strike in 1919 and opinion is much divided as to the wisdom or otherwise of his action there. At any rate he survived that ordeal without injury to his reputation so far as the party he served was concerned.

While Senator Robertson will not be remembered as an outstanding statesman, he will be numbered among the useful Empire builders whose number is legion and who did faithfully their duty as they saw it.

NEW LIBERALISM

In these unquiet yet rapidly advancing days there is too much of a disposition on the part of Liberals to cling to the old Laurier policy, which in its day was good but which today the country is rapidly outgrowing. Political parties must advance with the times or they go into the discard. They must adapt themselves to changing conditions and changing public sentiment. The policy of Laurier was a policy for the beginning of the century. Today we are nearing the middle of the century and a century is a very long period. Captain Ian Mackenzie of Vancouver has been emphasizing the need of a change of attitude and has made a strong appeal to the east. There must be a new Liberalism and members of that party must get into line with the spirit of the age.
