Pointing to a prospective treasury deficit for this fiscal year of \$1,200,000,000, the president demanded emergency action for the balancing of the budget.


Haida Girl Had Narrow Escape Dragged Anchor

WRINCH IS SPEAKER IN THE HOUSE

Urges Work and Wages and Objects to Present System of Income Tax Collection

FAVORS INFLATION

VICTORIA, March 10.—In the Legislature yesterday Dr. H. C. Wrinch, member for Skeena, said the way to improve economic conditions was to improve the medium of exchange and put the money in channels where it could be used for providing work and wages. Fair wages for agricultural producers would help the situation and he considered the suggestion made by the Liberal party to form a board of producers, consumers and dealers was highly commendable. The board would facilitate the marketing of commodities at fair prices to all.

Dr. Wrinch said the system of collecting income tax must be improved. The present revenue from the tax was insufficient. He considered the one percent tax cruel and inhuman. The Doctor asked what was considered sound money? Was money invested in a corporation whose stock was heavily watered a sound investment? "We should inflate for our needs. Let us see how it works in the United States and take advantage of the mistakes they make."

KEEP BANKS ALL CLOSED TO BUSINESS

Holiday Indefinitely Extended by President Under Proclamation Issued Last Night

WASHINGTON, March 10.—A presidential proclamation kept rigid restrictions clamped tightly today about the operations of United States banks until many of them can reopen. Less than two hours before the restrictions would have become lifted at midnight last night, President Roosevelt used the power Congress had just given him by extending the bank holiday "until further proclamation."

The effect of the proclamation is that for the time being the banks can do only what they have been doing the last few days that is enough business to prevent food shortages or to keep people from going without wage pay.

CHINCHOW, Manchuria, March 10.—The Japanese headquarters announced that the Japanese troops had completed the occupation of Kupelkow, the Great Wall gateway to Peiping from Jehol at 2:30 today.

Dominion Approves a Big Loan To B.C. and Takes Treasury Bills

Gets Five and a Half Percent For Quarter Million Dollars And Pays Principal Out of Share in Relief

OTTAWA, March 10.—The loan of \$250,000, advanced by the Dominion government to the Province of British Columbia, has been approved, according to an order-in-council tabled by Honorable W. A. Gordon.

The loan on "urgent representations" of the provincial government, is to assist the province in financing relief expenditures. British Columbia agrees to apply to reduction of the loan, such amounts as may be due the province from the Dominion in respect to the share which the federal government pays the province for direct relief purposes.

The Dominion government accepts \$250,000 of British Columbia treasury bills at 5 1/2% per annum as security.

CARTER WAS COMMITTED

Goes to Higher Court on Order of Magistrate McClymont and Reserves His Defence

Robert Thomas Carter, who was alleged to be the ringleader in the riot which took place here on March 1 when a crowd of men attempted to defy the police by forcing their way through to the Canadian National dock, was brought before Magistrate McClymont this morning and committed for trial. He did not offer any defence and was not represented by counsel.

Major Rowson It Is Thought Shot Himself

Police Believe He May Have Been Cleaning Gun When it Went Off and Death Resulted

VICTORIA, March 10.—Major W. Rowson, secretary of the Royal Victoria Yacht Club, died in the hospital last night from a bullet wound in the stomach. The police believe he was accidentally shot while cleaning his gun.

OATH BILL IS HELD UP

Senate of Irish Free State Holds Up Measure Pending Negotiations For Settlement

DUBLIN, March 10.—The bill providing for elimination of the oath of allegiance in the Irish Free State was held up in the Senate yesterday, a suggestion being made that an amicable settlement of outstanding differences with the British government might be secured.

Wife of Former New York Mayor Sues for Divorce

MIAMI, March 10.—Janet Walker, wife of James J. Walker, former mayor of New York, filed suit for divorce on the ground of desertion. Walker, who left New York with Betty Compton, the actress, is now in Paris and he has cabled denying the desertion charge and declaring he will fight the suit.

Soldiers Will Get Relief By Moratorium

OTTAWA, March 10.—A year's moratorium on interest payments by soldier settlers will be put into effect by the Dominion government. In a resolution placed today on the order paper of the House, Hon. W. A. Gordon announced a series of relief measures for soldier settlers.

TELL ABOUT FINDING OF GUNTHER

Body Was Located on Moodie Trail in Omineca District

The Provincial Police report the story connected with the death of H. M. Guinther, a miner on the Moodie trail in the Omineca district. It was reported in December that Guinther was overdue in his intended trip out to Manson Creek. He had left the cabin of Carl Johnson on November 24, for Manson Creek. When he was stated to be missing V. Williams, game warden, with a party of Indian guides left Findlay Forks to try and locate him. On January 9 they found his body badly frozen. From all appearances he had run out of food and had succumbed to the intense cold. His diary was marked up till December 2 and it is probable that he met his death around that time.

The trip that Guinther planned would have taken him about forty days. The search party travelled for 15 days over the snow-packed, Moodie trail, and mountains surrounding before they found a trace of the man. The address of a friend in Winnipeg was found in his pocket and from this information it was learned the deceased had no relatives in Canada.

For the first time in years a Prince Rupert team has won the basketball championship of Northern B.C. The largest crowd of sport fans that has turned out to watch a basketball card since the Grads' game, were present at the game last night. They were not disappointed for the games were all of championship calibre and kept the crowd on the edge of their seats all the time. The C. N. R. A. managed to overcome the 12-point margin that the Y. P. E. A. of Port Simpson had gained over there in the first game and win the championship by a close margin of two points.

The senior game between the Grotto and the Kaiens held plenty of excitement, the Grotto winning by one point in the dying moments of the game.

The game between the Warriors and the Port Simpson Intermediates was also good but the Warriors had no difficulty in winning 28-15.

**Championship Game**

Right from the whistle the team demonstrated that it was going to be a game worth watching. Scoring was a little slow in starting but the Railway Boys soon topped in a few points to start the ball a-rolling. The Simpson visitors could not seem to find the hoop, some of their pinch shots going wild. With snappy floor work on both sides the half-time whistle blew with the score 14-6 in favor of the C. N. R.
