

GREEMENT **ON SILVER**

Five Nations Sign Pact at London To Take 35,000,000 Ounces Off Market Annually

July 27 (Canadian Press) --- Agreement by five silver producing countries to take thirtyounces of this metal off the market annually during the next five years was completed

The agreement carries out the general silver accord under which India has undertaken to restrict sales of the metal from its treasury to an average of 35,000,000 ounces annually during a fouryear period while producing countries will withdraw an equivalent amount for use for monetary purposes, thus equalizing the effect of the Indian sales.

While the exact amounts each of the five countries will take out was not published, it is realiably reported that the United States share is 24.000,000 ounces; Mexito's, approximately seven million ounces; and Australia, the remain-

COTTAGE IS BURNED OUT

A five-room cottage of frame construction on Thiry Avenue opposite the Daily News office, owned by City Commissioner W. J. Alder and occupied by William Jones, was destroyed by fire which broke out shortly after 9 o'clock this morning. The fire is believed to have been caused by an overheated stovepipe. It was well under way by the time the fire department arrived, no one being in the house at the time of the outbreak.

The building, valued at \$1400, was protected with a reasonable amount of insurance, Mr. Alder stated this morning. Furniture and contents belonging to Mr. Jones to the probable value of some \$500 or so were all destroyed and there was no insurance on these.

The cottage was built some twenty-three years ago and was Mr. Alder's first residence in Prince Rupert.

Sailing Ship Fandango on Leisurely Cruise to Alaska

One of the most attractive yachts to put into Prince Rupert in the course of Alaska cruises this season was here overnight in the Nova Scotia sailing schooner Fandango, having on board a party of Southern California millionaires consisting of C. E. Hoffman of 1.40 Pasadena and Mrs. Hoffman, Mr. :02 and Mrs. Alfred Brant of Canoga 15 Park and Mr. and Mrs. W. Harvey of 25 Pasadena. The Fandango is one of the finest sailing yachts ever to visit this coast. With her low. graceful lines, her rakish, towering masts and picturesque bowsprit, she makes a fine marine picture. The vessel, whose first visit it is to the British Columbia coast, was built at Lunenberg, N.S., and was originally the property of a New York millionaire, having been acquired two years ago by Mr. Hoffh.p. diesel engine.
