Railways Give Notice of Another Ten Per cent Reduction of Wages Paid to Running Trades March 3

Twenty Percent Proposed Drop in Basic Rate is Ten Percent Lower Than Present Rate and Affects 26,000 Men in Canada Altogether

MONTREAL, Jan. 30.—Formal notice of a twenty per cent cut in the basic rate of wages was served by the Canadian National Railways and Canadian Pacific managements to the engineers, firemen, conductors, trainmen, yardmen and telegraphers, constituting the running trades, to become effective March 3. Twenty-six thousand men are affected.

Use Church as School, Kitselas

VANARSDOL, Jan. 30.—Rev. W. E. Colson, Indian Agent, and Dominion Constable Watkinson were here on Thursday, last week, in connection with the recent burning of the Indian Mission school. When it was arranged that the school work be carried on in the United Church until such time as the building is replaced.

The basic wage was paid the men up to December 31, 1931. Between that date and February 1 of this year the men had accepted a temporary reduction of ten per cent and the new cut goes ten per cent below that.

RIOT IN CHICAGO

CHICAGO, Jan. 30.—A riot developed here at the week-end and a clash with the police took place in which pepper was thrown by the rioters. Many arrests were made.

Pacific Salvage Plant is Taken Over by Present Manager, Capt. Paul Armour, Who Will Operate It

The Pacific Salvage Company has sold out its interest here and is retiring from business at this point. The complete plant and boats have been purchased by Capt. Paul Armour, manager of the concern for the past number of years, who will continue the operations on his own account. In announcing the change this morning, Capt. Armour stated that he had great faith in the future of Prince Rupert and he expected to be able to make the business pay. He takes over the Salvage Princess, the Red Boy and the Pachena as well as the sews, pumps and general paraphernalia used in salvage work. He will be wholly responsible for the conduct of the business and in future will be responsible for all debts incurred.

During the past few years there have been very few marine accidents in these waters but at any time wrecks may occur and it is satisfactory to know that the outfit will be here in readiness to handle it in case of necessity. If required the Pacific Salvage Company will co-operate.

Charge is Made By Henry Ford in Regard to Banks

WASHINGTON, Jan. 30.—A charge made by Henry Ford that competitors were trying to prevent production of Ford cars by using their influence with the banks to hold up the work has attracted widespread attention and may be the cause for a congressional investigation.

MILLERD TO BE READY TO BUY SALMON

May Have Floating Cannery Here Or May Build on One of the Sites Planned.

Word has been received in the city from Francis Millerd that he will have a cannery operating here in time to take care of the spring salmon from the trollers as well as take part in the scramble for sockeye when they commence to run.

Mr. Millerd has the old Princess Ena which it is proposed to operate as a floating cannery, but whether the vessel will be located here or at some other point on the coast has not been announced. It is possible that a cannery will be built at Prince Rupert and the floating cannery be operated at a point convenient to the supply of fish.

The salmon trollers association is planning to have its own float this year at Dundas from which they will sell to the party paying the highest price.

R. V. Winch is said to be behind Mr. Millerd in the cannery venture.

Dynamite Blast in Administration Building of British Columbia Relief Camp; One Man Is Badly Injured

VANCOUVER, Jan. 30.—The administration building of the British Columbia relief camp at Wood Bay, about ninety miles north of Vancouver, was shattered by a dynamite explosion early this morning and R. C. Kean, foreman, was seriously injured.

There are 150 men in the camp at Wood Bay. Several went to the assistance of Kean, who was found unconscious in the debris of the building. Kean was bleeding and stunned but apparently was not critically injured. He was placed aboard a boat and started for Vancouver.

MONTREAL, Jan. 30.—Olof Hanson, Member of Parliament for Skeena, accompanied by Mrs. Hanson, arrived here yesterday, returning from a visit to Europe.

CONSERVATIVE LEADER IS MEMBER OF CABINET AND VON PAPEN VICE-CHANCELLOR; ARMY IN HANDS OF GENERAL BLOMBERG.

BERLIN, Jan. 30.—Adolph Hitler, National Socialist party chieftain, leader of the Nazis, was appointed chancellor of Germany today and selected his cabinet which was sworn in immediately by President von Hindenburg.

The Nazi leader has achieved his ambition in becoming chancellor but it is with fettered hands. The cabinet is a compromise one. While the president made him chancellor he surrounded him with Conservatives like Alfred Hugenberg, leader of the Nationalists, Franz Seldte and Franz von Papen, former Chancellor and confidante of the President.

On his part Hitler swore an oath of allegiance to the constitution of the republic, reserving for himself the cabinet posts of minister of the interior and minister without portfolio.

As one more safeguard the president left the army in the hands of General von Blomberg. The Nazi chief will have to tolerate his regime or parliament will be dissolved.

Von Papen is vice-chancellor and Konstantin von Neurath is foreign minister.

Processes by Which Radium is Extracted From Great Bear Lake Ore at New Port Hope Refinery

(By Jack Hambleton, Canadian Press Staff Writer)

PORT HOPE, Ont., Jan. 30.—A prospector high above Great Bear Lake looked down. Strange markings on the shores of the lake lured him. The next year he returned and found pitchblende, mineral from which radium is derived. From that casual glance came Canada's first radium refinery here. It's a queer place, this refinery. A long concrete building surrounded by a high wire fence. A strang place! The front door is locked. The fence seems unsurmountable. A watchman at the gate scrutinizes people closely. A show of credentials and finally, admittance.

A long white table covered with jars of minerals. A big safe. Bunsen burners, one burning steadily. A small retort filled with mineral "stewing" over the burner.

In the background the factory. Huge tanks on one side. On the other, a maze of pipes, stairs, earthenware crucibles, pots. On the left the tanks for uranium extraction. On the right, the machinery for the production of the world's most valuable "salt." For it looks like salt, this lead-packed radium which is so greatly needed for cancer treatment. But there is a vast difference. A needle no larger than that used in a phonograph is worth \$650 when filled with radium.

AMERICAN FISHING BOATS

There is a Canadian law against foreign boats being allowed to call at Canadian ports to land catches of fish, to secure supplies or for any other purpose except to take refuge in time of storm or stress or to secure emergency supplies. This is for the protection of Canadian fisheries and is somewhat similar to laws of other countries.

For the benefit of American halibut fishermen who fish off this coast and also for the benefit of the Canadian railway which carries the fish, United States boats are allowed to land their fish at Prince Rupert under a special order-in-council passed annually, by the Canadian government. They may sell the fish here, paying the duty, or ship in bond to the United States as is usually done. There have been many protests made by Canadians against granting the use of the port on equal terms to American rivals but this has failed to change the views of any of the successive Canadian governments. At the week-end the usual privileges were renewed until May with power given the minister to extend the period to the end of the year.

PRESENT RELIEF PAYMENTS

A member of the unemployed committee has worked out a table showing the amounts received under the present relief scheme against which a protest was made to the Mayor last week. The last column gives the amount per person per meal allowing three meals a day and without any provision for rent, clothing or fuel. The maintenance allowance is shown in the first column. In the second 40% has been added for rent, fuel, clothing, etc. The table follows:

Huge Nugget of Gold Was Used as Anchor for Canoe On Queen Charlotte Coast

Curious Legend of Valuable Rock Which Was Hidden by Chief and Possibly Never Recovered—Expedition Being Planned

The natives of Queen Charlotte Islands have a story of a golden anchor which rivals some of the Greek stories of the days of romance. This anchor was a nugget of gold believed to weigh between forty and fifty pounds and was used by the chief of the Kiseen village to anchor his canoe. It was chosen for that purpose because of its great weight. Kiseen village is located at the entrance to Moore Channel on the west coast of Moresby Island. At that time there were huge villages all along the west coast of the Queen Charlottes and the different tribes or clans of each village were almost continuously at war with each other.

The last seen of the golden anchor was when the chief who owned it carried it off into the woods to hide it before he went off on one of his raiding expeditions. Someone had told him that the huge nugget was valuable and that the white people would give him many colored blankets for it.

The chief got his war fleet together and left Kiseen early one summer morning for the western entrance to Skidegate Inlet. Just north of Buck Point he was pounced upon by a fleet of war canoes from Chatla village, which was situated near there and a terrible hand-to-hand engagement took place. The Chatla tribe, seeing that they were losing, landed on a small island west of the entrance to Skidegate Inlet. The Kiseen tribe followed and practically exterminated the Chatla fleet. But the chief of the Kiseens was killed in the battle and the secret of the hiding place of the huge nugget went with him.

For years both whites and natives

have hunted in vain for the nugget. It is believed by many that it was the famous nugget which was found at Gold Harbor by the Hudson Bay Company when they were reported to have taken a quarter of a million dollars out of one pocket in their mine at that point. The largest nugget reported by the company was valued at \$375. Black powder was used to blast the rock and it is claimed that most of the gold was blown into the harbor. After each shot a shower of gold nuggets landed on the ships anchored off shore and there was a scramble for the nuggets both by natives and whites.

It is reported that another expedition is to start soon to search for the lost nugget. If it goes it should excite even greater interest than that to Cocos Island.

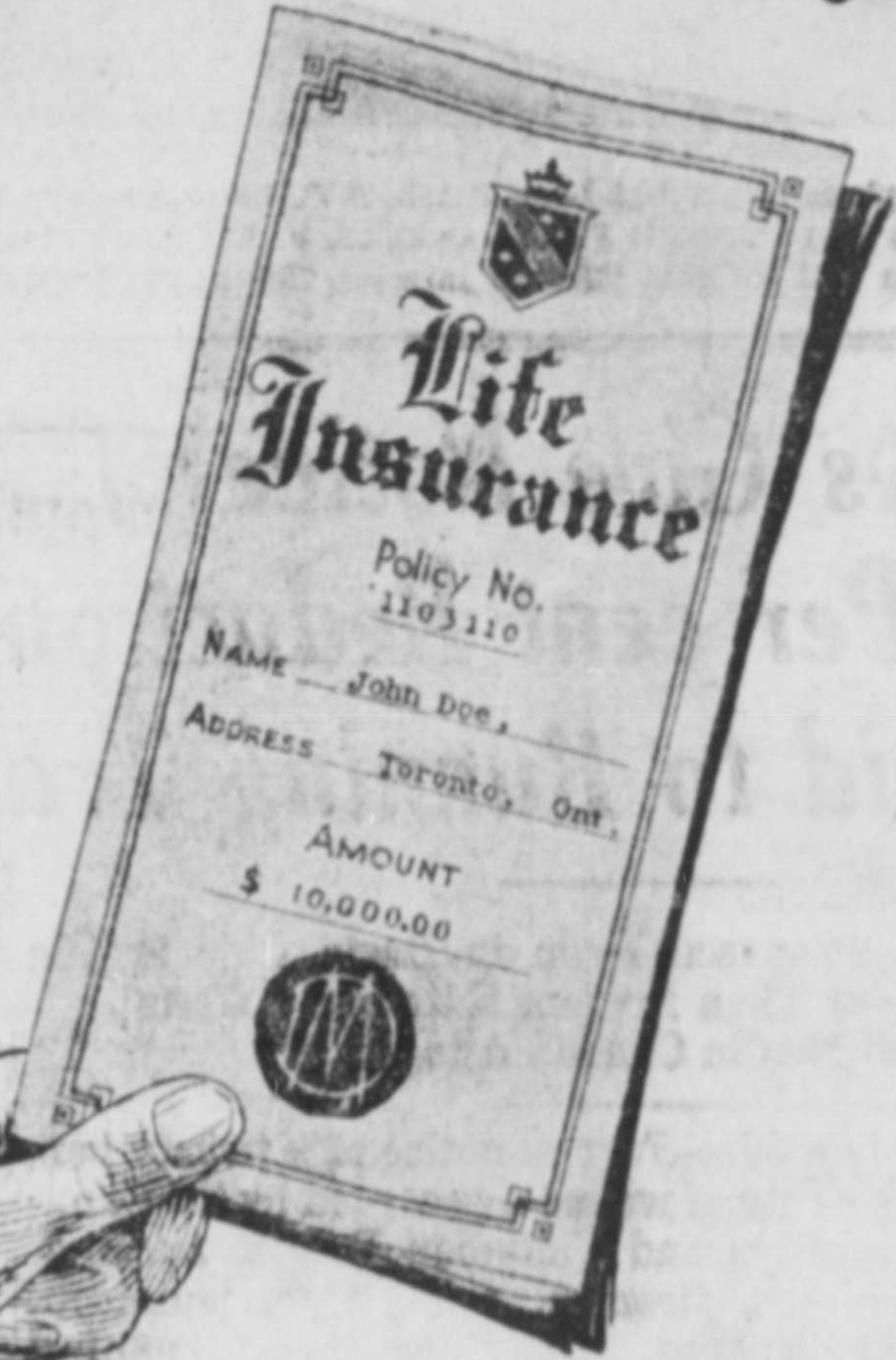

He Gives Money To Help Birds, Blind and Lapps

Touching Letter of the Author Of "Book of San Michele" Reveals His Warm Heart and Kindness

STOCKHOLM, Sweden, Jan. 30.

"I have lived too long not to find it easier to love animals than to love men," writes Dr. Axel Munthe, famous author of the "Book of St. Michele," one of the greatest literary world successes of later years. Dr. Munthe, who lived the life of a recluse on the island of Capri, with a quaint and warm-hearted letter to his personal friend, King Gustaf V., donates a Christmas gift of 100,000 kronor (\$5,500), the Swedish part of the proceeds of his book, to be distributed by the King in equal parts for the benefit of the blind, the lapps and the birds.

The late Queen Victoria, whom Dr. Munthe attended, promised to distribute the proceeds of his book and now requests the King to do it instead. Dr. Munthe himself is now almost blind and therefore feels warmly for his unfortunate fellow-sufferers, who will benefit in several ways from his gift. 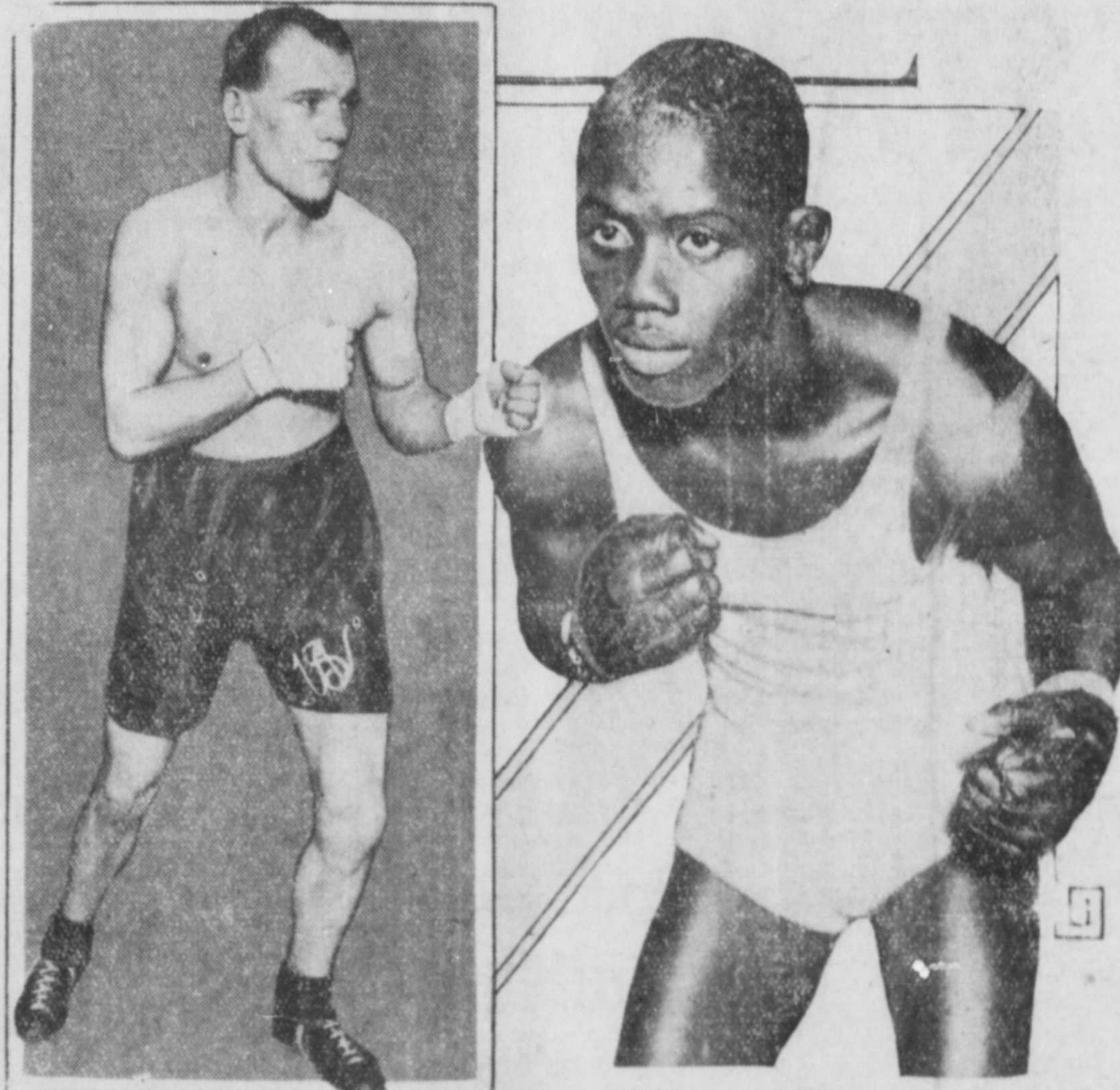

PROCESSES BY WHICH RADIUM IS EXTRACTED FROM GREAT BEAR LAKE ORE

(Continued from Page 1)

There are bags of ore, pitchblende. There are carboys of chemicals. Into two electrically-stirred vats the ore and chemicals are poured. The ore is a black powder, already ground.

The mixture is heated and stirred. Strange things happen. It travels by gravity and vacuum pump into other vats, through rubber-lined pipes. Finally the uranium and residue is drawn off. The white precipitate containing the radium is removed to the laboratory. The residue starts up to the top again and moves through a succession of wooden tanks until it emerges as a yellow powder, used for ceramics and pigments.

But that is of minor importance. Let us follow the radium to the "lab" for the final processing. There are dozens of quartz bowls in the "lab." The radium, in liquid solution, moves from one to the other. The liquid crystallizes. It travels on and on, the bulk becoming less and less. From the big vats in which it started it moves gradually into smaller glasses and bowls. Eventually, it reaches a small container no larger than Milady's thimble. It is pure radium now, nearly ready to take its place in the fight against the dread scourge of cancer.

Surgical Needles

In many cases the radium must now be placed in surgical needles. This is a delicate and dangerous operation. For radium's emanation and radiation are dangerous. Hence the chemist, as he fills the needles, must be protected. He sits before a glass case. He places his hands in rubber gloves, through holes in the end of the case. Across the section where his chest rests runs a heavy lead pad. The rays are absorbed by the lead, while the sealed glass case retains the bulk of the emanation.

It takes hours to fill each tiny needle. Then the radium is weighed on scales so delicate the marking of a lead pencil on a sheet of paper would upset their balance. They will weigh 1-100th of a milligram, and there are 1,000 milligrams in a gram. It is delicate work.

In the laboratory too is a large vat of water. After each operation the scientists wash their hands in this vat. When the vat becomes filled it too is submitted to the final processing given the radium itself. Every possible atom of the radium
