LANCASTER ON FLIGHT

British Aviator Seeking to Beat Amy Johnson Record to Capetown

LONDON, April 12: (CP)—Determined to break the record of Amy Johnson, Capt. William Lancaster, British aviator, broke into the limelight again yesterday when he was winging his way toward Capetown, having taken off from Lympne early in the morning. He landed at Adrar, Algeria, last night and took off this morning in continuation of the flight.

Capt. Lancaster received considerable notoriety last year when with Mrs. Jessie Keith-Müller, Australian aviatrix, he was made defendant in a trial for the murder of Helen Clark, novelist, at Miami, Fla. The couple were acquitted but were later ordered deported from the United States.

FIVE OTHER DEFENDANTS IN SENSATIONAL TRIAL PLEAD NOT GUILTY—LONDON PROFESSES NO SURPRISE AT DEVELOPMENT OWING TO SOLITARY CONFINEMENT AND QUESTIONING METHODS.

LONDON, April 12:—The House of Lords last night approved the bill giving the Nationalist cabinet of Prime Minister J. Ramsay MacDonald authority to place an embargo against Russian goods entering the United Kingdom in the event of the trial of six British electrical engineers by Soviet Russia on sabotage and espionage charges being deemed to be unfair.

MOSCOW, April 12: (CP)—W. L. Macdonald, British employee of the Metropolitan Vickers Electrical Co., and eleven Russian employees of the company today pleaded guilty to charges of espionage, sabotage and bribery. Five other British employees pleaded not guilty. They are Allan Monkhouse, Charles Nordwell, L. C. Thornton, A. W. Gregory and John Cushman. The trial started today in "October Hall" which was guarded closely by uniformed and bayoneted soldiers. The hall was crowded to capacity.

Macdonald, who is 28 years of age, walked in the front rank of the prisoners and, without speaking to his colleague, took a seat in the front row of the prisoners' dock. He is tall and was wearing a closely-cropped goatee. His face was pale. In his alleged confession, the indictment said, Macdonald told of acting under Thornton's instructions in collecting military, economic and political information. "I understood Thornton was acting in the interests of England," the indictment quoted Macdonald as saying.

Macdonald's plea, which followed the reading of the indictment, furnishes a dramatic climax to the first session of the trial. It surprised even British embassy officials who had not been allowed to discuss the case with the defendants.

SWAN SONG FOR BOARD

Does Not Expect to Sit Again in View of Impending Commissionership

In view of the accepted inevitability of the appointment of a commissioner to take over the administration of civic affairs at an early date, Chairman Arthur Brooksbank, at last night's school board meeting sang the "swan song" of the school trustees who, like the mayor and aldermen, will likely be soon without their civic jobs.

Mr. Brooksbank thanked the principals of the various schools who were present for their co-operation with the board during its term of office and expressed the hope that the commissioner would be at least agreeable and that members of the teaching staff would like him. Mr. Brooksbank, before adjournment, also expressed appreciation of the work and co-operation of other members of the board. They had done all they could.

Trustee D. C. Schubert was inclined to discount the rumor which has been current about the city that there was a danger of a commissioner closing down the High School.

MacDonald-Mussolini Pact Is Acceptable To Important Powers

Great Britain, Italy, Germany and France Now Reported in Agreement—Further Developments Announced in Rome Last Night

ROME, April 12:—It was declared authoritatively here last night that four major nations of Europe—Great Britain, Italy, Germany and France—had accepted in principle the MacDonald-Mussolini plan for peace and disarmament in Europe. Germany's approval came during the day as a result of conferences here between Premier Hitler. It was also intimated late last night that France was agreeable to the plan with certain reservations.

Premier Tolmie Tells Saanich Conservatives Coalition Impossible

Will Proceed Now With Program of Cabinet Reorganization and Platform Building With Preparations For Provincial Election In Due Time

VICTORIA, April 12: (CP)—All avenues leading to union of the two major political parties in the provincial field for the duration of the depression appeared to be closed last night as Premier S. F. Tolmie, in an address to the Saanich Conservative Association, outlined plans tending to clear the political atmosphere. Having failed to form a direct union with the Liberal party, the Premier declared that it was now his intention to proceed with the program laid down last fall which includes reorganization of the cabinet and preparation of a platform which will be followed in due time by preparations for an election.

OPPOSING RECEIVER

Notice of Motion For Special Council Meeting Posted By Ald. Basso-Bert

Ald. Basso-Bert has intimated his intention of leading a fight in the city council against the proposed appointment of a commissioner to take charge of the administration of civic affairs. The following notice of motion has been posted at the City Hall by Ald. Basso-Bert for consideration of the council at a special meeting which has been called for tomorrow night to consider the application which has been made by Frederick Gordon Sweet, representing bondholders, in the Supreme Court of British Columbia at Vancouver seeking authorization of the appointment of a commissioner following default of the city in payment of a \$25 bond interest coupon:

"Whereas the bondholders have appealed to the Supreme Court for the appointment of a commissioner for this city in spite of the fact that the city council has inaugurated a policy of stringent economy and retrenchments, and therefore, be it resolved that this council take immediate action to protest such appointment."

BUDGET IS APPROVED

Rhodes Fiscal Document Passed By House of Commons Last Night on Division of 119 to 63

OTTAWA, April 12 (CI)—The budget of Hon. Edgar N. Rhodes, minister of finance, passed the House of Commons last night on a division of 107 to 72.

The Progressive sub-amendment calling for modification of the budget in favor of currency inflation, nationalized insurance and a national credit bank was defeated 171 to 13, all Conservatives and Liberals uniting against it.

A Liberal amendment of direct war of confidence in the government was defeated 119 to 63.

The school budget for the month of March totalling \$6,134.33, including \$609.31 in accounts and \$5,525.02 in salaries, was passed for payment at last night's regular monthly meeting of the board of school trustees.

The school board was informed at its meeting last night that Miss E. White, domestic science instructor, had recently deposited with the city treasurer a sum of \$8.10, being the proceeds of a tea and sale held last September by the home economics department. The amount will be credited to the schools account.

Bringing north a fair-sized list of passengers, C.N.R. steamer Prince George, Capt. H. E. Nedden, arrived in port at 10 o'clock this morning from Vancouver, Powell River and Ocean Falls and, sails this afternoon for Anyox and Stewart. This is the Prince George's first voyage on spring schedule after having been tied up for the winter at the local dock where she underwent annual overhaul. She replaces the steamer Prince Rupert which is receiving annual overhaul at Vancouver.

It was announced at yesterday's luncheon of the Prince Rupert Gyro Club that G. G. McGeer, K. C., prominent Vancouver barrister and authority on economic problems, had accepted an invitation to address the club in the course of an impending northern tour. The club received reports from Sam Jabour with respect to the recent campaign to collect books for the Prince Rupert Public Library and from Dr. L. W. The mother further advised the board that the girl's father was out of work and it would be impossible, anyway, to supply her with books next term.

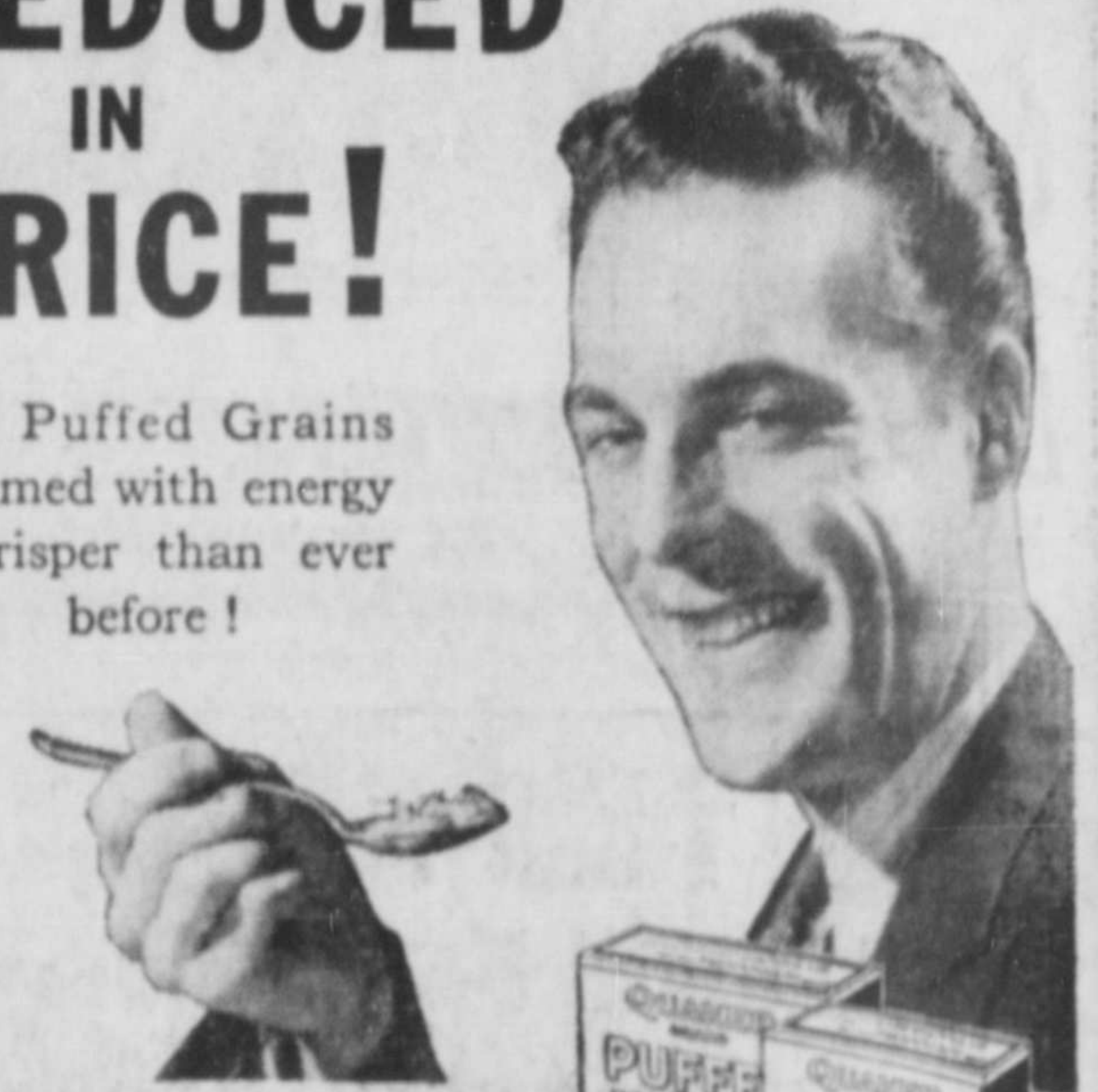
