Banning of Russian Lumber From British Market Considered

No Definite Decision Has, However, Been Reached as Yet—Resumption of World Economic Conference At Later Date Predicted

MURRAY BAY, Que., Aug. 31: (CP)—The proposal to ban Russian lumber from the market of Great Britain under Article Twenty-One of the Ottawa conference agreements is still under consideration but no decision has been reached, Prime Minister R. B. Bennett said as he landed here today from Great Britain aboard the liner Empress of Britain.

DISAPPEARS FROM SHIP

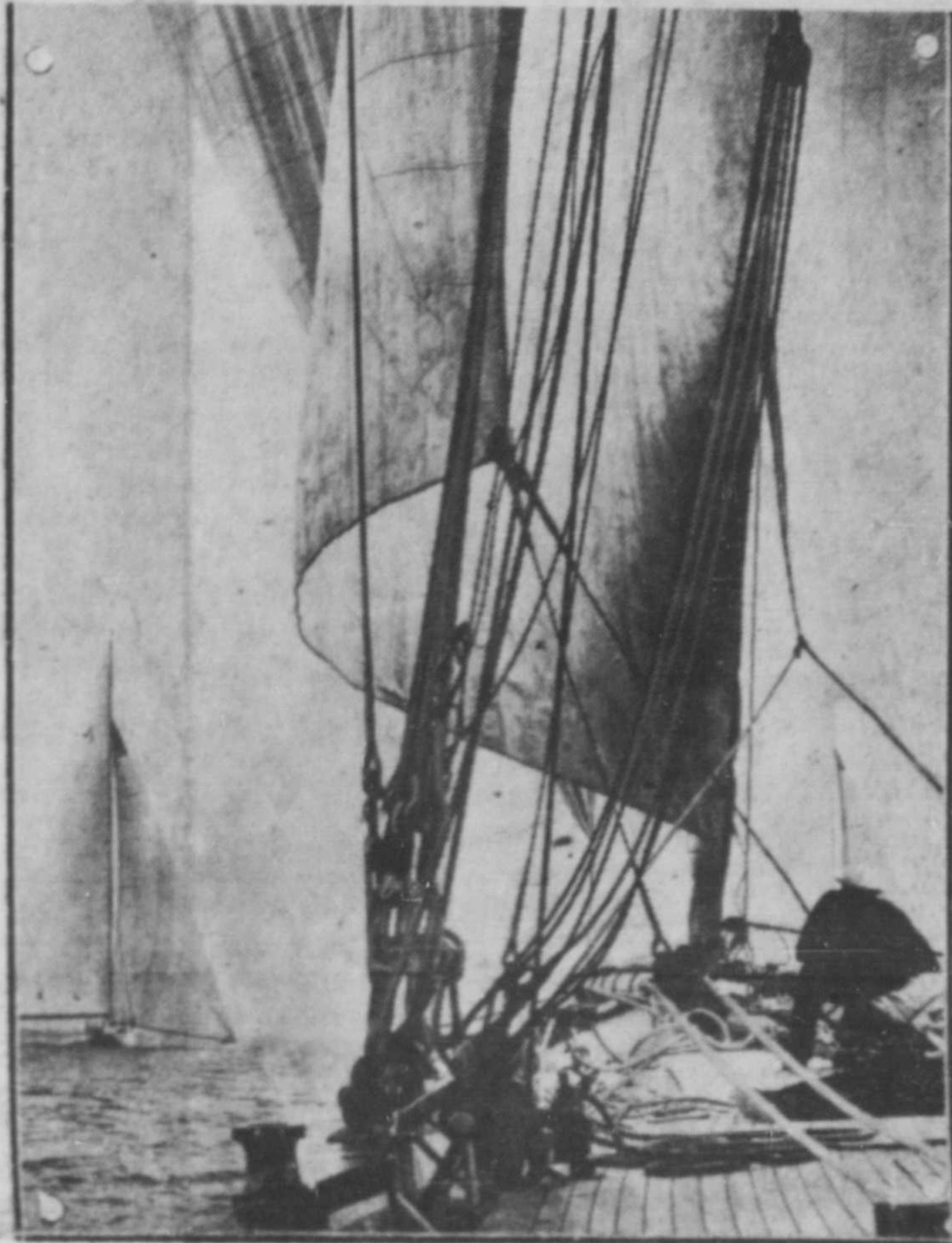
Prof. Wilfrid Sadler, Well Known At Prince Rupert, Lost From Steamer Near Canal Zone

BALBOA, Canal Zone, Aug. 31: (CP)—Prof. Wilfrid Sadler of the University of British Columbia, Vancouver, disappeared from the steamship Emergency Aid southbound on the night of August 28, 250 miles off of Balboa.

Prof. Sadler was the head of the department of dairying at the University of British Columbia. His research work was internationally known. He had been given leave of absence for the fall term and was on his way to South America.

With Dr. Harrison of McGill University, Montreal, Prof. Sadler spent some time several years ago at Prince Rupert conducting a special investigation into halibut discoloration under the auspices of the Biological Board of Canada. He was well known here.

ELECTION DATE HAS BEEN OFFICIALLY SET

Official confirmation was received from Victoria last evening of the report published in the Daily News yesterday that the voters of British Columbia would go to the polls on November 2 to elect the province's eighteenth legislature. The official proclamation announcing the date of the election was signed in Victoria yesterday by Lieutenant-Governor J. W. Fordham-Johnson. Nominations, as stated, will be received on October 12. The necessary writs will be issued during the next few days.

Prince Rupert Promised Better Radio Reception From Canadian Stations by Commissioner Maher

During his recent visit to Vancouver D. C. McRae had an interesting interview with Thomas Maher, vice-chairman of the Canadian Radio Commission, in connection with local reception and the need of a local station. Mr. McRae explained the local position particularly in regard to the lack of reception from Canadian stations and, after the conference was given a letter from the commissioner, which reads as follows:

"Dear Mr. McRae: "I consider it an opportunity to have had the pleasure of meeting you today, as Mr. Bushnell and I felt very disappointed in not being able to go to Prince Rupert this time. I wish that you would explain to your people the reason why we could not afford the time to take the trip; you know that. "After our conversation I believe

that I am quite conversant with your radio problems. I would like to assure the people of Prince Rupert that I will endeavor to convince my colleagues of the necessity to assure Prince Rupert of good reception for the kiddies and grown-ups. I do not know yet how that can be done, as you will understand there are all kinds of difficulties, financial, technical, distance, etc. We will certainly try to (Continued on Page Four)

Gold and Silver Mining in United States Expected to Boom as Result of Action

NEW YORK, Aug. 31:—As a result of the executive order issued on Tuesday by President Franklin D. Roosevelt relaxing the embargo on the exporting from the United States of newly-minted gold, it is expected in well-advised mining quarters here that the production of the yellow metal in this country may be doubled within the coming year. Last year fine gold production in this country amounted to \$52,000,000. Increased production will, of course, involve a corresponding expansion program in construction work and machinery installation.

The expansion in the gold mining industry will also react favorably to the silver industry, it is anticipated. Apart from this, however, it is expected executive action will shortly be taken to stabilize at a more favorable level the ratio between silver and gold values.

New Time Record Set For Aquatic Classic At Big Eastern Fair

American Covered Fifteen-Mile Distance in Little Over Seven Hours—Bill Goll of New York is Second

TORONTO, Ont., Aug. 31: (CP)—Marvin Nelson of Fort Dodge, Iowa, yesterday won the Canadian National Exhibition's fifteen-mile marathon swim in the new record time of seven hours, four minutes and thirty-seven and two-fifths seconds, capturing a \$5,000 prize. He had previously won the swim in 1930, it being the first occasion on which the same winner has won twice.

HALIBUT LANDINGS

Canadian Production Higher in August This Year But American Is Down Considerably

Halibut landings at the port of Prince Rupert for the month of August this year, according to figures compiled on the local waterfront, totalled 1,843,000 pounds as compared with 2,413,369 pounds in the same month last year.

American landings for this August amounted to 895,500 pounds as against 1,778,800 pounds last year while the Canadian total for the month ending today was 947,500 pounds in comparison with 634,500 pounds last year.

UNION IS SUSTAINED

Amateur Athletic Body Has Right To Suspend Player, Judge Decides in McNulty Case

TORONTO, Aug. 31: (CP)—In lifting an interim injunction restraining the Amateur Athletic Union from keeping Gerald McNulty, baseball player, out of competition, Mr. Justice Patrick Kerwin ruled yesterday that the Amateur Athletic Union has the right to suspend any athlete who has agreed to be bound by Union rules.

His Lordship refused the application of McNulty for continuance of the injunction until trial of the athlete's action for a permanent injunction.

Gold Stocks Are Forced Downward

Temporary Reaction Following President's Order Relaxing Embargo

NEW YORK, August 31:—Gold mining stocks were pounded down yesterday after showing upward reaction to President Roosevelt's dramatically sudden action of Tuesday in relaxing the American gold embargo to permit of sales of newly-minted gold in foreign markets.

PRODUCTION OF CARS UP

Quantity and Value of Vehicles in Canada This July Well Ahead Of Last Year

OTTAWA, Aug. 31:—A Bureau of Statistics report shows that the number of new passenger cars, trucks and busses sold in the Dominion during the month of July this year totalled 5,140 with a retail value of \$5,045,231 as compared with 4,017 valued at \$3,729,211 in the corresponding period last year.

SEATTLE, Aug. 31: (CP)—The steamer Aleutian, which did extensive damage to her hull on striking a shoal at Jorgen's Point on the north end of Vancouver Island Sunday night, arrived here Tuesday night under her own power for dry docking. The vessel was accompanied by the steamer Victoria which will take her passengers north.

BOARDS ARE APPOINTED

Conciliation Bodies Between C.N.R. And C.P.R. and Employees Are Named

OTTAWA, Aug. 31:—The federal minister of labor, Hon. Wesley A. Gordon, announces that he has appointed two boards of conciliation to hear wage disputes between the Canadian National and the Canadian Pacific Railways and their employees following the recently ordered second ten percent wage cut.

FIRE LOSS IS HEAVY

Damage of \$750,000 Done When McFadden Lumber Mill at Spragoe, Ont., Razed

SPRAGOE, Ont., Aug. 31:—Fire, which completely destroyed the McFadden lumber mills an eight million feet of timber here on Tuesday, caused a loss which is estimated at \$750,000.

Forty-Footer White Cloud From Tacoma Here Last Night on Way South

The Tacoma sailing yacht White Cloud, with its owner, W. R. R. Prett, and five guests on board, was an overnight visitor at the floats of the Prince Rupert Rowing & Yacht Club returning to its home port in the south following a three months' cruise in northern and western Alaska waters, the party going to the interior as far as Dawson, Y.T., during their trip. The White Cloud, a 40-foot single-masted cutter carrying a good deal of canvas and equipped with a 50 h.p. auxiliary gas engine, sailed north along the West Coast of Vancouver Island. She arrived here at 5:30 yesterday afternoon and sailed at noon today for Vancouver enroute home.

Another visitor at the Yacht Club floats yesterday was the outboard motor and sail boat of Mr. and Mrs. E. R. Wright of Davis River, near Hyder, Alaska, which arrived at noon and sailed at 6 p.m. on its return north.

## BARGAIN IN TRAVELLING

Trips May be Made East This Fall At Rate of Cent Per Mile

WINNIPEG, Aug. 31.—In response to popular demand, the Canadian railways have decided to offer another travel bargain to Eastern Canada, according to an announcement made today by J. B. Parker, secretary of the Canadian Passenger Association. Tickets will be on sale from all stations—Port Arthur, Armstrong and west as far as Vancouver, Prince Rupert and Victoria—to all stations east of Sault Ste. Marie, Sudbury, Capreol and Cochrane.

Travel dates for this fall excursion are September 16 to September 26 and tickets will be good for 30 days from date of sale.

The tickets figure out at approximately one cent per mile in each direction. As before, passengers may travel by coach or tourist sleepers may be obtained upon payment of a small extra amount in addition to the cost of the accommodation furnished.

We will also consider the possibilities of sending the programs through short waves. This will imply, of course, a station in Prince Rupert to re-broadcast by long wave.

"I would like you to take this letter just as a conversation without committing me to any definite action, but rather like an assurance that my colleagues as well as myself will do their utmost to help your community.

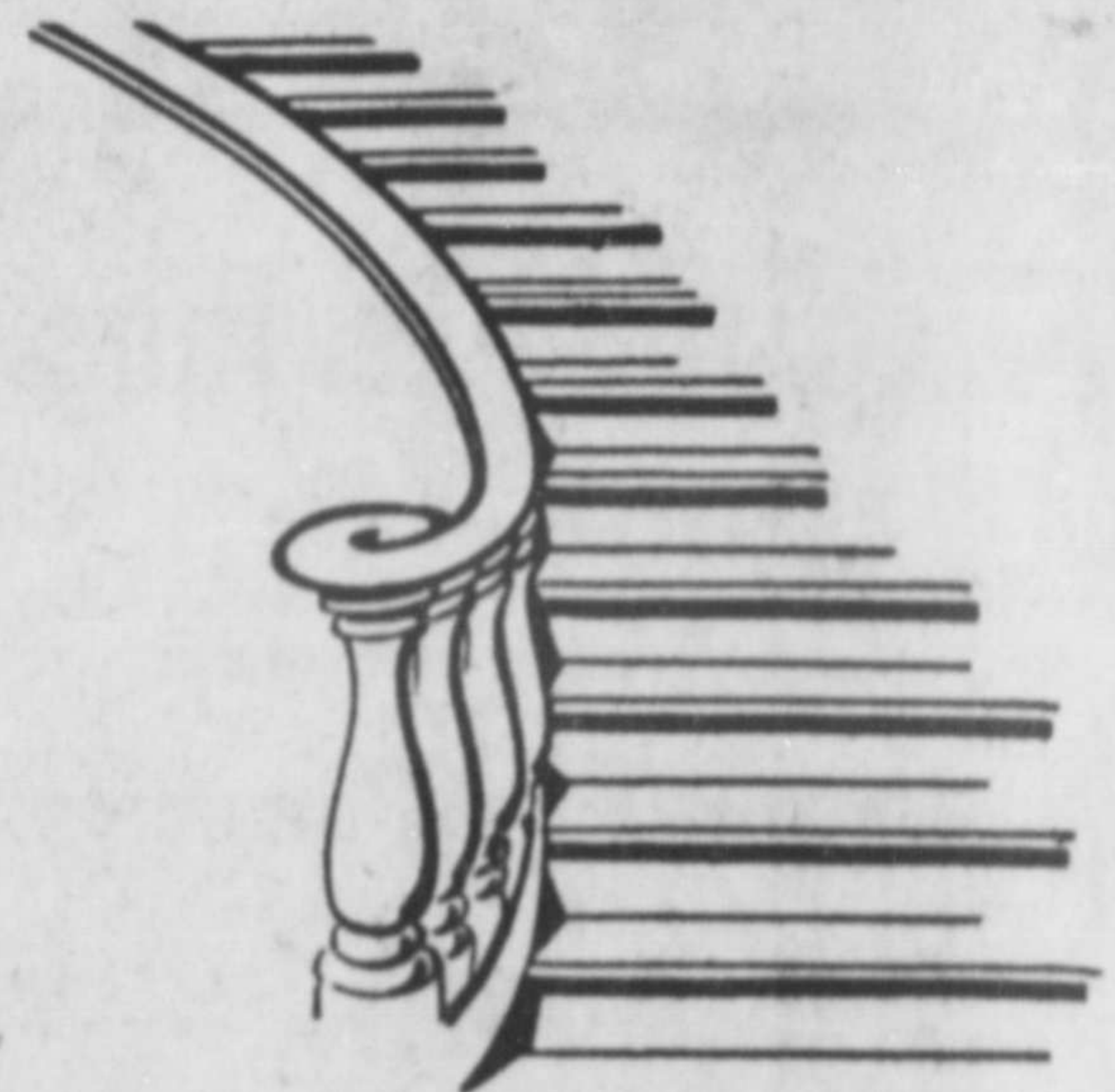
