ARSON TRIAL IS NEARING CONCLUSION

VOLCANOES ARE BECOMING ACTIVE IN WESTERN ALASKA

Crown Completes Its Evidence; Defence Is Not Entered in Case

Police Officers Principal Witnesses Against E. C. Dawson at Hearing This Morning—Statements Made by Accused to Officers are Presented

When the Assize Court rose for luncheon today all the evidence in the case of Rex versus Dawson had been presented. Contrary to expectations no evidence was presented for the defence. For the prosecution it was shown from the evidence of police constables and others that a quantity of personal effects of the accused and his wife and family had been stored just previous to the fire in the sheds at the back of the property. Even bed clothes and children's toys and letters with the postmark of three days previous to the fire were there. One policeman said he saw Mrs. Dawson in the lane back of the house a few minutes before the fire. It developed in course of evidence that the insurance money had been paid over as part of it had already gone to satisfy a mortgage held by a sister, Mrs. Dorothy Helen Lewis. This afternoon counsel will be heard on both sides and the judge will charge the jury and it is expected a verdict will be reached today.

Sister of Accused
 Mrs. Dorothy Helen Lewis, a sister of accused, identified some of the articles found in a trunk in the buildings at the back of the property as toys that she saw on a Christmas tree on the afternoon of December 23 and a box containing personal belongings was similar to one she had seen in the bedroom of accused. She was in church at the time of the fire. She admitted having received \$1515 in satisfaction of a mortgage, the money coming from the insurance company.

APPOINTMENT IS CONFIRMED

(Canadian Press)
VICTORIA, May 6:—Appointment of W. J. Alder of Victoria as commissioner for the city of Prince Rupert was ratified by the provincial government yesterday.

L. H. Kenney gave evidence in regard to the insurance and mortgage. Sgt. Fairbairn told of noticing what looked like a small brush fire at about 8:20 p.m. on Christmas evening. Fifteen minutes later he had gone to the fire. Previous to the fire he had driven past the end of the lane that ran past the back of the Dawson house and had seen Mrs. Dawson in the lane with the baby carriage.

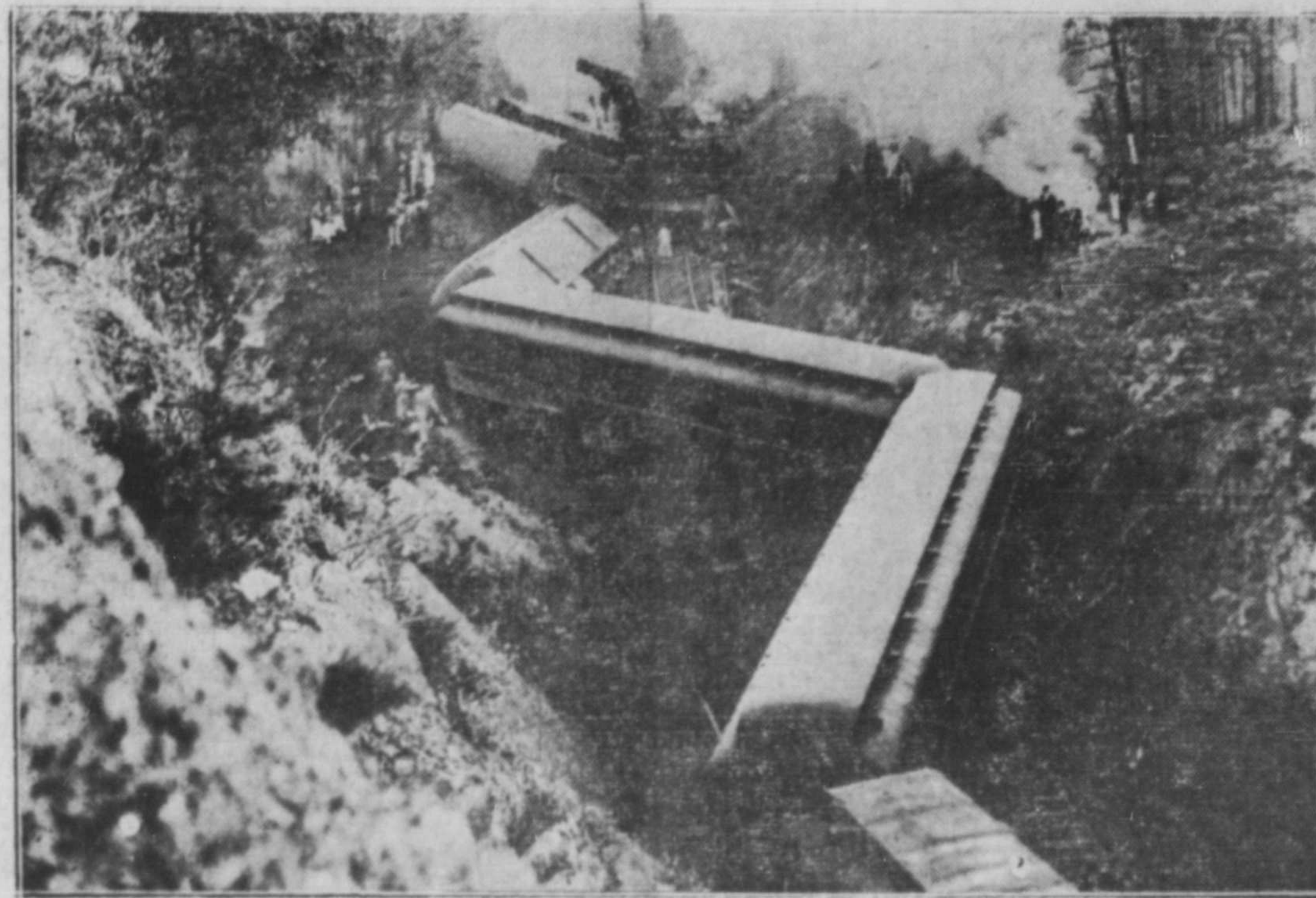
Constable Oland, also of the Smithers detachment of the provincial police, told of finding quantities of personal effects of accused and his family stored in the buildings back from the Dawson house. He explained to the jury how many of these things seemed to have been hurriedly jammed into the trunks and other receptacles containing them. The hockey skates were hanging on the wall and there was a bundle of bedding apparently thrown in as if taken from the burning building.

Among the effects were letters and circulars bearing such dates as December 22, December 19, and one seemed to have a Smithers postmark December 25.

Under cross-examination, Oland said that it was quite possible that the things might have been picked up in a hurry and thrown into the trunks and other containers. They had been also shuffled around a good deal since the police had at first taken charge of them.

Statements by Accused
 Constable William Smith told of statements which had been made by the accused after the fire on the same night. According to these statements, after having had supper about 6:30 p.m., accused and his wife left the house (which was burned) about 7:30 p.m. and went to the Champion house where they delivered a hymn book to the elder Mrs. Dawson before she went to church. Accused had left a fire burning in the kitchen range and had also put two and a half blocks of wood in the airtight heater. He had bolted the back door and locked the front door everything in the house appeared to be in good shape. After calling at the Champion home, accused and his wife went to Pope's where the latter picked up her little girl. Accused was pushing the smaller baby in its sleigh. They were taking the children for a walk before putting them to bed and had intended going to Mrs. Lewis' house. Just before getting there, however, they heard shouts of fire and accused turned back and found that it was his own home on fire. This was about 8:15 p.m. Accused was (Continued on Page Four)

Killed In Georgia Train Wreck

SPEAKS ON SILVER AT GATHERING

Chamber of Commerce Hears Address From President of Smithers Board of Trade

At the meeting of the Prince Rupert Chamber of Commerce last night in the City Hall, an interesting address was given by L. S. McGill, president of the Smithers and District Board of Trade, on the re-monetizing of silver. He urged that the greatest degree of co-operation possible should be the rule between the various communities of the north. The chief difficulty was the matter of distance. He suggested that a good time to get together would be at the meeting of the Associated Chambers of Commerce of Central British Columbia which was to be held at Smithers this summer. He gave a general invitation to all the Prince Rupert members to attend.

With the people of his district, Mr. McGill said, the price of silver was the important subject today. If the price advanced there would be great activity. His board had taken the stand that silver must be re-monetized. They did not expect to be a great factor in this international question which was being urged, among others, by Hon. H. H. Stevens, federal minister of trade and commerce, but it was the united influence of all sections which would bring the desired end about. It would not only give a reasonable deflation but would at once stir up the silver industry in which this part of the province was so greatly interested. With the re-establishment of silver currency the buying power of the Orient would be increased and Oriental trade would at once receive a tremendous impetus. This was plank number one in the Smithers Board of Trade program.

John Dybhavn, president of the local chamber, thanked Mr. McGill for his illuminating address.

CRATERS BURNING

Mount Iliamna Has Been Erupting From Three Vents For Last Ten Days

ANCHORAGE, Alaska, May 6: (Canadian Press)—Huge volumes of smoke are being emitted from three vents on Mount Iliamna since the severe earthquake shocks of ten days ago, according to word which has been received here.

Earthquake shocks have been occurring more or less continuously since the first disturbance and old timers of the district fear that there may be additional volcanic action.

ALABAMA HAS BIG TORNADO

Nineteen Persons Killed Yesterday When Storm Visits West-Central Communities of State

BIRMINGHAM, Ala., May 6: (Canadian Press)—Nineteen persons were killed and more than two hundred injured by a tornado that swept three west central Alabama communities yesterday.

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WARM RAIN IS NEEDED

Would Speed Up Crop Germination—Alberta Land Cold and Backward

WINNIPEG, May 6:—In Southern Manitoba, wheat seeding is general, some sections reporting a high as 90 per cent being already sown and a few farmers have finished their wheat land according to the Canadian National Railways' weekly report. The ground is in excellent condition with plenty of moisture but a warm rain would materially speed up germination. Considerable deposits of grasshopper eggs are reported from many southern points but farmers are optimistic that weather conditions and some small insects have destroyed egg groups to some extent. In Central Manitoba heavy frosts at night have held up seeding. About 25 per cent of the wheat has been sown. The cool weather has made pasture growth slow and warmer temperatures are required. In the Dauphin-Swanriver valley, areas the cool weather made working conditions ideal and seeding made rapid progress but activities are still ten days later than usual.

In Saskatchewan
 Throughout the whole of Saskatchewan moisture conditions are at present better than at this time last year. Along the Avonlea-Gravelbourg-Riverhurst-Glenavon subdivisions weather has been fair and cool with growth slow and winds have been high but no damage from soil drifting is reported. Wheat seeding varies from 10 per cent to 50 per cent completed. Soil is in good shape for germination, but early rains are necessary to assure strong growth.

In West-Central Saskatchewan
 Conditions are somewhat patchy. Most districts report sufficient surface moisture for germination, but sub-soil conditions could be improved. In the northerly districts work on the land has commenced on a small scale but will not be general until next week. In the northwestern section farm work delayed by a slight snow fall and rains so that surface moisture conditions are satisfactory.

In Alberta
 The territories which centre on the Goose Lake line in Alberta report weather cloudy and cool with scattered showers, which, in some localities, delayed seeding. Conditions at present appear bright as the soil has ample moisture for germination. In Central Alberta precipitation has varied from light snow storms to moderately heavy showers, while in some districts winds have been high but no soil drifting is reported. Warm weather is needed as the land is still cold and backward.

The late snows of Peace River district have now melted and fine weather prevails. In a few scattered districts work has started and should be fairly general next week.

Stock Market
 Liberal supplies of cattle featured offerings on all central stock yards at the beginning of the week, but trade remained active and prices held in line with those of the previous week. As the week wore on the supply moderated and good butcher cattle strengthened in price 25c to 75c per cwt. Hog prices have fluctuated a little but the undertone still indicates strength. This tendency should be maintained.

PRISONERS ON STRIKE

Inmates of Kingston Pen Refuse to Take Food For While But Later Weaken

KINGSTON, Ont., May 6: (Canadian Press)—At least one hundred convicts in Kingston Penitentiary have been on hunger strike, Warden W. B. Megloughlin said yesterday. At noon, more than seventy-five per cent of the strikers were eating again and, by today, it was expected all convicts would again be taking their meals.

TAXATION DOUBLING

Dominion and Provincial Officials Working Together on Problem of Duplication

OTTAWA, May 6: (Canadian Press)—Dominion and provincial financial officials are working together with a view to reaching an understanding on duplication of taxation, Hon. Edgar N. Rhodes, minister of finance, stated in the House of Commons yesterday.

Son of Mahatma Fears His Death

LONDON, Eng., May 6:—Devida Gandhi, son of Mahatma Gandhi, sobbed audibly over a telephone when the London Daily Express called him at Poona, India, and declared that, if his father persisted in his intention to fast for three weeks, he would surely die.

A SATURDAY SERMON

The Night Cometh

(Rev. Canon W. F. Rushbrook, St. Peter's Anglican Church)

"I must work the works of Him that sent me, whilst it is day: the night cometh when no man can work."—Jesus.

On the dial of the watch of the famous Dr. Johnson there were written three Greek words, from this statement of Jesus, namely, "The night cometh."

In 1797 Walter Scott read Boswell's life of Johnson. He was struck with the terse epigram

and made it his own. "If, I thought Scott, 'I am to accomplish anything I must strive while I may.' So he had the words 'the night cometh' carved in stone on the sundial of his cottage home, Lasswade on the banks of the Usk, and under its inspiration he worked as few men have.

Both Johnson and Scott, while they dreaded death as the cessation of life's activities, yet, from their contact with the Master, Jesus, through his text, found comfort in death.

Of the former, in his biography, we read, "When at length the moment, dreaded through so many years, came close, the dark cloud passed away from Johnson's mind. His temper became unusually patient and gentle. He ceased to think with terror of death and of that which lies beyond death and he spoke much of the mercy of God and the propitiation of Christ. His faith triumphed over his fears and he confidently resigned his soul to his Savior."

ARSON CASE PROCEEDING

Fifteen Witnesses Heard Up to Yesterday Afternoon in E. C. Dawson Trial

Crown Evidence

Father, Mother and Sister of Accused Among Those Giving Testimony

Fifteen witnesses had been heard up to adjournment Friday evening in the Supreme Court Assize case here in which Ernest Claude Dawson of Smithers is charged with arson in connection with a fire which destroyed the house of his mother, Mrs. Mary Dawson, at Smithers on Christmas night last.

Afternoon Session

The first witness at yesterday afternoon's session of the trial was Mrs. Mary Dawson, mother of accused and owner of the burned house. She thought that her son had the fire insurance policy at the time of the fire. She knew of no dealings, however, in regard to the fire insurance in which her son had taken part. She had been ill for some weeks previous to the fire. Indeed, Christmas Day was the first occasion on which she had left the house, having gone with her husband, son and the latter's wife and family to the home of Mrs. Champion, witness' daughter, for Christmas dinner, attending church in the evening.

Under cross-examination, Mrs. Dawson said that an heirloom brooch which was found among the son's effects in the trunks in the garage after the fire had been given by her to accused for the little granddaughter. Witness had dusted the day before Christmas and saw that the chimney had dropped. During the week before Christmas an airtight heater in the living room had exploded and the lid flew off. The legs of this stove were also defective. Mrs. Lewis, another daughter of accused, had had an \$1800 mortgage on the house and \$1500 insurance had been paid over to her, witness receiving \$500 insurance on the furniture. Early last year the accused had made a payment of \$1000 to Mrs. Lewis against the mortgage but no interest in the house or insurance had ever been turned over by her (Mrs. Dawson sr.) to the son.

Mrs. Annie E. Champion, sister of accused, told of the younger Dawson and his wife leaving her house, following Christmas dinner there, about 4 o'clock in the afternoon and returning about 7:30 in the evening. Witness then went to church and had been called from there on account of the fire.

Accused's Suit

Stanley Noble was one of the guests at Champion's for Christmas dinner. He had previously been at the Dawson house and had helped accused to lock up the doors. He had seen accused in the evening at the fire. Witness identified a suit which was taken from one of the trunks which had been in the garage as being the one that accused had worn at Christmas dinner.

George M. Carruthers testified to having seen accused on Christmas day at the home of "Grandma" DeVoin where Mrs. Lewis lived.

Roy Pope, living next door to the house which was burned, told of having heard accused in his house about half an hour before the fire. His (accused's) little daughter had been in witness' house and he had called to say that he would be back in a few minutes to get her.

Mrs. Dawson jr. called a few minutes later and took the child away. After the fire, accused with his wife and family had stayed at Pope's house for the night.

Mrs. Alta May Pope, who was frequently in the Dawson house and had been there on Christmas Day, testified that certain toys and clothing taken from the trunks and other containers had been seen by her in the Dawson house as late as Christmas morning. She had also seen three of the trunks in question in the Dawson kitchen during the week preceding Christmas. They had explained that the trunks were getting wet inside the house and they were planning on taking them out to the garage and shed. Young Dawson and his wife had put out a big washing on Christmas eve. Under cross-examination, Mrs. Pope said that she had seen no making trips between the Dawson house and outbuildings on Christmas Day.

Mrs. Annie Mary Monks, being on the street nearby at the time of the fire, went to the Dawson house and,

while on her way there, had been overtaken by accused who said: "For God's sake, let me pass." Mrs. Monks helped to remove bed clothing from the burning house.

Percy Davidson who was at the fire, testified that accused had said, referring to the garage, "For God's sake, don't let this building burn."

William F. Duff told of helping to remove blankets from one of the bedrooms. Accused had come up and excitedly cried: "For God's sake save something. It's all we've got."

Donald Collison told of calling at Champion's to take Mrs. Mary Dawson to church.

Dudley Little also testified as to helping to remove stuff from the burning building.

Assistant Fire Marshal

Ernest Haan, assistant fire marshal at Smithers, who was the first on hand after the fire alarm, told of using one fire extinguisher in the effort to put the fire out. Had he had an additional one, he believed he might have been successful in doing so as the fire, was at first confined to the dining room only. The flames spread rapidly, however, and, by the time the fire engine arrived, the house was doomed. Accused had said at the time that the garage and shed contained "only empty trunks and junk." Under cross-examination witness was positive that accused had said "only empty trunks and junk." He (witness) believed he was misreported in the preliminary trial and fire marshal's inquiry where he was credited with testifying that accused had said "just old stuff and junk." Witness at first said that the lid had been tightly on the crumpled heater which was found in the ruins of the house but, under cross-examination, admitted that he was not at all sure about this.

Lewis Austin and William Hugh Lewis were tendered as witnesses for cross-examination but no questions were asked of either.

At 8 o'clock court adjourned until 10:30 this morning. Mr. Justice Denis Murphy is the presiding judge with L. S. McGill acting as crown prosecutor and J. T. Harvey defending.

Miss Beverly Bryant, who has been teaching school at Metlakatla, sailed last night on the Princess Adelaide for her home in Victoria. She is not returning north.

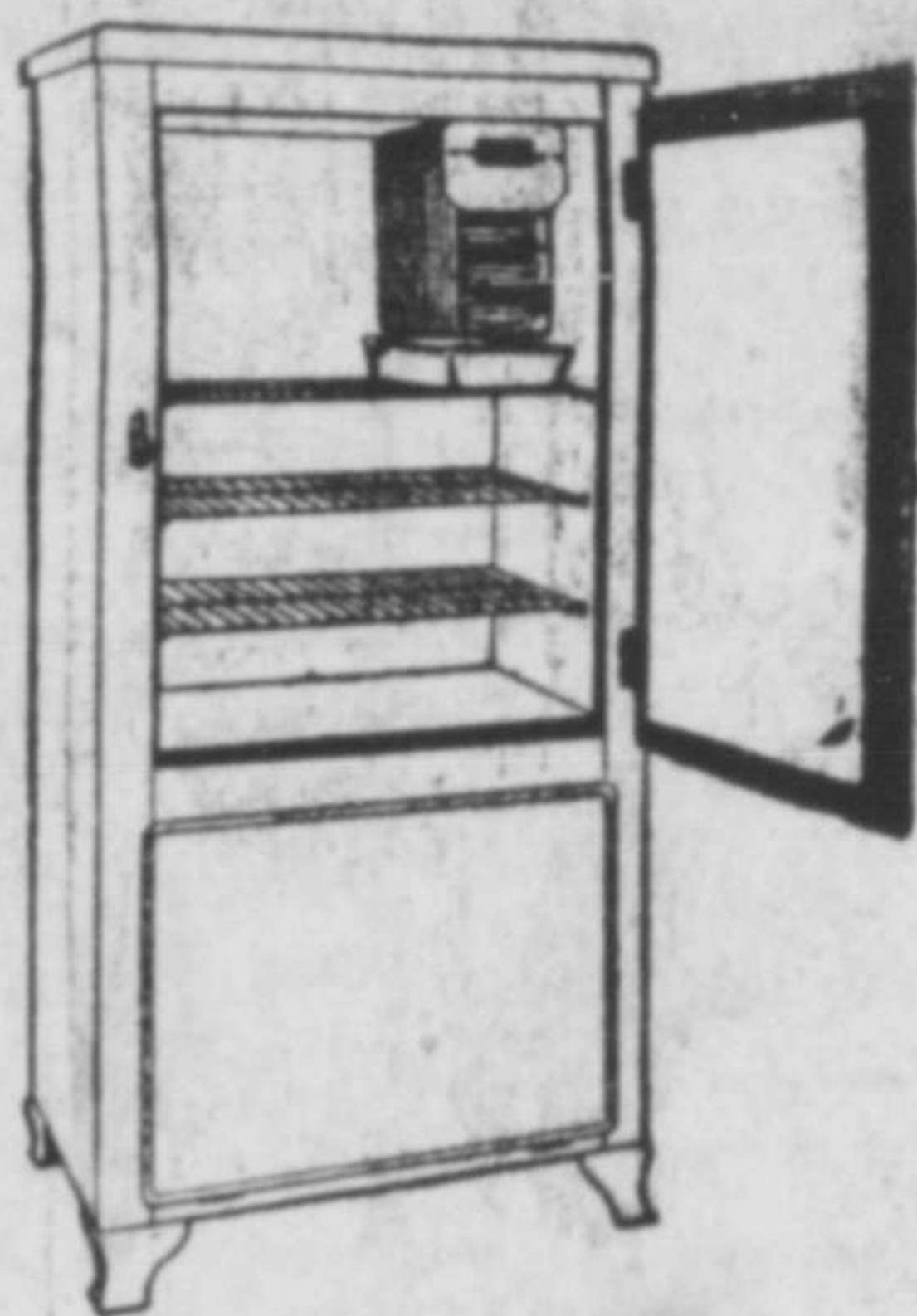

Machine Shops Are Busy—Cold Storage Packing Fleet Leaving—Lumber For Oceanic

The canneries have started sending in considerable work and there has also been a good deal of activity in connection with the trolling fleet. What with a number of new boats going into commission and several changes being made, there have also been a number of new engine installations and further are in prospect.

New Boat at Juneau

The latest new boat to be built at Juneau is the 30-foot Mary J. which will be operated by Hackett Smith of Juneau on the Taku River. The vessel has been built by Woodman and Bernsten and is said to be a very speedy craft, being equipped with a 75 h.p. engine.

Armour, head of the Armour Salvage Co., made a trip on Thursday afternoon with the Winemac to Oceanic Cannery with a load of lumber to be used in connection with the reconditioning of the canning plant there which has been purchased from the B. C. Packers by Robert C. Gosse and C. Gillespie and which is being put in operation this season after having been idle for the past two years.

The salmon packing fleet of the Canadian Fish & Cold Storage Co. will be in operation during the coming week, starting out considerably earlier than usual this spring. The Chief Seagay, in command of Capt. Fred Walters, is leaving tomorrow on her first trip to North Island. The Chief Legaic, Capt. Harold Casperson, left on Thursday for Squadare, Stephens Island, with the company's camp. The Warke Canal camp will be taken out later.

Rev. Canon W. F. Rushbrook, the highly esteemed rector of St. Peter's Anglican Church at Seal Cove, will be returning for relief duty to his old love, the mission boat Northern Cross, which he commanded with such eminent success for so many years, for the months of July and August this year. It is understood, Rev. W. B. Jennings, who has been in charge of the marine work of the church for the past two or three years, has been appointed to a new ministry on the prairies and will be leaving at the end of this month. The permanent appointment to succeed Mr. Jennings will be announced later. Meantime, Canon Rushbrook will receive a hearty welcome back to service from his legion of friends along the coast.

There were no halibut boats in with catches so no session of bidding was held on the Prince Rupert Fish Exchange this morning.
