Late George Reginald Gray of Salt Ste. Marie for Years Was Champion Shotputter

Great Career

Was Identified With Timber and Paper Business and Headed Number of Companies

SAULT STE. MARIE, Ont., Jan. 12: (Canadian Press)-George Reginald Gray, president of the Kaministiqua Power Co., director of a number of other important industrial enterprises in this district and one of the greatest amateur athletes Canada has ever acclaimed is dead here at the age of 67 years.

Born at Coldwater, Ont., May 4 1865, the late Mr. Gray was educa ted at Coldwater and Orillia Public and High Schools. Becoming prominent in athletics at an early age he was world's champion sixteenpound shotputter and for 17 years was champion of Canada and the United States. In 1888 he won the 16 to 8, English title at Crewe and Huddersfield and the Irish title at Ballsbridge. Dublin. At the World's Fair in Chicago in 1893 he set a world's record of 47 feet. 




