OTTAWA, July 29: (Canadian Press)—The Dominion government has obtained renewal of a \$50,000,000 loan from the chartered banks of Canada at 37% interest, it was announced by the finance department today. The old loan falls due on August 1. It is said to be the first occasion in recent years that the Dominion has been able to borrow money at less than 4%.



# IS HEARD

Rolston Outlines His Platform Before Meeting At Stewart

STEWART, July 29- Before an audience of about ninety persons, H. W. M. Rolston, Independent candidate for Atlin in the forthcoming provincial election, made his first campaign speech in his home town on Tuesday evening at the Canadian Legion Hall, H. P. Gibson acted as Chairman.

In his opening remarks Mr. Rolston explained the reasons for his recent trip to Anyox, stating that there has been a large number of requests by local people for him to run as an Independent but that he felt it advisable to test the feeling in other parts of the riding before coming to a decision. 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
