

Fears Expressed That Peter Verigin Might Be Executed in Russia

Heads of Organization Arrive in Halifax in Time to See Their Chief Before He Sails on Montcalm Tonight

HALIFAX, N.S., Feb. 4:-A big red monoplane dropped down today on the snow-streaked turf of the Halifax airport and a race was won. Peter Makaroff, J. P. Shukin and H. F. Reibin had reached this city in time to see Peter Verigin before the Doukhobor chieftain sails for Russia as a deportee from Canada on the ss. Montcalm tonight.

They left Boston this morning, Shukin having come from Brilliant, B.C. by plane and Makaroff and Reibin from Winnipeg. The parties joined at Boston.

Interviewed at St. John both Reibin and Makaroff expressed the fear that Veregin would be execuated on

He plans to leave the Lympne Aerodrome Monday and should reach Port Natal, Brazil, in three and a half days via Senegal, French West Africa, whence he will take off for the hazardous venture across the South lantic.
