## ROOSEVELT IS MEETING OPPOSITION LARGE PARTY OF INTERIOR VISITORS DUE HERE TONIGHT

### Seventy-Five Persons Coming This Evening On Special Excursion

Terrace to Have Largest Delegation, Numbering Twenty-Five or More—Dinner to be Tendered on Thursday Evening

Some seventy-five visitors are expected in town from various interior points aboard tonight's train on the special cent-a-mile round trip fare excursion which has been put on by the Canadian National Railways. Some fifty are known to be coming from various agency points between Terrace and Prince George with about twenty-five from Terrace. Those coming from non-agency points are more or less of an uncertain quantity as they will buy their tickets on the train. The train was reported this morning to be due to arrive on time at 10 p.m.

### ROOSEVELT AT CAPITAL

Chief Executive of United States Back in Washington After Two Weeks at Warm Springs

WASHINGTON, D.C., Dec. 5.—Appearing to be greatly benefitted as a result of the two weeks' change, President Franklin D. Roosevelt returned to Washington yesterday from Warm Springs, Ga., and was soon back at work at his office in the White House with many critical problems requiring his immediate attention.

### Vancouver Boy Rhodes Scholar

Patrick Duncan McTaggart Cowan, Aged 22, Awarded Coveted Scholastic Honor

VANCOUVER, Dec. 5: (CP)—Patrick Duncan McTaggart Cowan, 22-year old son of Mr. and Mrs. McTaggart Cowan of North Vancouver, has been chosen British Columbia Rhodes scholar for the year from a list of thirteen candidates. He was born in Edinburgh, Scotland and has lived here nine years.

### Canadian Dollar on New York Exchange

NEW YORK, Dec. 5: (CP)—After much fluctuation during the course of the day, the British pound sterling closed at \$5.08 1/4 and the Canadian dollar at \$1.01 1/4 on the local foreign exchange yesterday. The French franc closed at .0602. All were off considerably for the day.

### Shot By Burglar; Dies In Toronto

TORONTO, Dec. 2:—Johnny Cox, well known Toronto rugby player died here yesterday from wounds sustained last Thursday night when he was shot by a burglar.

### Devoted Mother and Three Children Safe in Hospital At Ketchikan After Wreck

KETCHIKAN, Dec. 5: (CP)—Mrs. R. H. Cameron and three children were safe in hospital here yesterday after a harrowing shipwreck experience. Three days ago a small gasboat with Mr. and Mrs. Cameron and a man companion, John Valchek on board crashed during a storm into the side of a rocky island and sank almost immediately, those aboard being barely able to escape to shore with their lives. After building a fire, Cameron and the other man set out in the dinghy to get help. The dinghy swamped and Mrs. Cameron, seeing this, believed the two men had perished. A short time later, the tide came up and almost extinguished the fire but Mrs. Cameron was able to carry the embers to higher ground and re-ignite it and keep it going. Cameron and the other man, after the swamping of the dinghy, had been able to struggle ashore and reach a fox farmer who summoned a forest patrol vessel. Mrs. Cameron and her children were rescued after being marooned for two days.

### GRAIN KING IS CHOSEN

Frank Isakson of Elfros, Sask., Gets Prize at Big Show In Chicago

CHICAGO, Dec. 5: (CP)—Frank Isakson of Elfros, Sask., with an exhibit of Reward wheat, was yesterday awarded the title of Wheat King at the International Hay and Grain Exposition here. William Rogers of Tappen, B.C. carried off the reserve championship in the wheat sweepstakes with mindum type of Durum. This is the eleventh occasion on which the coveted award has been received by a Saskatchewan farmer. Alberta has won eight times and Manitoba once.

### DRY LAW DEFUNCT

United States Wet Again Today After Thirteen Years of Aridity

WASHINGTON, D.C., December 5.—National prohibition, which was imposed in 1919, came to an end in the United States today with the issuance by President Franklin D. Roosevelt of an official proclamation of repeal of the Eighteenth Amendment. In twenty states of the Union it became legal today to sell strong liquor and half a dozen more are rushing through legislation whereby it will be legalized before the end of the year.

### Manner of Sale

Strong Liquor To Be Dispensed Across Line More Freely Than Here

WASHINGTON, D.C., December 5.—With the legalization of liquor, the new revenue becoming available to the federal government thereby, it is expected that a number of the so-called "nuisance taxes" will soon be repealed. Utah delegates, casting their official ballot today unanimously in favor of repeal following the recent referendum, made that state the twentieth in which sale of liquor becomes legal today.

### Members of Royal Air Force Killed

PEWSEY, Wiltshire, Eng., Dec. 5: (CP)—Pilot Officer C. Llewellyn and Sergeant J. C. Hopkins of the Royal Air Force were killed yesterday when their plane crashed in flames.

### Three Million Men Get Employment on U. S. Public Works

WASHINGTON, D.C., December 5.—A total of three million men have been returned to employment in this country as a result of various undertakings instituted by the public works administration, it is announced by Secretary of the Interior Ickus.

### ITALY FEELS LEAGUE OF NATIONS IMPOTENT

ROME, Dec. 5:—The Fascist Grand Council, following a meeting here today, issued a statement expressing Italy's opinion that, without participation of such nations as United States, Russia, Japan and Germany, the League of Nations had lost its effectiveness in connection with international affairs.

### Upward Swing In Britain Continues. Many Employed

LONDON, Dec. 5:—British industry continues its steady upward swing. The number of employed on November 20 numbered 31,000 more than on the same day in the previous month and 597,000 more than a year ago.

### EARNINGS INCREASE

Substantial Improvement Reported By Two British Lines Operating To Far East

LONDON, Dec. 5:—The P. and O. and Orient Lines, both of which operate steamship services to Australasia and the Orient, announce substantial increases in revenue for the past fiscal year in comparison with the one immediately previous. The P. and O. Line announces an increase in receipts for the year of \$1,500,000 while the Orient Line announces profits increased by \$900,000.

### FUNERAL OF SIR ARTHUR

Last Rites For Great Canadian Soldier Solemnized With Full Military Honors

MONTREAL, Nov. 5: (CP)—With full military honors and representatives of all phases of Canadian public and educational life in attendance, the funeral took place here today of General Sir Arthur Currie, principal of McGill University and commander-in-chief of the Canadian Army Corps in France during the latter part of the Great War.

### RELIEF IS DISCUSSED

Pattullo and Other Western Premiers in Session—New Proposals Made

VICTORIA, Dec. 5: (CP)—About mid-way through the conference of the premiers of the four western provinces here yesterday, Premier T. D. Pattullo of British Columbia announced that new plans for taking care of single unemployed men had been under discussion. General proposals on the subject of unemployment relief would be submitted to the federal government following the conference, Premier Pattullo stated.

### CONFERENCE IN SESSION

Twenty-One Nations Represented At Pan-American Gathering In Montevideo

### Many Problems

Mexican Delegate Makes Proposal For Central Bank and Silver Currency

MONTEVIDEO, Uruguay, Dec. 5:—With twenty-one nations represented including United States and practically all the republics of South and Central America, the seventh Pan-American Conference opened its sessions here on Sunday.

Secretary of State Cordell Hull is the head of the United States delegation which includes Mrs. Breckenridge, it being the first occasion on which women have been admitted as delegates to the conference. Trade and financial problems affecting the various nations of North and South America will provide the main subject of discussion. At the opening a plea was made for restoration of peace among conflicting nations of South America. Yesterday the head of the Mexican delegation offered a drastic proposal for the establishment of a central banking system for United States, Central and South America and the setting up of a new Pan-American currency backed at least in part by silver.

### ARRAIGNED IN CHICAGO

Trial of Dr. Alice Wynnekoop, On Charge of Slaying Daughter-in-Law, Set For January

CHICAGO, December 5.—Dr. Alice Wynnekoop was arraigned here yesterday on a charge of murder in connection with the strange death of her daughter-in-law, Mrs. Rheta Wynnekoop, whose dead body was found recently on an operating room table in the basement of Dr. Wynnekoop's mansion here and who is alleged to have been shot after an overdose of chloroform had been administered. Dr. Wynnekoop pleaded not guilty to the charge and the trial was set for early in January. The 62-year old woman physician collapsed after rising from the cot in her cell before being taken to the courtroom.

### Cattle Stealing Charge is Laid

Serious Allegation Laid Against Two Bella Coola Men—Cow Belonged to Indians

Inspector John A. Fraser, provincial police, called this afternoon for Ocean Falls where he will conduct the prosecution in a cattle stealing case from Bentinck Arm in the Bella Coola district. Two men, John L. Fisher and Garfield Gernyn, are charged with shooting and butchering a cow belonging to Indians. They were arrested at the south end of Bentinck Arm on McCoskrie Island in Johnston Channel. They have engaged counsel from Vancouver for the defence.

### President of United States Criticised On His Financial Policy

Republicans Charge Chief Executive With Trying to Set Up Dictatorship by Muzzling Public Opinion—Reorganization Coming?

WASHINGTON, D.C., Dec. 5:—President Franklin D. Roosevelt is continuing to meet with increasing opposition and criticism both from within and without his party in connection with his fiscal and monetary program. Yesterday the Republican national committee issued a statement charging the president with trying to establish a dictatorship by suppressing public opinion. It alleged that the chief executive was attempting to muzzle the press and radio. "The financial policy of the president is not working because it is not workable," the statement, issued in pamphlet form, said. A new reorganization of the president's economic and fiscal advisory staff is expected before the end of the year. Secretary of the Treasury William Woodin, now taking leave of absence owing to illness, is expected to resign as well as other officials of the Treasury Department.

### Herbert Marler Is Worse Again

Canadian Minister to Japan, Who Has Had Pneumonia, Suffers Relapse Yesterday

TOKYO, Dec. 5: (CP)—Hon. Herbert M. Marler, Canadian minister to Japan, recovering from an attack of pneumonia, suffered a relapse yesterday and returned to hospital which he had left only Sunday for home.

### HEARST IS VITRIOLIC

Delivers Sharp Attack Upon Former Governor Smith For Opposition To Roosevelt Plan

NEW YORK, Dec. 5:—William Randolph Hearst, newspaper publisher, has made a sharp attack upon former Governor Alfred E. Smith for his opposition to President Franklin D. Roosevelt's currency plans. Hearst makes the statement that Smith represents the factor in United States financial affairs which "has robbed and plundered the country before and wishes to do so again."

### Northern Pioneers In Big Re-union

Nine Hundred Sourdoughs Gather At Function in Seattle—Eat Moose-Meat

SEATTLE, Dec. 5:—Nine hundred sourdoughs, including a large delegation from Vancouver, ate moose meat at the annual reunion of the Alaska-Yukon Pioneers' Association here.

### SILVER AND COPPER ON NEW YORK MART

NEW YORK, Dec. 5: (CP)—Silver closed at 43 1/2c on the local metal market yesterday and copper at 8c.

### CONTROLLING EXCHANGES

New Federal Legislation To Be Introduced at Forthcoming Session of United States Congress

WASHINGTON, D.C., December 5.—It was announced yesterday that legislation would be introduced at the forthcoming session of Congress by Senator Fletcher of Florida providing new federal regulations for the control of trading on the stock exchanges of this country.

### Impeachment Of Rolph is Asked

Resolution Making This Request Passed by Los Angeles Lawyers' Club

LOS ANGELES, December 5.—The Los Angeles Lawyer's Club passed a resolution yesterday asking for the impeachment of Governor James Rolph by the State Assembly for his attitude in connection with the lynching of Thurmond and Jack Holmes, kidnap-murderers of Brooke Hart of San Jose.

### Light Trading In Stock Mart

New York Exchange Had Quietest Day Yesterday Since April With Little Change in Values

NEW YORK, December 5.—Yesterday was marked by the lightest trading on the New York Stock Exchange since last April. The industrial average at closing was 98.89, off .78; rails, \$38.54, up .43; utilities, 23.20, up .18, and bonds, 81.12, up .46.
