## MARTIAL RULE IN GERMANY TODAY

## CONTRACT LET IN CITY FOR REBUILDING PART OF DOCK

### Germany Ruled Today by Rod of Iron Under Practical Martial Law

Cabinet Decided That Police Shall Be All Powerful Under Fascist Regime in That Country

BERLIN, Feb. 28.—Germany is to be ruled with a rod of iron under Chancellor Adolph Hitler. What is virtually martial law under police regime was decided upon today by the German cabinet. In putting down any attempts at overthrow of the government by Communists nothing is to be left to chance. The present government, which came into power on a policy of firmness, intends to carry out its policy and is backed by the president.

### SALVAGING OF ISLANDER IS STOPPED

Diver Used Special Kind of Diving Suit for Operations in Effort To Recover Lost Treasure

JUNEAU, Feb. 28.—Operations of Capt. A. J. La Gasa, president of the Alaska Salvage and Wrecking Company, at the scene of the Islander wreck off the end of Douglas Island have ceased for the time being. Capt. LaGasa returned to Juneau with his crew of four on the motorship Sitka which was chartered by the company from I. Goldstein.

Capt. La Gasa has been diving at the scene of the wreck and conducting operations there for the last six weeks in an effort to salvage the fortune reputed to have sunk with the vessel many years ago. He has been using a diving suit resembling a suit of armor invented by himself and a diving bell with telephone and other necessary equipment.

#### Still Confident

Though Capt. LaGasa has made a number of dives and contracted the vessel it is not known now whether or not the operations will continue. Capt. LaGasa feels confident that anything which is on the wreck can be procured and brought to the surface with the aid of his diving equipment, but the progress is necessarily slow.

A reorganization of the company has been spoken of and may take place at a meeting of the officers of the company to take place in the near future, at which time further plans will be decided upon.

### Contract is Let For Repair of Dock at Cold Storage Plant at Cost of Approximately \$5,000

A contract has been let for the rebuilding of a portion of the dock at the plant of the Canadian Fish & Cold Storage Company at Seal Cove and work will commence on it very soon. George Kelsey has the contract for the work and the material will be purchased direct by the company. The cost of the job will be in the neighborhood of \$5,000.

### PATTULLO MOTION IS VOTED OUT

VICTORIA, Feb. 28.—The want of confidence motion brought before the Legislature yesterday on motion of T. D. Pattullo did not have much chance of acceptance. The leader of the opposition spoke on the debate on the address in reply to the speech from the throne and after giving numerous reasons why the Tolmie government should resign moved a want of confidence motion. It was defeated 33 to 11.

### Credit System For Taxes is Suggestion

Ald. Basso-Bert proposed at the city council last night that a letter be sent to the provincial government asking if a credit system could not be arranged so that a householder could obtain credit in these hard times to enable him to pay his taxes. It was the general opinion of the meeting that it was a step in the right direction but useless as the government was up to its neck in debt now. The motion carried.

### Doctors' Claim Before Council Last Evening

A letter from Dr. Large, secretary of the Prince Rupert Medical Association, was read at the city council meeting last night, asking that steps be taken so that the doctors of the city would get some compensation for the medical attention they give the unemployed. The letter stated that it would be impossible for the doctors to continue their practice under present conditions. In Ontario the doctors received half of the regular fee for medical attention received by unemployed. The Association hoped that a similar arrangement could be made for them here.

On motion of Ald. Casey seconded by Ald. Black the matter was left in the hands of the relief committee to take the necessary steps to put the request before the Provincial Government.

### ARRESTED LAST NIGHT

Demonstrators Tried to Prevent Men Leaving For Anyox Last Night at Vancouver

VANCOUVER, Feb. 28.—One man was arrested on a vagrancy charge last night during a clash with the police when demonstrators attempted to prevent a number of men proceeding to Anyox on the steamer Prince Rupert.

### ARBITRATION IS SUGGESTED

Council Adopts Resolution Suggesting That Parties to Strike Apply For Conciliation Board

At the city council meeting last night it was moved by Ald. Casey that a letter be written to the Granby officials and the union of strikers suggesting that they apply for an arbitration board to settle their dispute. In support of his motion he stated that it was Prince Rupert and the whole of the province that was being affected by this strike and it was the least the council could do to suggest to both parties that they come to some mutual decision soon.

Some of the aldermen thought it was not necessary for a third party to tell the strikers and Granby Co. what to do. It was up to them whether they asked for an arbitration board or not.

Ald. Casey replied that it was only a suggestion to the parties. Prince Rupert people were vitally affected by the strike. Right now the police force had been strengthened and police sent to Anyox at the time of trouble there, and the cost was all coming out of the pockets of the citizens. It was time they took some action.

After some discussion the motion passed.

### Need of Expending a Little Money Now is Emphasized Locally

Businessman Gives His Views of Situation in Prince Rupert With View to Securing Action Toward Improvement

"The more we save and cut down on expenditures now, the harder it will be for everyone to live. The more we spend, within reason, the quicker we shall see an end to the present depression." Those were the sentiments expressed by a local businessman who visited the Daily News office this morning.

### MINE OPENS AT ANYOX

Concentrator Commences Operations Thursday and Smelter Few Days Later

Word received this morning from the manager of the Granby Consolidated Mining and Smelting Company at Anyox stated that the mine there is already being operated and it was expected to resume operations at the concentrator Thursday and at the smelter a few days later.

A number of men arrived there yesterday and have gone to work.

The visitor went on to say that in Prince Rupert there were many owners of property who had buildings going to rack and ruin for lack of a little money spent on them. A few dollars now would save many dollars in future. Also he suggested that there were buildings badly in need of paint that should be attended to at once. If these buildings were attended to it would put some money in circulation and would encourage others to carry on in a more normal manner. The longer people with money held back from making necessary repairs and allowed the city to look run down, the longer it would be before conditions would begin to improve.

### H. F. M'LEOD RETIRING

Giving Up All Government Positions and Will Remain in City and Enjoy Life

H. F. McLeod, whose retirement as supreme and county court registrar and stipendiary magistrate was announced yesterday, is also retiring from the position as head of the land registry office. His position will be taken by his deputy, Andrew Thompson.

Mr. McLeod entered the government service at Nelson 31 years ago and came to Prince Rupert in 1909, right at the beginning of the existence of the city.

It is understood that Mr. McLeod, whose retirement takes effect at the end of March, will remain in the city. He is an expert amateur photographer and enjoys fishing and hunting and can find no better centre for these activities than Prince Rupert.

### JAPS SMASH OPPOSITION

SUICHUNG, Manchuria, Feb. 28.—The Japanese army smashed a stubborn resistance of Chinese forces at Shamaoshan in the southern part of the province of Jehol. Today they are occupying the town and the pass leading to the interior.

### TANK SEEN CAPE FOX

Thought it May Have Been Part of Wreckage From Halibut Boat Reliance

Two halibut boats have reported that they saw a painted air tank floating in the water off Cape Fox not far from the place where the halibut boat Reliance was last reported. Otherwise nothing has been seen or heard of the little vessel so well known in Prince Rupert. The tank may possibly have been part of the wreckage of the boat it is thought.

Workers in all departments are standing by in readiness to start when called upon. An attempt by alleged union members in Vancouver to prevent mine workers from embarking on the steamship Prince Rupert on Monday evening last was frustrated and all the men who had arranged to ship by that boat duly made the journey. It is confidently expected that the requisite number of men will be forthcoming, so that the schedule of work can be carried out as planned.

### Won Huge Prize, Became Unhappy

Calcutta "Sweep" Winner Was Dis-illusioned After His Fortunate Break

LONDON, Eng., Feb. 28.—William Kilpatrick, a dental mechanic who resided in Capt Town, South Africa, for many years but was a former resident of Leeds, England, won the rich Calcutta sweepstake in 1927 but became unhappy and soured of life and died at the age of 37. The big fortune he gained at one stroke did not bring paradise to him as he had optimistically hoped for, and it is regarded as probable that the only real joy he got out of it was that it enabled him to settle a substantial sum on his mother and sister. He was a native of Milnthorpe, Westmorland.

Kilpatrick had friends amongst the best professional and business people in Capetown despite his comparatively humble occupation, and as it was known that the horse he had drawn had won these friends formed him into a short-period limited liability company, which received his winnings. Thus he could not draw any money without his co-directors' consent. In this way he was protected against victimization for a time during the period that the "sharks" of the whole world were sure to be on his track.

He established and endowed a soup kitchen in Capetown and made other benefactions. The net sum he secured for himself was about \$300,000. He married a Johannesburg girl whom he met on board ship on his second holiday to England. That marriage was not a success and was dissolved. Last summer he again visited England, this time with his second wife, but he was not the "Kilby" his friends had known a few years before. As a dental mechanic earning about \$2,000 a year he had enjoyed life greatly in his own way, as a man of wealth he was disillusioned and considerably soured.

He slipped when getting into a motor car last October, and this led to his last illness. But for his so-called "good fortune" Billy Kilpatrick might have lived happily to a ripe old age.
