

SENATE PASSES SWEEPSTAKE BILL

BRITISH CABINET IS GIVEN POWER TO HANDLE RUSSIA

Hospital Lotteries Are Approved by Red Chamber by 31 to 24

Senator A. D. McRae's Measure Now Goes to House of Commons Where it is Also Expected to be Passed

OTTAWA, April 6: (CP)—The bill to legalize hospital sweepstakes received its third reading in the Senate yesterday by a vote of 31 to 24 and now goes to the House of Commons where it is also expected to be passed.

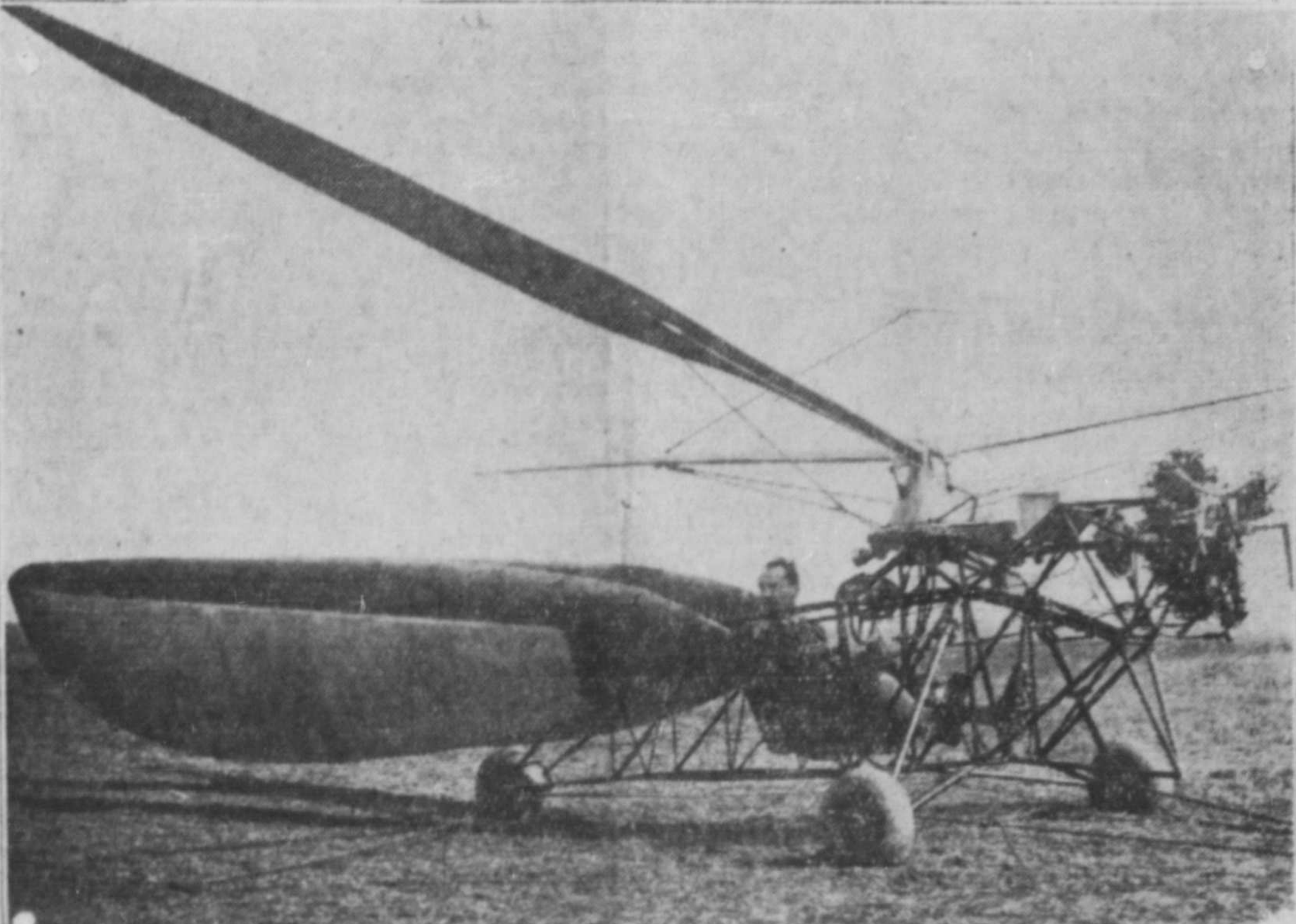

LONDON, April 6:—The British House of Commons passed the second reading of a bill enabling the cabinet to place an embargo on Russian goods coming into the country.

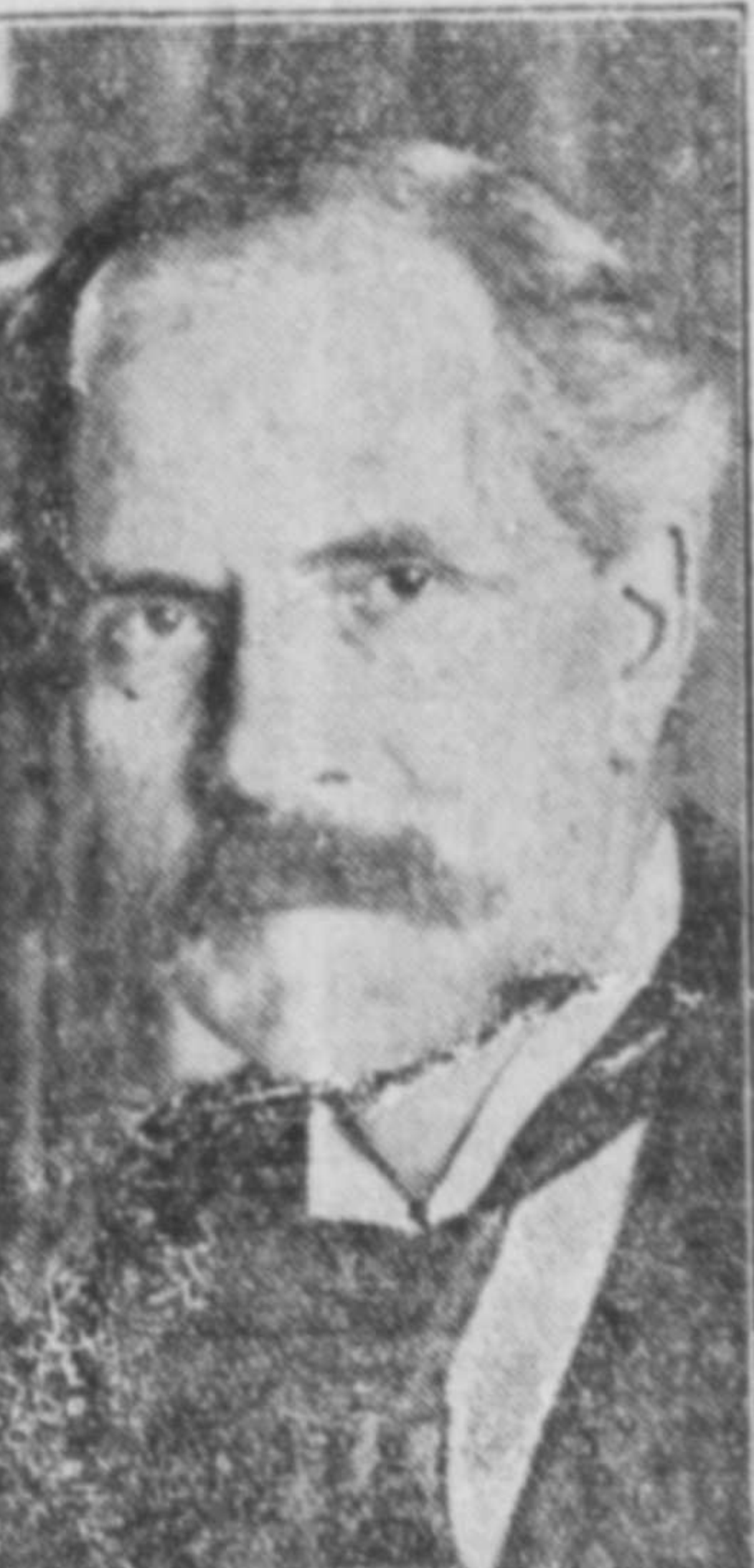

The industrial average at closing was 56.09, off .40; rails, 24.55, off .44; utilities, 19.33, unchanged, and bonds, 73.78, off .36.

QUEEN CHARLOTTE ISLANDS AGAIN

Once more we hear from the Queen Charlotte Islands mining men and we shall undoubtedly hear more from them yet. A group of mineral claims on Moresby Isd. has been bonded by a Vancouver concern with a view to development and it is announced that a stamp mill will be installed immediately to give the ores a thorough test. Should it prove successful, a larger mill will be installed.

The resident mining engineer has reported favorably on a number of Queen Charlotte Islands prospects and he has stated that he knows of no more fertile prospecting field. Gold is found in the black sands on the north and east coasts and has been washed out of the creek gravels. On the west coast there are indication of rich quartz deposits. All this should prove attractive to miners and prospectors. The successful prospecting of the Skidegate Sunrise mine to a point where it can ship pay ore has turned a good many eyes that way and this recent deal will make people more than ever interested in these islands on the fringe of the continent.

TAXING MEALS

It is proposed to carry the taxing mania to the limit of taxing meals at restaurants. The federal government has done its worst in placing a two-cent a pound tax on sugar, one of the chief foods used by young children. Now comes the Tolmie administration levying on those who eat in restaurants. It is a petty move and will bring only small returns. Last night the decision of the legislature was read to millions of people in the United States, letting them see to what straits this province had come.

HARD TO REALIZE

The person whose business has so far refused to respond to slightly improved conditions is difficult to persuade that there is a betterment and that the outlook is distinctly brighter. On the other hand, many people are tired of the depression and do not want to hear any more about it. They are sick of the word and object strenuously to its being used. When an advertiser yesterday removed the word from his advertisement it caused him great pleasure.

That is the first step toward improvement. The downward trend was much over-advertised and now we must concentrate on the improvement that is steadily spreading over the land. Prince Rupert will be a party to this improvement.

DISTRICT OF LAKES

Great Circle Country Described by Dr. R. G. Large at Gyro Luncheon Tuesday

Fine Country

Big Game Hunting, Sport Fishing, Scenery, Sun Bathing Included in Its Attractions

Recommending the Circle Lake district in the central interior south of Oofsa Lake as being quite as attractive a holiday venue as California for people of Prince Rupert and elsewhere in the north, Dr. R. Geddes Large gave an interesting magic lantern illustrated talk before the Prince Rupert Gyro Club Tuesday afternoon in which he described some of the adventures and pleasures he had encountered on a trip which he made two years ago into the Ootsa, Whitesail, Eutsuk and Tetachuk Lake area. In addition to unrivalled big game hunting and sport fishing, even sun bathing could be enjoyed on the wonderful and extensive red sand beaches of Eutsuk Lake which was unexcelled for camping purposes. Dr. Large revealed, Sand Cabin on this lake was already becoming popular as a holiday place and was now made readily accessible by means of airplane service from Burns Lake. The scenery of the Circle Lake district was another magnificent feature of the country which at one point was no more than forty miles from the Pacific Ocean at Gardner Canal.

Describing the big game hunting possibilities, Dr. Large disclosed how caribou, moose, goat and mule deer abounded in the district while, in the fall, the numerous sloughs and lake bays were full of ducks and geese.

Differing Weather

Although the two lakes were close together, Whitesail and Eutsuk actually flowed in opposite directions with a divide and slope between. There was plenty of rain on the Whitesail, not far removed from Gardner Canal, which reminded one of the coast, Eutsuk, on the other hand, had consistently fine and sunny weather. Both lakes were subject to sudden storms, Whitesail being particularly treacherous in this respect.

Dr. Large described how his party had travelled south from Burns Lake by motor car, crossing Francois Lake on a modern car ferry and using flat-bottomed boat with outboard motor for much of the travelling on the Great Circle Lakes. The portage of a mile and a quarter from Whitesail to Eutsuk Lake was made on a narrow-gauge railway.

The fox farming industry of the Lakes district was referred to by the speaker who also mentioned a minute and landlocked type of sockeye salmon known as the kokanee which had been encountered in the interior lakes, this fish spawning in a similar manner and having practically the same characteristics as the coast sockeye although it attained at its greatest a weight of no more than one pound.

Lack of Knowledge

Dr. Large urged the importance of people of the district knowing more about their own country. There was a local lack of knowledge of the district and even in official quarters it was some times difficult to get information. Trips such as he had made, therefore, proved a great revelation.

William Cruickshank, past president of the club, was in the chair in the absence of the president, T. W. Brown, and, on behalf of the members, thanked Dr. Large for his very interesting talk. H. N. Brocklesby operated the magic lantern for Dr. Large.

Members of the club received an invitation to enjoy a bridge evening at the Elks' Club on April 19.

NEW PLANS OF CHURCH

TORONTO, April 6: (CP)—A new departure in the forms of educational organization has been made by the United Church of Canada in setting up a board of Christian education, which is now holding its first meeting at Victoria University here. Hitherto there has been a board of education to supervise colleges and the training of candidates for the ministry, and a board of religious education which has had the supervision of Sunday schools and young peoples' work generally. These two are now to be merged in one board of many and varied functions that centre in the one word education.

In a statement on the purpose underlying this action, the Moderator, Dr. T. Albert Moore, says: "When the fifth general council amalgamated the two historic boards into one and constituted the board of Christian education, giving it oversight of the entire educational interests of the church from the member of the Cradle Roll to the university graduate, it multiplied opportunities for giving effective leadership to every educational activity within the church and it magnified the relationship which necessarily exists between the great spiritual objective of the church and one of its most influential methods of work."

Reflecting the high hopes expressed last autumn when the merger plan was adopted, the moderator points out that every individual, child, youth or adult, who comes within the church influence will come within the scope of the board's planning at its inaugural sessions.

Rev. E. W. Wallace, D.D., chancellor and president of Victoria University, has been appointed chairman of the new board. Rev. J. W. Graham, D.D., veteran secretary of the former board of education, who retires in June, will be associated with Rev. Frank Lanford D.D., secretary of the board of religious education, in presenting the business.

UNJUST TO PR. RUPERT

Text of Messages Regarding Overhaul of Steamer Prince Rupert

The move to take the steamer Prince Rupert to Vancouver for annual overhaul instead of carrying out the work here as originally planned, a Chamber of Commerce telegram to Canadian National Railways and Steamships headquarters in Montreal points out, would be very unjust to Prince Rupert which is badly in need of the work which it is contended can be carried out at the company's own yard here just as well and cheaply as elsewhere. Considerable resentment would be felt here, the Chamber believes, if the work were taken away from Prince Rupert and it is requested that the matter be adjusted by wire whereby the original plan will be carried out.

The mayor's telegram on the same subject is as follows:
"If true that steamships Prince Rupert and Prince George ordered south for overhaul, we emphatically protest against such move. You have the best drydock here on the B. C. Coast and surely it can do the work as cheaply and as well as elsewhere. As difference in tenders should be only a matter of book keeping when work performed in your own plant. Sincerely hope you can countermand this order which means so much to artisans and citizens at this time."
"M. M. Stephens, Mayor."

Telegrams of protest at the move to take the Prince Rupert repair job away from here were also sent by the Prince Rupert Retail Merchants' Association and the Prince Rupert Trades and Labor Council.

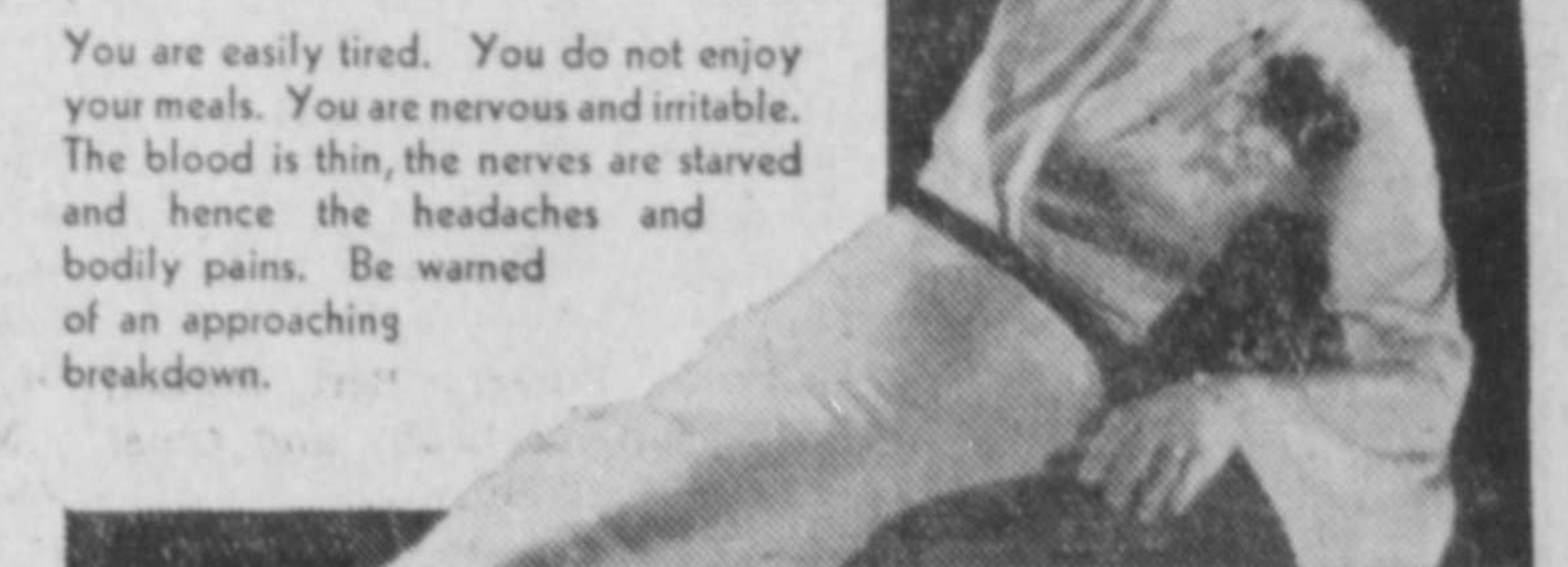

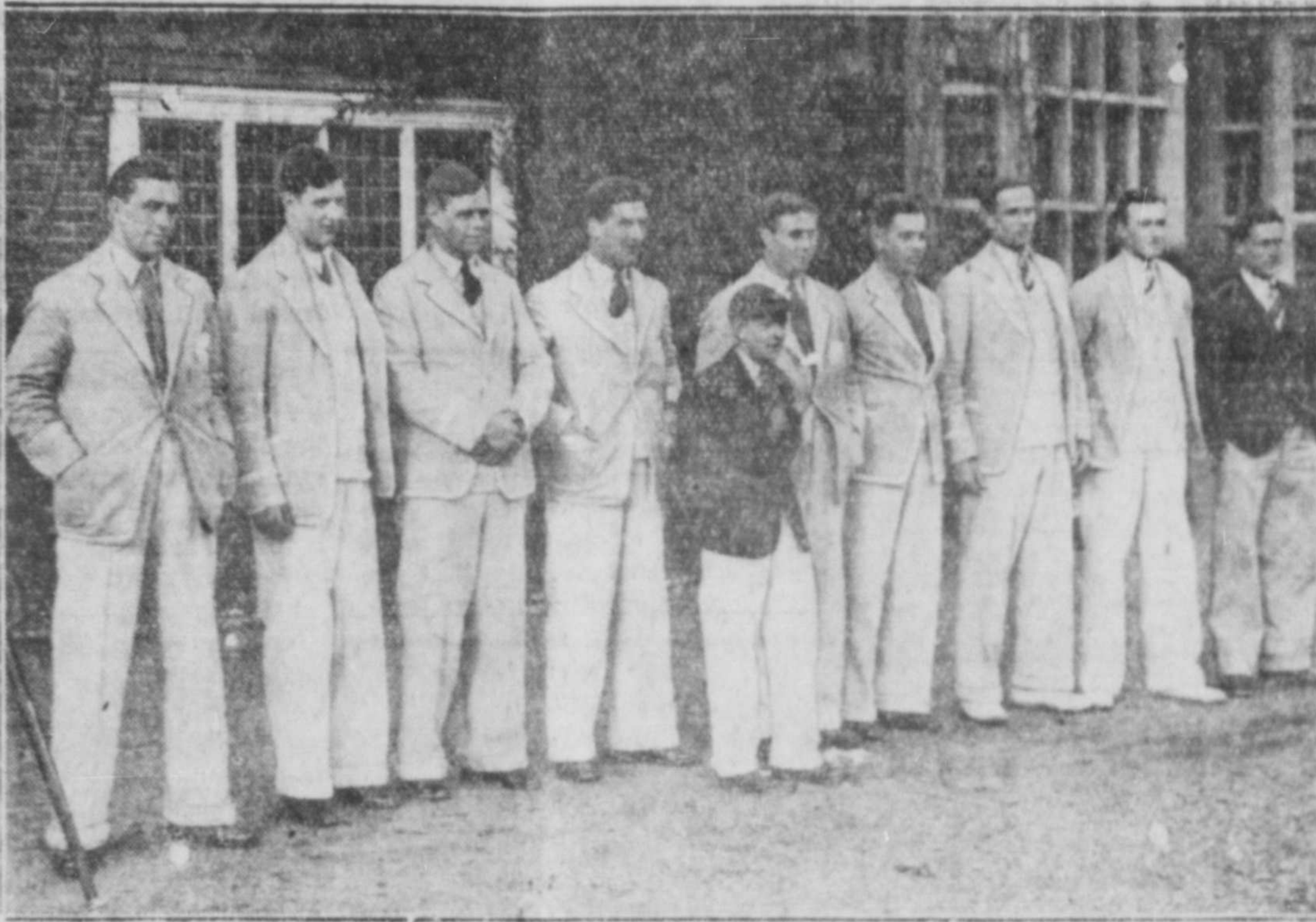

RAILROAD CANDIDATE

Accusation Levelled at Unemployed Council by Longshoremen's Union—Nomination is Deferred

After the accusation had been hurled at the chair by delegates of the Longshoremen's Union that the Unemployed Council was endeavoring to railroad through the nomination of a candidate to contest Prince Rupert riding on behalf of the unemployed and labor at the forthcoming provincial election, it was decided at a mass meeting of the unemployed last night to defer the nomination of a candidate for one week.

Meantime, the meeting approved of a platform which includes planks providing for the establishment of a six-hour day and a five-day week in industry at a living wage, adequate relief for unemployed and part-time workers until such time as a system of non-contributory unemployment insurance is established, cessation of interest payments on provincial debt until such time as the needs of unemployed and part-time workers are provided for, full maintenance of all social services, cessation of the use of the provincial police against strikers and unemployed workers, investigation of safety conditions for workers at Anyox, abolition of company towns, no mortgage foreclosures on workers' and farmers' homes or chattels because of inability to meet payments, no tax seizures of workers' and farmers' homes or goods, abolition of deportation laws and Section 98 of the Criminal Code and consideration of the welfare of the working class in all questions of legislation.

In addition to the unemployed organizations, there were delegates of the Longshoremen's Union and the Socialist Party of Canada in attendance at the meeting.

The secretary was instructed to write a letter in reply to "Movement News" refusal to take part in a debate on the cost of living here in comparison with other places. Other matters were also discussed by the meeting which was informed that four local unemployed who were sentenced to sixty-days' imprisonment at Prince George for "riding the reds" had been released on bail pending appeal.

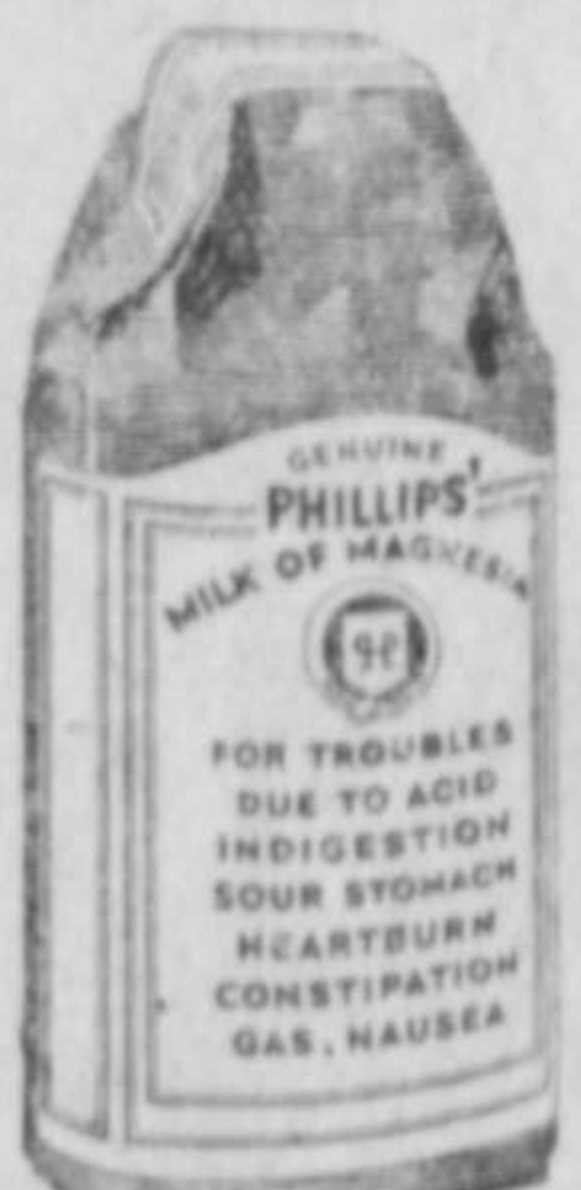

BERNIER IS STILL WELL

Weatherbeaten Mariner Who Sailed Uncharted Waters For Queen Victoria Now Lecturing

MONTREAL, April 6: (CP)—Many men cherish secret hopes of living to the century mark but Captain J. E. Bernier, the octogenarian French-Canadian seadog who is credited with charting more islands for the British Empire than any other man, openly declares that is the mark he is out to reach.

Hardships have only served to harden the weather-beaten frame of this mariner who sailed the seas for more than half a century and who today is equal to physical feats that would beat many men of half his age.

Short and stout, his hair bushy and white, Capt. Bernier is still game for anything. He retired from the sea in 1927 but fairly brisk ascent of 40 stairs won't take his breath away today. Cultural pursuits are now occupying his time. A Fellow of the Royal Geographical Society, he is lecturing on the "Conquest of the Arctic," in which he took such an active part.

Born at L'Islet, Que., 81 years ago, he was only 20 when he became captain of a Liverpool ship that took him across the seven seas. For more than 20 years he sailed this merchant vessel and then offered his services to Queen Victoria to head expeditions to the north of Canada were discovered and charted by him. To him also goes credit for discovering the remnants of the ill-fated Franklin expedition to the North Pole.

He was on his way to the North Pole himself in 1904 when orders from the Department of Marine compelled him to abandon the expedition and patrol the Atlantic coast in search of run-runners. "Even in those days we had to be on the watch for them," he commented.

Capt. Bernier has the distinction of going farther north than any other Canadian.
