JESSIE TO OPEN SOON

SMITHERS, July 20:-Arrangements completed in Vancouver last week by L. S. McGill as manager of Jessie Gold Mines Ltd. for the sale of treasury shares of that company, by Vancouver brokers will result in the continuation in a few days of the development on that property from the point where it was suspended last fall on arrival of winter. The work consists in the driving of a drift tunnel on ore along the No. 3 vein until it reaches the No. 1 vein when that vein is to be followed into the mountain. Just before the work closed down for the winter an exceptionally fine body of arsenopyrite and quartz was reached in the tunnel. The primary value in the ore is in gold, the clean arsenopyrite averaging .75 oz. per ton according to report of W. G. Norrie. TRIAL BY POPULAR OPINION

An effort is being made in a number of cases to try legal cases by popular opinion. Just now an effort is being made to influence the case of Tim Buck, the communist who has just had the length of his sentence extended. Whatever may have been the right or wrong of the first conviction, the staging of a demonstration in prison is certainly deserving of an increased sentence.

Judges make mistakes and being human they are also blased, much like other people. No matter what the system, judges will still have to be chosen from the human family, with all their failings. In spite of this the judgment of the average judge is far better than the judgment of the average layman. This is because of the training he gets and the feeling that the country is depending on him to mete out justice. The innocent man would usually rather depend upon the verdict of a judge than that of a jury.

Probably the nearest approach to justice would be trial by a judge. The next best thing would be trial by jury and story short, nearby neighbors be- grandfather had ruled benignly and the worst possible condition would be trial by popular opinion.


