## TRANS-PACIFIC AIR SERVICE PLANNED

## KILLING FOLLOWS QUARREL OVER SUPPLIES AT PRINCTON

### One Man Is Dead, Another Charged With Murder After Tragedy

Charles Hunter and Robert Campbell Alleged to Have Fought Over Provisions—Former Arrested And Latter Dead

PRINCTON, Dec. 23: (CP)—Charles A. Hunter is under arrest here charged with murder following an alleged fight at Hunter's Ranch on Thursday in which Robert Campbell was fatally shot. Hunter and Campbell had been living together at the ranch for the past few months and police say that a quarrel over food supplies preceded the shooting.

### IS RAMMED AND SINKS

Japanese Steamer Goes Down After Being Struck By American Ship; Crew Is Rescued

DUTCH HARBOR, Alaska, Dec. 22: (CP)—Struck in the side by the American ship Iowa, the Japanese steamer Hiei Maru No. 12 sank near Hakodate, Japan, early yesterday. Messages intercepted here by the naval radio station reported that the crew of the Japanese vessel had been rescued by the Iowa and that she was proceeding on her way to Hakodate.

The Hiei Maru No. 12 was bound from Kohnan, Korea, to San Francisco. The Iowa left Portland, Ore., December 2.

According to the police Campbell was shot in the hip by a rifle bullet fired by Hunter. Campbell died five hours afterwards in the local hospital.

Hunter, after being treated for a severe cut on the head, told the police he had shot Campbell after the latter had attacked him with an axe.

### TRUSTEES OF C. N. R. NAMED

OTTAWA, Dec. 23: (CP)—Official confirmation of the appointment of Mr. Justice C. P. Fullerton of Ottawa, F. K. Morrow of Toronto and Edouard Labelle of Montreal as trustees of the Canadian National Railways was given today by Prime Minister R. B. Bennett. Mr. Justice Fullerton will be chairman.

### Dirigibles To Be Used On Projected Route to Manila From this Coast

As Soon as Necessary Legislation is Passed, Akron Company Will Proceed With Preparations, Using Lighter-Than-Air Craft

AKRON, Ohio, Dec. 23:—As soon as the necessary authorizing legislation is passed, which it is hoped may be at the forthcoming session of Congress, the Goodyear Manufacturing Co. announces that it will proceed actively with plans for the starting of a trans-Pacific air service between either San Diego or San Francisco on the California coast to Manila.

Using ships similar to the United States Navy dirigibles Akron and Macon which would have capacity for carrying one hundred passengers and 1000 tons of mail or freight, the plan would be to make the run in some six days' time each day. It would likely be a year or so at the earliest before the service could be started.

### Father of Royal Man Child

### All Japan Rejoices at Birth Of Man Child at Royal Palace; Will be 125th. Mikado One Day

TOKYO, Dec. 23: (CP)—An infant son who will, if he survives his father, the Emperor Hirohito, one day become the 125th. Mikado of Japan and carry on the succession of the oldest dynasty in the world, was born at 6:39 a.m. Saturday in the Imperial Palace. He is the first son of the Emperor and his wife, Empress Nagako, and the long-awaited Crown Prince of the Empire and heir to the Sun Goddess.

Nation-wide rejoicing from 100,000,000 loyal Japanese subjects greeted the tidings of the arrival of the Imperial princeling. The child had been expected between Christmas and the New Year and the nation had been praying for months that it would be a boy. He is the fifth child of Their Imperial Majesties, the first four having been girls.

QUESNEL, Dec. 23: (CP)—Charged with manslaughter as a result of the death of Mary Ellen Smith, Prince George High School pupil, who was killed in an automobile accident here last month, Otto Olsen has been committed for trial at the Kamloops spring assizes. Olsen is meantime at liberty on bail of \$1000.

### P. M. L. 8 ON WAY HOME

Police Boat Passed Simpson Without Calling in So All is Believed to be Well at Wales Id.

According to a telephone message received by the provincial police, the police boat P. M. L. 8 which was dispatched to Wales Island yesterday to ascertain if all was well at the cannery point following the failure of ten white and fifty Japanese residents who make their homes there to visit Port Simpson during last three weeks to get supplies or pick up their Christmas mail, passed Port Simpson at 11:30 this morning en-route back to Prince Rupert without putting in there.

In view of the failure of the P. M. L. 8 to put in at Port Simpson, it is presumed that the officers on board found that no distress or hardship was being suffered by the Wales Island residents and that they had been merely unable to get across to Port Simpson of late owing to the bad weather. The P. M. L. 8 should arrive back in Prince Rupert by mid-afternoon.

**SILVER PRICE NOT SHOWING STRENGTH AS WAS EXPECTED**

**KNOCKS OUT BIG STORM LOCAL BOY NOW ENDED**

**Jack McEvoy of Vancouver Defeats Billy Bagshaw in Second Round—Good Card**

Weather Conditions in South Better And Floods Over—Cold Snap On Prairies

VANCOUVER, Dec. 23: (CP)—Weather conditions on the Lower Mainland and Vancouver Island were almost back to normal Friday. The flood situation in the vicinity of Vancouver and in the Fraser River delta country was much improved and further recurrence appeared to be unlikely.

On Vancouver Island considerable damage was caused between Chemainus and Duncan, ninety trees in one section blowing down over telephone lines.

The early week storm was regarded as the worst in thirty years. Falling temperature with rain or snow is predicted for the week-end here.

**Cold On Prairies**

CALGARY, Dec. 23:—A cold snap appeared today to have settled down over the prairies for Christmas practically all points reporting temperatures of well below zero. Fourteen below zero with a high wind was recorded here this morning.

**Prince George Situation**

Latest reports from Prince George are to the effect that flood conditions in the lower part of the town have receded considerably during the past day or so after having assumed quite serious proportions during the early part of the week. Considerable ground in the low-lying neighborhood of the railway station, however, remains a veritable ice field owing to the flood waters having been frozen solid before they had a chance to run off after the Nechako River went down. To prevent thick ice forming on the railway tracks which were a foot under water it was necessary to keep an engine shuttling back and forth continually at Prince George while the flood, caused by ice jams in the river, was at its height.

For several days temperatures of far below zero have been recorded at Prince George.

Roadmaster Gunderson of the Canadian National Railways was among the residents of "The Cache," on the north side of the railway track, across from the town proper, who were trapped in their homes by the swiftly rising waters. He had to take to the roof of his house for safety and was held there for sixteen hours. By the time he was rescued his feet were frost-bitten.

**WHITE XMAS IN RUPERT**

Seasonable Weather Appears to be In Prospect For Yuletide on Monday

Prince Rupert may look forward to a cool, white Christmas on Monday unless all signs today fail. At noon today the barometer was high at 30.40, having risen sharply since yesterday, and the wind was light in the north with the thermometer registering 19 above at Digby Island. Lowest official thermometer reading for the last 24 hours was 14 above at 4 o'clock this morning. The minimum thermometer reading so far in this cold snap was 11 above, or 21 degrees of frost, on Wednesday afternoon.
