Of this amount, \$550,000 ath Day to keep it holy." was used for the sinking fund, and repayment of loans and interest, leaving a net profit of \$412,000. Of this amount \$265,000 was placed REAL ESTATE to reserve account and \$137,000 went directly to reduction of taxes.

Since the city took over the street railway system in 1897, \$2,-500,000 has gone to reserve, renewal and depreciation account; \$3,-589,000 has been set aside for sinking fund and redemption of debt while the city has received \$1,174,852 for reduction of taxes.

It will be observed that the sinking fund will take care of the indebtedness and in time wipe it out, giving Liverpool her street car system free from incumberance; while the ample sum charged to the reserve, renewal and drepreciation account will give a continually improved system—a property of ever-growing value.

Municipal ownership has certainly paid in the city of Liverpool.
