

Announcement today that 500,000 bushels of wheat is about to be moved from the prairies by the Alberta Wheat Pool into the Prince Rupert elevator is taken as an indication that the Wheat Pool has made some arrangement to again take over the local grain handling plant, the five-year lease on which expired at the end of last month. 




