FIVE ANYOX MINE STRIKERS WILL GO TO HIGHER COURT

Five Shots Fired at President-Elect Last Night But None Hit Him Although Others Injured

FOUR OTHERS HURT BUT ROOSEVELT ES-CAPES UNHURT-HAD JUST COMPLETED AD-DRESS FROM AUTOMOBILE AT MIAMI.

MIAMI, Feb. 16 .: - A determined gunman, with a poor aim, attempted last night to assassinate President-Elect Roosevelt but the shots seriously wounded Mayor Anton Cermak of Chicago and four others and Roosevelt was not hurt.

The assassin told the police he was Joe Zingara of New York and that he had attempted to kill the King of Italy some years ago.

"I am sorry I did not kill him," the gunman told the police. "I want to kill all presidents and officers."

President-Elect Roosevelt returned from a fishing cruise from the Bahamas last night. Enroute to the train, at 9:30 he stopped amid a huge throng at Bay Front Park to speak a word of greeting. He had just concluded when the shooting started. Roosevelt waved an assuring arm to those around him and to those near him said: "Tell them I am all right."

Each of the five shots into the crowd around the Roosevelt's car took effect. Pandemonium broke loose while officers pounced on the struggling shooter. Men and women milled around but quietness was soon restored.

Mayor Cermak was shot in the breast the bullet lodging in his back, his condition being serious.

Zingara questioned by police said that he had purchased the pistol three days ago with the original idea of assassinating President Hoover but changed his mind when he read that Roosevelt was coming and decided to go after him. He insisted that no one had encouraged or prompted him and that he had discussed the crime with no one.

The President-Elect probably owed his life to the fact that he was just lowering himself into his seat in the car following the address.

MIAMI, Feb. 16: (later) - Physicians stated that Mayor Cermak has more than a fifty-fifty chance to recover. The condition of Mrs. Joseph Gill who was shot in the abdomen, however, has taken a critical turn. The three others who were taken to the same hospital as Cermak are reported to be out of danger.

Resting on the lap of Roosevelt in the President-Elect's car Cermak said to Roosevelt: "I am mighty glad it was me instead of you. I wish you would be careful, the country needs you. A deep expression of agony showed in the sustained face of Roosevelt as he bent over the wounded man and replied: "We need you and men like you."

From this the provincial government is expected to pay approximately \$15,000 so the net cost to the city should be \$50.867.45.



\$2.75 and miners got \$3.25. Wages were low now because the price of copper was low, much lower than the cost of production.

The rate paid mechanics such as carpenters and mechanics is not less than \$4.00 a day. Mine shift bosses get \$4.75 and mill and smeiter shift bosses get \$5.00 and more.

Speaking about living conditions, Mr. Maxwell said the cost of cabins and houses was from \$8.00 to \$15.00 a month and this rate included a reasonable amount of light, water and most of them have baths in their homes. Rooms for single men in bunkhouses cost from \$1.00 to \$5.00 a month. Hospital services cost single men a dollar and married men \$2.00 for the whole family. For this they get hospitalization, doctor's service and medicines in all the major operations for which low fees
