## SPLENDID MESSAGE IS HEARD TODAY

### PEOPLE OF U. S. ARE A UNIT IN SUPPORTING ROOSEVELT

#### Governors of All States Give Full Support to Emergency Measures

All Citizens Called on to Support Roosevelt Irrespective of Party Affiliations and to Bring About Financial Order

WASHINGTON, March 7.—At a meeting of the Governors of all the states in the Union held here yesterday President Roosevelt was promised undivided support in any action he may take to bring order out of the present financial chaos. They expressed their confidence in the chief executive and their faith in his ability to handle the situation. Further they called upon all citizens of the United States, irrespective of party, to loyally support the president in the present crisis.

#### Urges Abandon Union Scheme of Government

Victoria Colonist, Conservative Organ, Asks Who Are Conservatives to Unite With

The Victoria Colonist, Conservative organ at the capital, has the following to say in regard to the proposed union government:

"There can only be union government if there is some party with which the administration in office can unite. That prospect does not exist in this province. It was dispelled over six months ago. Nothing has happened in the interval to make it possible. On the contrary, the plea for a union government has brought a Richmond into the field who is attracting to his banners the dissidents from both political parties, and who has added a new complication to the political situation. This factor promises to introduce a good deal of venom into the forthcoming election campaign, for dissidents always feel towards those whom they have deserted, 'that peculiar malignity which has, in all ages, been characteristic of apostates.' The upshot is that, obviously the plea for union government has fallen on deaf ears, and it should be abandoned. No progress can be made in solving provincial problems, to the extent that such solution lies in the hands of any provincial government, by merely fighting the air and pursuing the plea for a theoretic form of government up a cul de sac.

#### Funeral Service This Morning at Catholic Church

Many friends gathered at an early mass funeral service at 8 o'clock this morning in the Catholic Church for the late Joseph Pruneau. Mr. Pruneau died in the local hospital last Friday and was 63 years of age. He was a French-Canadian and came to Prince Rupert 20 years ago, during which time he had made a host of friends. He was a carpenter by trade.

Following the service at the church the body was taken to the Catholic plot in Fairview Cemetery where interment was made. There were many floral tributes.

The pallbearers were H. Letourneau, G. Boulet, D. Parents, Mr. Sengulien, Mr. Palocuin and Mr. Oigny.

#### BACKS T. D. PATTULLO IN SCHEME

Victoria Evening Paper Urges That Dole is Economically Unsound Method of Dealing With Unemployment

The Victoria Times in a leading editorial article backs Prince Rupert's member in his scheme for giving real work for real wages to the unemployed. It says:

Those who have the well-being of the province at heart should be in agreement with T. D. Pattullo's idea that constructive work for the idle should be provided, instead of the gold, as a means of preserving a sound citizenship and facilitating economic recovery.

No matter by what name it goes, the unemployment relief which is being paid out in Canada is both economic and socially vicious and should not even have been dreamed of in a country which needs so much constructive pioneering as Canada does. If Mr. Mackenzie King's suggestion for the formation of a national advisory commission had been accepted in 1931, when he first made it, or last year when he repeated the advice, the unemployment situation certainly would have been a great deal better than it is now.

Mr. Pattullo naturally is not impressed by rosy pictures of a new era which the "inherent courage and fortitude of our people" will eventually paint. What he quite rightly demands is a form of direct action which will furnish our people with both the incentive and the means of helping themselves out of their troubles.

The present system of relief is economically unsound because there is very little practical return for the money expended. It is socially vicious because it undermines the public morale. It does not require much imagination to visualize the ultimate consequence of a system under which citizens must appear before relief officers for daily rations for themselves and their families, or for pittance to provide themselves with shelter, clothing, and warmth. Such a system strikes inevitably at their very self-respect. It destroys their initiative and self-confidence.

Obviously it is unnecessary for Canada to have to rely upon the dole to save any part of its population from starving. If this were an old nation with its areas developed and over-populated, its problem would be different. But we have a population of a little more than 10,300,000 scattered over 3,700,000 square miles of territory, most of which is a vast and relatively untouched storehouse of natural resources. Surely it can not be seriously argued that with such advantages millions of our present generation must be dependent upon the state for bare subsistence.

It would be interesting to know what could have been done in the way of practical colonization for instance, if even one-half of the money already spent on relief had been expended on assistance for those desirous of going on the land, not in the hope of making a fortune, but with the object of making homes and avoiding want and distress. Even now, in spite of governmental inertia, this landward movement already has set in.

If the competition in armaments is to continue the economic system must ultimately collapse.—Sir Norman Angell

#### Chamber of Commerce Gets Inspiration from Harold Brown Address

It was a wonderful message that was brought to the Prince Rupert Chamber of Commerce and the service clubs of the city today by Harold Brown, manager of the Union Steamship Company at a luncheon given in his honor at the Commodore Cafe, John Dybhavn presiding. It was a message permeated with hope, cheer, faith and encouragement. He said he believed the worst of the experiences of the depression were past and that they could look forward to better things but he pointed to difficulties in the way and mentioned how some of them could be overcome.

He said many people he met were willing and cracking under the pressure because they had depended too much upon material things. Quoting, he said:

"I believe the whole universe is a living intelligent spirit, even to the tiniest atom. Not a lying spirit but a truthful spirit."

Another feature of the address was a reference to poverty when he said: "The destitution to fear is the poverty of spirit which is more terrible than the want of bread. He feared some were lacking that spirit today but he had faith in the people of the country to overcome this. He wanted to see a revival of that western spirit which would not know defeat."

There were present nearly one hundred of the business and professional men of the city with John Dybhavn presiding and with him at the head of the table, Acting Mayor Rochester, T. Brown, president of the Gyro Club and representatives of the other organizations in the city.

#### Legislature May Complete Before Easter

House Likely to Rise and Possibly May Be Dissolved Within the Next Few Weeks

VICTORIA, March 7.—There is every indication that the Legislature will rise before the Easter holiday and it is possible that dissolution may take place before that time. Whether Mr. Bruhn will join W. J. Bowser's union faction or lead one of his own, has not been made clear. The position of Premier Tolmie is also most uncertain. He has everyone guessing. Efforts have been made to get him to give up his union proposals but it is not likely that he will do so. He was expected to give some indication of his policy in his speech on the address at the week-end but failed to say anything of moment. He just beamed on the House, spoke pleasantly of everyone and then buried himself in agriculture.

The work of the session is being expedited, both sides realizing that the sooner the present farce is over, the better for the province.

So far there have been no Liberal defections of any importance. Members of that party are standing firmly behind their leader, fully expecting that Mr. Pattullo will be the next Premier of the province.

#### Successor to Mayor Cermak Being Discussed

Funeral of Chicago's Late Mayor to Take Place on Friday of This Week

CHICAGO, March 7.—The death of Mayor Cermak precipitated a conflict among his supporters as to who his successor is to be. There are two factions, one known as the Irish faction and the other the Foreign faction. Mayor Cermak belonged to the latter.

The funeral of the late Mayor will take place Friday and prior to that the body will be forwarded here and will lie in state.

#### Build Railway As Far As Jehol

TOKIO, March 7.—Work has already commenced on the construction of a railway connecting the city of Jehol with the Manchurian Railway system now owned by this country. This will simplify the work of keeping in close touch politically and industrially with the interior of the conquered province.

#### Medical Services For All the People of Alberta is Planned by Contributory Health Insurance

EDMONTON, March 7.—Ultimate provision of an ideal scheme for adequate medical services for all the people of this province and that any scheme of a more local nature should be planned as to be readily adaptable to a broad general scheme, which may eventually be either Dominion or province-wide in its application, is the chief finding of the legislative commission set up as a result of a resolution passed unanimously at the 1932 session of the legislature and a report of whose activities is made available here.

Two other conclusions are reached by the commission in its report, as follows:

1. Adequate medical services for all the people of Alberta can be secured only through the operation of a contributory health insurance scheme.

2. That existing enabling legislation whereby municipal districts or parts thereof may organize for the provision of medical and allied services should be utilized.

The resolution setting up the commission was moved by Chris Pattinson, Labor, Edson, and seconded by Fred J. White, Labor leader, Calgary.

The commission was to report on the best method of making provisions for public health services and as to financial arrangements which would be required on an actual basis to insure same.

Work Being Done at Seal Cove Where Local Lumber is Now Available

The Prince Rupert Fishermen's Co-operative Association recently purchased a scow from the Rupert Marine Products Limited and they are now commencing to erect on it a store and fish camp prior to towing it to Goose Bay on Dundas Island where they plan to operate it during the coming season as a fish buying station.

The work on the scow is being done in Seal Cove where the lumber is now available. Work would have commenced earlier but the fishermen were anxious to use Prince Rupert cut lumber for the work. The new station will be ready for business in April.

#### City Architect At Vancouver Is Being Abolished

VANCOUVER, March 7.—No successor has been appointed to City Architect Bird. It has been decided to abolish the office and to appoint instead a city building inspector, and there are a number of applicants for the position.

### THE LATE S. M. NEWTON

It was with great regret we had to announce yesterday the death of S. M. Newton, one of the real pioneers of Prince Rupert. For eight different terms he was mayor of the city, thus showing that he held the confidence of a majority of the citizens over an unusually long period. He was the editor and proprietor of the Evening Empire and conducted that newspaper until two or three years ago when ill-health forced him to retire.

Mr. Newton was educated in the school of hard knocks. He commenced working in a newspaper office at a very early age and continued that kind of work throughout his life. While he was English by birth, his parents migrated to Ontario when he was very young with the result that all his early training was secured in Canada.

Mr. Newton often talked of his early life, being rather proud of the hard training he received. When only a youth he left Canada for a few years and worked, among other places, for one of the big New York dailies, returning to Canada to join his brothers in taking over a small paper. However, he did not stay with them long being too much of an individualist to carry on with three at the helm.

Illustrating the hardships of life in his youth in Ontario, Mr. Newton told of being first apprenticed to a druggist. He was to receive one dollar a week payable at the end of the year. His mother was very poor and she looked forward to receiving the year's salary in order to keep the home going. Just a few weeks before the end of the year the sheriff took charge of the drug store and the Newton boy received no wages for the year's work. It was a sad blow.

Mr. Newton was widely known and respected. He also had enemies but in later years the enemies of the strenuous earlier days were forgotten and yesterday when the news arrived saying that the grim reaper had reached out and taken him, all were deeply grieved. We shall all look back to S. M. Newton as one of the men who helped to lay the foundations of the city of Prince Rupert.

### Rockne Lauded Finest Leader In U. S. Sport

Sports Writers Almost Unanimous  
In Naming Late Rugby Coach  
Of Notre Dame

NEW YORK, March 7.—By a margin so convincing that it leaves no room for the slightest doubt, Knute Rockne stands out as the greatest of sports leaders in the United States over the past decade, in the opinion of those who have most closely scanned the whirl of events over the period of 1923 to 1933.

Of the 50 experienced newspaper sports writers and editors who cast their votes at the request of The Associated Press, 41 put Rockne's name at the head of their list of those conspicuous for their coaching, organizing and leadership ability. His death two years ago in an aeroplane accident has not dimmed the lustre of the genius of Notre Dame and his accomplishments in intercollegiate athletics.

Rockne's total points in this poll, on the basis of five for a first place, four for second place, and so on, nearly doubled the combined figures for his two nearest rivals, the late George L. (Tex) Rickard and Connie Mack.

## BABE RUTH HOLDS OUT

BOSTON, Mass., March 7.—An advisory board, to bring closer together the various groups in the state which have allied interests in connection with wild life, has been formed in Massachusetts under the auspices of Governor Joseph Ely.

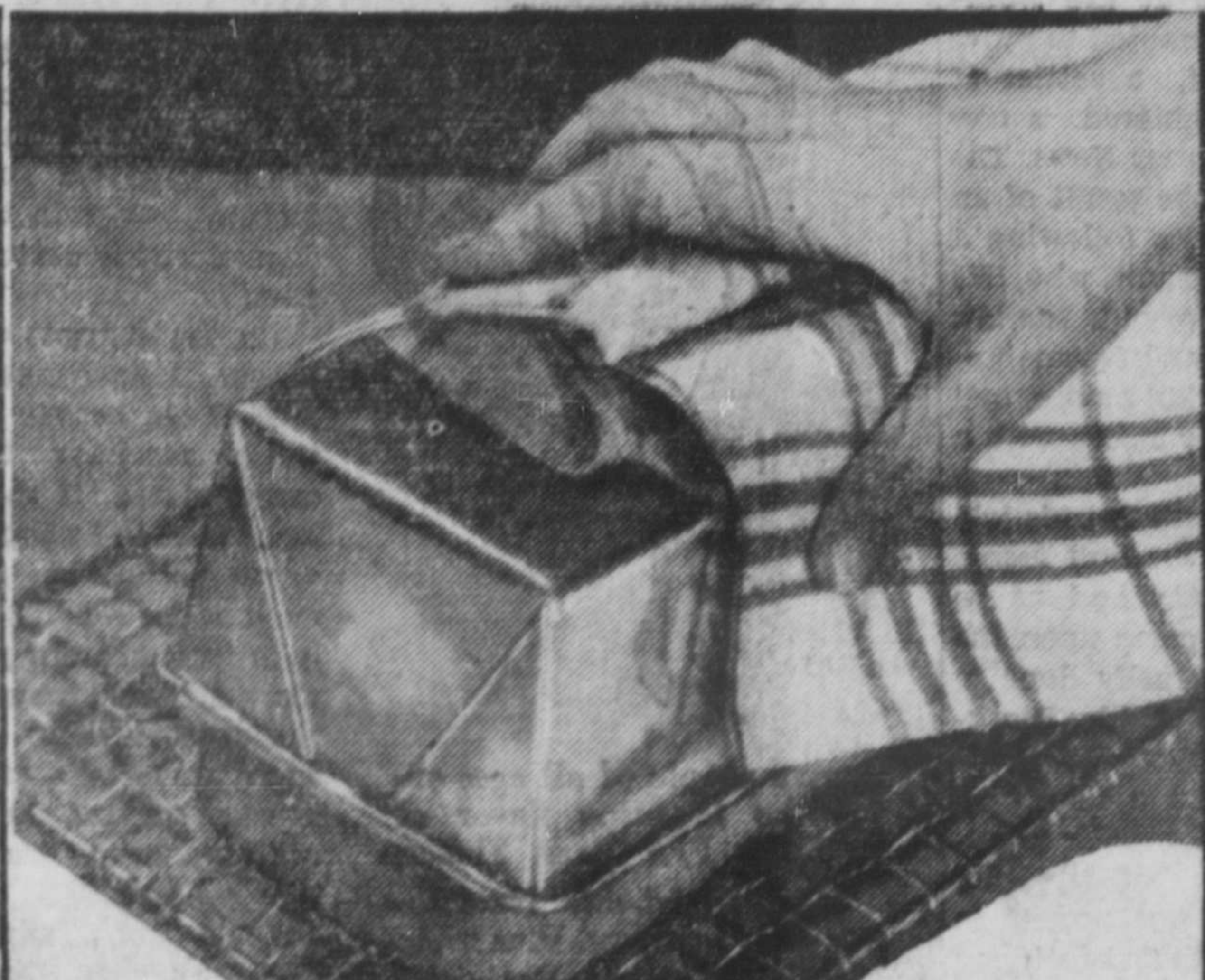

### Somebody Killed A Cow Moose But Court is Baffled

Settler at Doughty Charged With Offense But Native Evidence Rather Conflicting

Judge Gale's court was a riot of conflicting evidence at the week-end as witnesses attempted to prove that G. Bjorklund, a settler at Doughty, had slaughtered a cow moose, says the Interior News. The charge was laid as the result of an investigation by police following a report put in by D. Dennis, who, like all Indians, loyally upholds the law in all such respects and frowns upon anyone who will kill moose, and especially a nice lady moose with a deceased husband.

In his virtuous wrath Dennis told police he had shot the bull moose a short distance away and as he proceeded along he came upon the carcass of its wife cruelly done to death close to a road used by Bjorklund in his tie operations. Police investigation unearthed a chunk of moose in the cabin usually occupied by Bjorklund but the plot thickened when it was proven to their satisfaction that Bjorklund had been living in the tie camp some distance away for several weeks. In their pilgrimage around the cabin a small piece of venison was spotted on top of a cupboard. It must have been a small piece, but, large or small, Martin Dahl's eyes were working on all four, and he promptly swallowed this bit of evidence. After a lot of charges by the Indians and denials by the whites, the magistrate dismissed the case.

### WHIFFLETS From the Waterfront

One of the objections to salmon trolling is that the buying stations are infested with small flies that plague the lives of the men engaged in the industry. The fishermen, who have so far borne this patiently, are now planning to try to rid the Dundas station of the pests. They plan to sprinkle the shore with oil and thus choke the little brutes in their breeding places.

It seems that some years ago on the Alaskan side there was an explosion on the shore at one of the places infested by beach flies. Oil was scattered all over the beach and the fishermen were surprised to find that during the summer there were no flies at that point. While they do not want an explosion at Dundas they plan to bring about a similar result in a more economical manner.

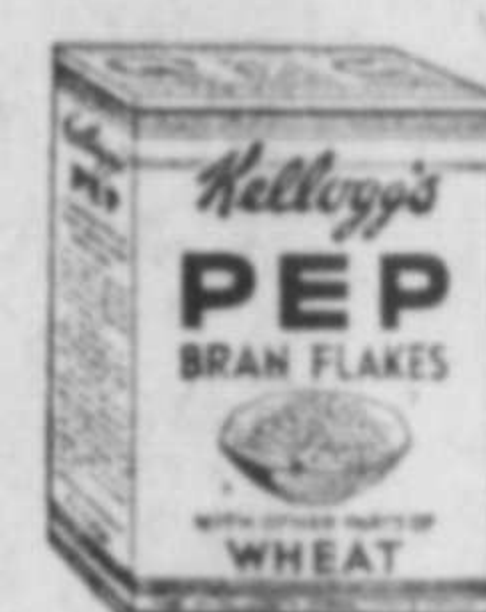

### Former Terrace Man Attacking Game Depart.

John C. Bowen-Colthurst Urges True and Unselfish Sportsmanship Instead of Present System

Two letters written by John C. Bowen-Colthurst of Sooke, B.C., and formerly of Terrace, have recently appeared in the Victoria morning paper in which the game department is attacked. He says in part:

"In the districts of Omineca and Skeena, I have passed mile after mile of old beaver workings where the beaver have been completely exterminated. If the game department were to be considered as a revenue producing department, its main duties would be almost entirely in the northern part of the province. It would assist the trapper in the conservation of the beaver, would undertake educational work among Indians and improvident whites showing the advantages of the conservation of fur-bearing animals, would assist fur farmers and fur buyers, would protect big game moose, caribou, mule deer, mountain sheep and mountain goat, and arrange for destruction of timber wolves, etc."

In conclusion Mr. Colthurst asks help:

"1. To abolish the present useless and expensive Game Department and to place the administration of the Game Act under the police, co-operating with local Rod and Gun Clubs.

"2. To give the farmer full rights to protect his crops 365 days in the year and 24 hours in the day, or, alternatively, to see that the farmer is compensated in full for all damage done.

"3. To endeavor to get city and country sportsmen to join up with Rod and Gun Clubs and to practise the principles of true and unselfish sportsmanship.

### Edmonton Makes Good Collection Of City Taxes

EDMONTON, March 7.—Tax collections for the period from January 1 to February 28, 1933, including land sales, total \$691,098.35, as compared with \$145,598.73 for the corresponding period last year, according to a report released by Thos. Walker, city assessor and tax collector. The increase of over a half million dollars in the figure this year is due to the fact that approximately \$550,000 was collected during the first half of January through the prepayment plan which was not in effect last year.
