Walls and ceiling in the store were of pressed metal. There were two brick chimneys, one going through both floors and the other being on a bracket upstairs. There was a rubberoid roof and asbestos was used in certain parts of the building which had been erected in compliance with the village fire regulations. There were also timber fire steps and four air vents in the ground floor.

Under cross-examination, witness said that the store was usually very tidy, back of the showcases usually being rubbished up while the store room to the rear was usually dirty and untidy with a collection of rubbish including oily clothes, etc. At 6 p.m. the trial was adjourned
