

Quit Old Planes For Three-Mile-a-Minute Ships



Speed, speed and still more speed is the cry of aviation leaders as plans for handling summer air traffic are being formulated. Ships which made 90 miles an hour are passe as new, beautiful metal monoplanes, capable of flying you from coast to coast in 18 hours, at the rate of at least 150 miles an hour, and, in some cases, three miles a minute, supersede them. Contrast the frail craft, upper left, which the Wright brothers flew at Kitty Hawk, N.C., in 1903, capable of attaining the astounding speed of 38 miles an hour with the latest development in airpla es, below. The latter ship, with a top speed of 182 miles an hour, is the type which will replace planes similar to the one at upper right, which can fly but a mere 120 miles an hour.
