Earthquake and Tidal Wave in Japan

HALF OF UNITED STATES HAVE BANKING TROUBLE TODAY

Twelve Hundred Japanese Perish From Earthquake, Tidal Wave and Fire Northeast of Honsu Island

OBJECT TO POLICY OF B.C. GOVT.

Union of Municipalities Ask Repeal of Objectional Legislation Or Compensating Privileges

VICTORIA, March 3.—Repeal of the legislation requiring municipalities to pay part of the costs of social services or as an alternative that the Provincial Government give the municipalities compensating proportions of the Government revenues, was urged in a resolution passed by the Union of British Columbia municipalities yesterday.

All Ready For Inauguration

Ceremonies Will be of Simple Character and New President Being Carefully Guarded

WASHINGTON, March 3.—President-Elect Franklin Roosevelt arrived here yesterday in readiness for his inauguration tomorrow. He was surrounded by a heavy guard and every possible step is being taken to insure his safety. Mr. Roosevelt announced that the inaugural festivities would be much curtailed this year. There will be little of the lavish expenditures anywhere such as have characterized similar occasions in the past.

Chinese Defence of Jehol Collapses as Leaders Flee And Troops Are Revolting

CHINCHOW, Manchuria, March 3.—A picture of the utter collapse of what is left of China's hold on Jehol Province, with its troops revolting and leaders fleeing was brought today to this headquarters in military and press despatches. It was asserted that the fall of Jehol City was only a matter of hours. It is reported here that the Chinese troops in Jehol City have mutinied.

Whole Country Alarmed as Earth Shakes and Tidal Wave Sweeps Shore Sending 1500 Small Boats to Sea And Swamping Others

TOKYO, March 3.—More than 1200 persons are known to have been killed in an earthquake and tidal wave and fire which devastated a section of the northeastern seaboard of Honsu Island, the largest island of the Japanese archipelago early this morning. Eleven hundred lives were lost in Iwate alone, mostly north of Miyako, a seacoast town 300 miles northeast of Tokyo. Eight thousand of the flimsy Japanese homes were entirely destroyed. Immediately following the quake which was of long duration and which shook the whole of Japan more or less, there was a tremendous tidal wave which wrecked many homes on the shores and carried to sea fifteen hundred small boats, swamping others. The extent of the losses in this direction is not yet fully known.

Demands Made Of Government

Delegation From Men Yesterday Presented Document to Agent Following Parade

A delegation from the "Unemployed Councils" yesterday presented the local government agent with a document containing a number of demands upon the provincial government, fourteen in all, the principal of which are that the government shall assume responsibility for destitute strikers and withdraw all provincial police. That those arrested while doing picket duty be released and that intimidation must cease.

The women's organization asked that women receive equal treatment with men, that clothes be provided for unemployed women and children and that children over 15 be given the same relief allowance as adults.

Complaint is made in the document of the inadequacy of relief, objecting to evictions for non-payment of rent or taxes, and abeyance of the law providing for mortgaging the home of a person getting relief.

A copy of the same document was also presented to the acting mayor.

Crouch Heads Municipalities League for Year

VICTORIA, March 3.—Reeve William Crouch of Saanich was elected president of the Union of B. C. Municipalities yesterday. The convention will meet here next year.

The Princess Louise is due in from the south this evening at 7 o'clock and will sail on her return trip at 10 p.m.

Canada Gains British Market For Her Goods

OTTAWA, March 3.—Canada in the year 1932 occupied fourth place among nations with her products in British markets against twelfth place in 1931. In one year British imports have increased from this country more than 31% in value and much more in volume.

Service For Late J. Fraser

Remains Taken South for Interment—Mrs. Fraser and Gordon Accompanying

A funeral service for the late James Fraser, well known citizen of Prince Rupert, who passed away on Wednesday was held in the parlors of the B. C. Undertakers last night at 7:30. Many friends and members of the Tsimpsan Lodge 58, A. F. & A. M. of which Mr. Fraser was a member were present at the service. The Rev. W. D. Grant Hollingworth officiated.

The body of the deceased was taken south on the Prince Rupert last night where interment will be made. Mrs. Fraser and son Gordon accompanied the body to Vancouver.

Appointed to New Tariff Board

The third member is Charles Herbert, B.A., of Montreal.

W. J. Bowser Withholds Decision As to Entering Politics Until Vancouver Meeting Next Week

VICTORIA, March 3.—Return to the political arena of former Premier W. J. Bowser was foreshadowed here last night when Vancouver Island citizens of various shades of political opinion at a public meeting invited him to head a non-party group in opposition to the Conservative and Liberal parties.

Expressing pleasure at the confidence shown in him by his old political antagonists and Conservative friends and briefly reviewing present conditions, Mr. Bowser stated that at a meeting in Vancouver next week he would announce his decision.

George McGregor of Victoria, formerly a Liberal, presided and the speakers included Dr. G. Hall of Nanaimo, many years ago Liberal member of the Legislature for Nelson, William Dick, Conservative member for Vancouver; E. B. Andros, former alderman of the city of Victoria.

PEOPLE OF BURNS LAKE SPINNING THEIR OWN YARN

BURNS LAKE, March 3.—Spinning is one of the latest handicraft developments in this district as a result of the difficult times. There is little sale for wool so the people of the district are spinning their own. The spinning wheels are being made in the district and sold at a low price and instructions in the art are being freely given by a number of ladies.

Former Chief Justice Dies

Hon. F. A. Anglin Had Been Ill At Intervals For The Past Two Years

OTTAWA, March 3.—After an illness that expended over two years at frequent intervals interfering with his judicial duties and two days after his resignation as chief justice of Canada became effective, Hon. F. A. Anglin died yesterday aged 67.

Banks of Most Western States Closed Today as Result of Proclamations

SAN FRANCISCO, March 3.—The states of the far west generally are without banking facilities today under holiday proclamations made by seven governors. The major part of the deposits aggregating approximately \$3,000,000,000 is tied up in California, Oregon, Washington, Idaho, Nevada, Arizona and Utah.

At Sacramento yesterday the State Legislature refused to ask Governor Rolph to grant a moratorium for thirty days. Governor Rolph said last night there had been no run on any of the California banks. The trouble arose through pressure without the state and not within. The declaration of a three-day banking holiday was to prevent a run and to enable the financial institutions to protect the depositors. Legislation was being asked at Sacramento to take care of the situation. The banks would all act together in the crisis.

Following the declaration of a three-day bank holiday a number of the California schools are to be closed for three days but in the large cities no such action is being taken. Business is being carried on by means of clearing house certificates until the banks reopen.

HITLER'S PROGRAM

Twenty-Five Points of Chancellor's Pre-Election Plan Summarized for Busy Readers

Jewish Antipathy

Radical Changes Proposed With Extreme National Policy With Fascist Tendencies

BERLIN, March 3.—Hitler is in power and all is quiet on the Rhine. Observers in almost every country in the world are watching the progress of the Hitler government in Germany. Some viewed the Nazi leader's accession to the chancellorship with grim forebodings but his actions in quelling communism and trying to restore order have so far ran foul of only his political opponents.

Now that the Hitlerites are at the helm of Germany's ship of state it is interesting to recall the 25 point Hitlerite program summarized as follows:

1. Union of Austria, Germany, and "all Germans."
2. Abrogation of the Versailles and St. Germain Treaties.
3. Restoration of Germany's old colonies or other territories.
4. Denial of citizenship to Jews and all others not of "German blood alone."
5. Treatment as aliens of all those deprived of citizenship under Point 4.
6. All public servants, high or low, to be of "German blood alone."
7. The State to accept responsibility for the welfare of its citizens. "If it is not possible adequately to support the entire population, aliens (i.e. Jews) shall be forced to leave the Reich."
8. A ban on all non-Germanic immigrants.
9. Equal rights and equal duties for all. All must work for the good of all.
10. Abolition of unearned income.
11. "The overthrow of interest servitude."
12. Complete confiscation of all war profits.
13. State ownership of all monopolies.
14. Profit-sharing in all big business.
15. Liberal extension of old-age pensions.
16. Compulsory allotment of space in big department stores to small merchants.
17. Land-ownership reform. First described as complete national confiscation. Later as confiscation of land owned by "Jewish speculators."
18. Criminals, usurers and profiteers to be put to death.
19. Substitution of German communal law for Roman code.
20. Extension of State education system, to benefit poor.
21. State program of maternity benefits, child welfare, compulsory sports and exercises.
22. Creation of an "army of the people."
23. Rigid control of the press, with elimination of all "alien" influences.
24. Freedom of worship.
25. Creation of a strongly centralized government.

John Nyholme Buried Today At Fairview

CORRESPONDENCE

We have a letter from a lady at Anyox in which she urges that as the strike has been settled and there is nothing to be gained by holding out, the strikers at Prince Rupert should return to work. She points out how much better treatment most of these men have received here than would have been accorded them in their native European countries. As the letter is rather provocative in tone we must refuse to publish it as we shall do with all letters bearing on the present situation which would tend to rouse popular feeling. What is needed now is calm and dispassionate thinking.

RAILWAYS TO COMPETE

The railways of Canada have just come to a realization of the fact that they must compete with trucks if they are to retain the freight business. One advantage of the truck for short hauls has been that the latter fetched the goods from the warehouse and delivered them right at the point of consumption instead of at a railway station. Now the railways are to do the same as the trucks. They will pick up the freight and take it to the station and on its arrival at the other end will again handle it so that no trucking is required of the customer.

The move, which was announced yesterday, was the most revolutionary one in the recent history of the railroads. While it will entail a lot of expense it will place rail transportation on an even footing with the truck and for the long haul will give them a distinct advantage.

WHY UNION?

Hon. R. W. Bruhn, minister of public works in the Tolmie administration, comes out strong for Union Government. His government has had a huge majority in the Legislature but has failed to handle the governmental situation satisfactorily. He admits it. Now he wants help from the other side in order to enable him and his colleagues to carry on.

To admit men who had failed to a cabinet would be to clutter up the wheels of government and prevent the bold policies, which Mr. Bruhn mentions, being put into effect. What is needed is an administration of strong, capable men who have the confidence of the people.

Censorship in Isle of Man

Picture Post Cards Must be Approved Before Being Offered For Sale

LONDON, March 3.—The Manx House of Keys—the lower house of the Isle of Man Parliament—has passed a postcard censorship bill obliging retailers of picture post cards, except scenic views, to sell only cards approved by a committee appointed by the governor.

A similar scheme has been operated voluntarily for about 20 years, wholesalers submitting samples to a local trade committee consulting with the Chief Constable, but a minority among traders is said to be ignoring the committee's decision. Another measure discussed was the Food Prices Regulation Bill which gives the food council statutory powers to demand information concerning wholesale and retail prices and to make regulations, not however, including the fixing of prices.

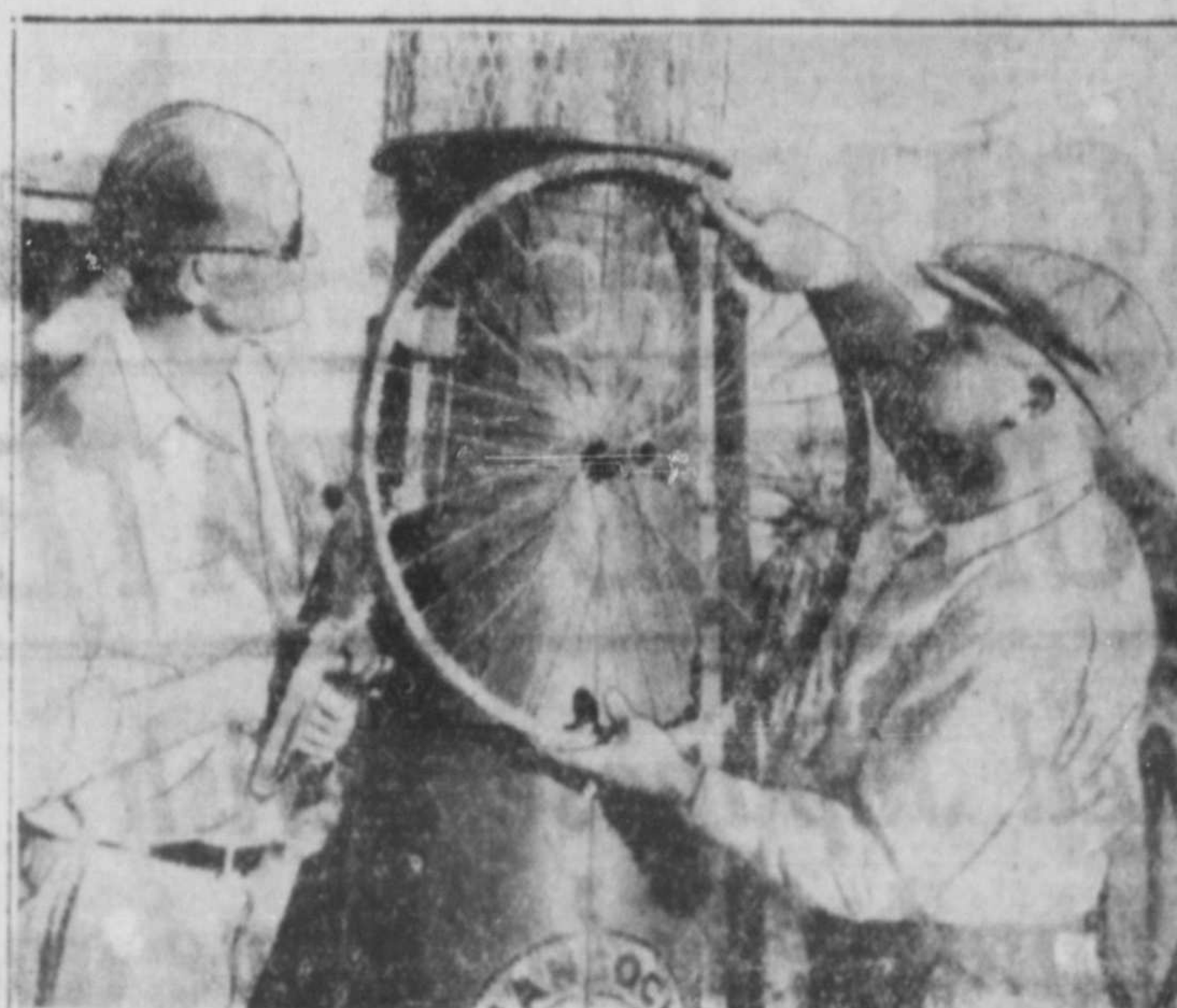

NEW USES OF ELECTRICITY

J. J. Little Tells Rotary Club of Electric Hotbeds and Sun Lamps

At its regular luncheon yesterday afternoon J. J. Little, manager of the Northern B. C. Power Company, gave an interesting address on the uses of electric hotbeds for raising plants and of the sun lamps as a substitute for sun rays.

In regard to hot beds the speaker showed how electricity took the place of manure in raising salads and flower seedlings.

1. Any desired temperature can be selected and maintained automatically.

2. Heat is available, or can be shut off at any time, simply by turning a switch. Plants can be "hardened off" by shutting off the heat. (Bed consumes power only when current is turned on).

3. Electric soil heating is simpler, cleaner, more agreeable, and less expensive to install and to operate.

4. It is unnecessary to rebuild the bed each year or for each run.

In regard to the sun lamp Mr. Little said the sun had always been recognized as a bountiful gift of nature. Some cults worshipped the sun. Happily of recent years a substitute had been developed and it is the ultra-violet lamp which produces the "Sunshine Vitamin D."

In the winter time in northern climes the number of violet rays is diminished but they can be replaced by the use of the electric sun lamp.

Mr. Little went on to tell of the value of the violet rays, especially to growing children. The sun lamp offered a remarkably clean and simple and efficient source of artificial sunlight.

MONTREAL, March 3:—To save his friend the inconvenience of spending the week-end in jail Joshua Liderman, school teacher, borrowed some money and rushed to the police station to bail him out. Word of Liderman's benevolence reached the ears of a creditor of his friend. A writ of seizure was placed on the money which in law had been lent by Liderman to the man in trouble. The Clerk of the Peace handed over the money to the creditor.

The clerk's action has been upheld by Mr. Justice P. G. Martineau of Superior Court, and Liderman is wondering how he'll pay back the money.
