**NOT YET TOO LATE**

In view of the fact that the election of T. D. Pattullo seems certain and that the policies of George Rudderham and Charles Chapman are impossible of immediate adoption, it is not yet too late for these two worthy gentlemen to consider whether it would not be a courteous act to retire from the field and allow the future premier of the province to be elected by acclamation.

Mr. Rudderham bears an excellent reputation in the community and while Mr. Chapman is not known to many except in connection with his recent activities among the unemployed there is nothing personally against him. They have served their respective parties well in bringing before the people the socialistic program for which they stand. Having done that, which is all they can expect to do, why not now show the people of Prince Rupert that they really are trying to work in the interests of the city and step aside?

We make this suggestion not with a view to creating dissension but for the purpose of showing the south that we are a unit for the north. Both Chapman and Rudderham seem to be trying to reach the same end—a social revolution by peaceful means. Evidently the people do not want that revolution just now. They are against it. Pattullo will be elected but he would go back to the House with so much greater strength if he were given a united vote of all the people.

Let it be granted that the Liberal leader does not and cannot please all the electors. He is the only candidate on whom we can compromise. The Conservatives have done their part by withholding a candidate. If the other two, both of whom favor much of that for which Mr. Pattullo stands, can see their way to fall in line we shall be in an enviable position after the election. Both the socialist candidates have in the past stood behind the request for work at real wages for all the unemployed. They favor the best possible treatment for the workers just as does the Liberal leader. In view of this they might easily sink their personal ambitions and step aside until some more favorable occasion when they might possibly have a chance of winning.

**William Brass Wins Rifle Shoot  
Title For Entire Rail System;  
Takes Coveted Thornton Shield**

Word has just come through from Montreal that William Brass wins the Canadian National Recreation Association system championship for small bore rifle shooting. This is for combined high total in the indoor and outdoor series on home ranges. For this he wins the gold medal and champion marksman trophy. This trophy was first put up by Sir Henry Thornton in 1929 for annual competition and this is the first time that it has been won by any competitor outside of Montreal or Toronto.

The comic softball game staged by the High School boys last week proved to be an interesting as well as a financial success.

The players dressed in screaming outfits, marched around the field to the cords and discords of "How Dry I Am" music being furnished by the school band. Tobey, dressed in an oversized nightgown and cap, led the freak players to the diamond. Naylor, the country yokel, dressed in his girlish costume with extended rear bumper, proved to be a school hero. Morgan, the belle of the game, was beautifully dressed in a purple evening gown with yellow rolled socks. The players, varying from Eskimos to basketball players, acted a good game and handed out many good laughs to the spectators. The game wound up by wheeling Tobey off the diamond after he had fallen asleep on first base due to over-work and strain of pitching.

The score was 50 laughs to 50 errors.

**WHIFFLET'S  
From the Waterfront**

The annual winter school of navigation at Prince Rupert will be opened by Capt. J. R. Elfert, harbor master, on November 1. The school is expected to prove exceptionally popular for fishermen this winter in view of the fact that they are now to be given credit for time spent at sea on fishing vessels in connection with the taking of examinations for tugboat masters' papers.

Only two salmon packers, both of the Canadian Fish & Cold Storage Co. fleet, are now operating to the Skidegate Inlet trolling grounds, one being the Grier Starrett, Capt. A. Ness, which arrives in port a day or so ago with 12,000 pounds of cods for the local plant. Trollers are still picking up a few cohoes there but, although quite a few fish are reported to be running, they are not taking the spoon very well.

Word reached port yesterday of the loss of the American halibut schooner Prosperity, owned and skippered by Capt. C. Hendrickson, in the vicinity of Cape St. Elias in last week's storm on the western halibut banks. No lives were lost the crew being landed at Cordova. The Prosperity is not to be confused with the well known Prosperity A. Capt. A. C. Christiansen, one of the largest vessels of the Prince Rupert fleet.

M. P. McCaffery, Olgf Hanson M. P. and Aubrey C. Peck of Vancouver, who have been on a campaign tour of the Queen Charlotte Islands on behalf of T. D. Pattullo, Liberal candidate in the provincial election, are temporarily marooned across Hecate Straits. It was too stormy to send a boat across yesterday to get them and the vessel which was to have gone this morning developed engine trouble. Arrangements are now being made for another vessel.

In the winter indoor series 1932-1933, small bore rifle system competitions on home ranges, in which fifteen matches were held between October, 1932 and April, 1933, Mr. Brass made an average of 99.25 out of a possible 100. He was defeated by only two points in the aggregate for this event by G. M. Emslie of Toronto, the famous Bisley shot. Mr. Emslie thus won the gold medal and W. Brass, as runner-up, won the silver medal.

In the summer series, season of 1933 system competitions on outdoor home ranges, in which eight matches were held between June and September, Mr. Brass, with an average of 99.08, a system record, took first place and won the gold medal for this series. His combined aggregate for both summer and winter series was high for the system, thus entitling him to the coveted champion marksman trophy, otherwise known as the Sir Henry Thornton Shield.

C. N. R. A. marksmen from Prince Rupert have again entered the system series indoor shooting and hope to keep the high standard of marksmanship which has so far been maintained by competitors from this point.

## A Brief Synopsis of Liberal Policy

Innumerable questions, both of public and personal character, can be properly treated only through the agency of government.

Government is not an ordinary business, but carries responsibility to meet every problem arising from our complex social and economic conditions, in order that not merely a few, but all of our people may live in reasonable comfort.

The Liberal Party pledges immediate action under the best available advice and closest study.

1.—Profitable and permanent Employment is the most important question facing our people. There should be co-operation between the national, provincial and municipal authorities and the Canadian banking system to establish the necessary credit to carry out a broad programme of constructive and useful wage-distributing public enterprise, and to further the health, education and well-being of all our people.

An Economic Council should be established, the membership of which shall consist of representatives of the various avenues of endeavour, such as health, education, agriculture, labour and the industries. This council will be appointed by the government on recommendation of the interests involved, and will act in an advisory capacity to the government.

Amongst other things the council will study industrial and social effort in the province and suggest means to correlate these efforts. It will familiarize itself with intra, inter-provincial and foreign trade, and will co-operate with the other provinces and the Dominion. It will also study such questions as production and consumption, and the marketing of our products, the number of hours of work per day and days of work per week, the standard of wages and commodity prices. These questions are of national as well as provincial concern, and British Columbia can take the lead in urging co-operation with the other provinces and the Dominion as a whole.

National Unemployment Insurance should be established upon a contributory basis.

2.—Our Financial position must be reviewed. Current expenditure must be kept within current revenue. While maintaining the credit of the province, effort must be made to reduce capital charges. We cannot continue to pay exorbitant rates of interest for money.

3.—The Taxation Structure must be revised with a view to reduction wherever possible, including exemption in the lower scale of wages and salaries.

4.—The health of each of us is important to the whole community, and a measure of State Health Insurance should be made effective, not only to preserve health, but to reduce costs both to the average citizen and to industry.

5.—A general and effective review must be made of the Educational problem, rejecting any proposed organization that involves a caste system. We must facilitate the intellectual growth of each individual member of society in order to equip him for his daily tasks, and for the enjoyment of such cultural pursuits as may be in keeping with our social customs.

Triangular disagreements between the school boards, municipal councils and the department of education must be adjusted, and our whole system placed upon a sound financial basis.

6.—The financial position of our Municipalities is of increasing concern. An equitable adjustment must be made as between the province and the municipalities, and the municipalities placed in a sound financial position.

7.—An effort should be made to settle our Agricultural Lands in order that more of our citizens may be self-supporting. Agriculture as a whole must be put upon a sound and profitable basis, and made capable of sustaining and directing itself, in line with all other national, basic industries.

8.—Continuous effort should be put forth to assist industry in Marketing its products, in timber, agriculture, fishing, mining and, in fact, every operation where it appears that useful service can be rendered.

9.—Our highways must be kept in good condition, both for the benefit of settlers and the tourist traffic, and expanded as circumstances warrant. In this connection a Highway Board should be established to make for continuity of policy and to inspire confidence in impartial treatment.

10.—A Public Utilities Commission should be established.

11.—A National Central Bank should be established.

12.—Social Services, such as Mothers' Pensions, Old Age Pensions, etc., must be maintained. Abuses of administration should not be allowed, and injustice through mere technicalities should not be permitted.

13.—The Peace River must be given access to the Coast.

14.—In order that the utmost Freedom of Action by Members of the Legislature may be assured in respect of questions before the House, it is Liberal policy that a government shall be considered to be defeated only upon a straight want-of-confidence motion.

15.—The Dominion Government will be asked to place the Province of British Columbia upon a basis of equality with the other provinces, and to this end request will be made for a Royal Commission to ascertain the extent to which the Province of British Columbia has not been given Equality of Treatment with the Other Provinces of the Dominion.

16.—There shall be a permanent Voters' List to ensure that all eligible voters are enrolled.

17.—The Leader of the Liberal Party is given a free mandate to choose for his associates in government, men of character, ability and standing, having regard solely to the public interest.

## PASSES IN HOSPITAL

Patrick O'Brien, Pioneer of City, Succumbs After Illness of Three Months

Patrick O'Brien, 308 Fifth Avenue West, a resident of this city for over twenty years and former employee of the local dry dock, passed away at 2 o'clock Monday morning in Prince Rupert General Hospital where he had been a patient for three months following a paralytic stroke. The remains were forwarded this afternoon on the steamer Catala to Vancouver where interment will be made.

In addition to his widow, the late Mr. O'Brien, who was a Roman Catholic, is survived by a son, Michael, and two daughters, Mary, living here, and Lucy, in Vancouver. The family is well known here and will have the deep sympathy of many friends in its bereavement. Solemn requiem mass was celebrated at 8 o'clock this morning from the Church of Annunciation. Rev. Father J. B. Grant O.M.I. officiating. The usual choir attended with Charles Balagno at the organ. Pallbearers were R. E. Moore, P. J. McCormick, J. Manson, D. Finlayson, W. Whiffin and Alex McIntyre.

The body was sent south this afternoon on the Catala.

E. T. Kenney, the Liberal candidate, who has had a lengthy and wide experience in various capacities, has thrown himself into the fight with characteristic vigor and judgment by the confidence of his supporters, he will have reason to be mightily surprised if he does not count in his favor as many votes as his combined competitors when the final returns of the poll are recorded.

Mr. Kenney has recently visited most of the outlying parts of the riding in the western end, his tour including Essington, Butedale, Swanson Bay and Kitimaat, to say nothing of numerous logging and other outfalls scattered around the lonely hills and valleys. Everywhere he was received with a warm welcome and, in the course of his four or five hundred-mile trip, did not meet a single person who had any word of serious opposition to him or to the Liberal platform which he expounded.

Demand For Pattullo

"Everywhere," he says, "the residents are 'up in arms' against the fecklessness of the government and calling for the return of Mr. Pattullo and a Liberal government to right the wrongs they have suffered during recent years."

Even those whom he met and who were kindly disposed towards the C. C. F. platform admitted that it was beside the mark for provincial purposes. In almost every case they stated that they were reserving their C. C. F. votes for the next federal election and that they were relying on the return of the Liberal party to put B. C. once more into good shape.

The interest throughout the division though not boisterous, is well maintained and gives promise of a large poll. The riding has been noted for the readiness of its citizens to record their votes in the past and the influence of the depression of the political mind of the average voter assures the prediction that the voters in Skeena will maintain their record in this respect.

The Liberal candidate visited Remo last Wednesday and was at Essington on Friday night.

This week he is addressing meetings at Smithers last night, Terrace tonight and Hazelton on Wednesday. At each of these meetings he is having the support of A. M. Manson and James Weir of Vancouver, the later a former M.L.A. of Alberta. These will be his concluding meetings in the more populous areas but later Mr. Kenney will resume his visits to outlying districts throughout the remainder of the riding.
