### "BUY AT HOME"

Your job is here. You want your wages to be protected but how much thought do you give to the other fellow. Again, what of the children who are about to go out into the world? Will there be a position for them to fill or will they have to leave us and go to the towns to which much of our money is going?

This for those of the citizens who believe that it is cheaper to send elsewhere for goods which could be readily purchased in town. Is it not worth while to put it back into circulation where it belongs? To what a use the thousands of dollars which go out of here annually could be put! We could even venture to say the hundreds of thousands for it must run into six figures. Then having thought a little of the manifold blessings of that money, make your purchases in town and watch the results. They will be speedily effective in increased earnings of store employes. Effective, too, and perhaps less speedily in new buildings, old buildings renovated, taxes paid, increased revenue to the city, more money in the treasury for local improvements and much needed work.

Think not alone of the present but of the future and the not too distant future. Consider just what a few days' work would mean to hundreds of local families. What a different Christmas Day they would have if they could look forward to 1934 in anticipation of work.

And this is all possible through the co-operation of the public with the merchants of Prince Rupert. You can make it possible by BUYING AT HOME.

Why help to create employment in cities which have no other interest in Prince Rupert than to ship parcels of goods here? Every dollar which leaves town serves to keep some person in employment at the point of its destination but can have nothing but a detrimental effect on the employment situation locally. The spirit of the pioneer is not entirely dead. Geographically we are together on what is close to the frontier. Let us, then, be together in the spirit which will create a better town to live in.

### Rainfall Less And Sunshine More in 1933

In spite of an excessively wet November when there was an all-time record of 25.53 inches of rain in Prince Rupert, there has, so far this year, been actually less precipitation here than in the first eleven months of 1932. The precipitation for this year up to the end of November has aggregated 100.28 inches as compared with 107.29 inches in the corresponding period last year. So far this year sunshine has totalled 685.4 hours in comparison with 648.5 hours in the first eleven months of 1932.

### MORE FIRE ALARMS

The city fire department so far this year has responded to a total of 88 calls as compared with 70 alarms up to the end of November last year.

### BIG INCREASE IN CUSTOMS REVENUE IS RECORDED HERE

Customs and excise collections at the port of Prince Rupert for the month of November this year totalled \$21,408.81 which was a large increase over \$8,406.02 in the same month last year. So far this year the revenue has totalled \$150,841.64 in comparison with \$122,653.20 in the first eleven months of 1932.

### PRESIDENT REPORTS ON HIS VISIT

T. H. Johnson Tells of Work Done  
By Canadian Chamber of  
Commerce to Which He  
Was Delegate

A very interesting and instructive report on the recent convention in Ottawa of the Canadian Chamber of Commerce, to which he was a delegate, was given by T. H. Johnson, president of the Chamber of Commerce, at the regular monthly meeting last night. There were a number of prominent speakers at the event, among them being Hon. H. H. Stevens, minister of trade and commerce, and Hon. W. D. Robbins, United States representative at Ottawa.

The plan of the convention was that a committee was chosen to listen to all the speeches and from them draw up a policy for the chamber. Mr. Johnson was on that committee and it worked very hard. It mentioned that the addresses indicated a steady and rapid improvement in commercial conditions.

The first subject dealt with was that of economy. It strongly urged that Chambers of Commerce and Boards of Trade support public bodies in this and refrain from petitioning for undertakings which would add to the public debt unless they would be self-supporting or were absolutely necessary.

VICTORIA, Dec. 2: (CP)—A conference of the four western premiers will be held here December 4 to discuss industrial recovery plans. Premier J. E. Brownlee of Alberta will send a representative, Premier Anderson of Saskatchewan and Premier Bracken of Manitoba will attend in person.

### Dominion Officials Are Speculating On Volume of Business

Some Doubt Expressed as to Whether Uncle Sam Will Apply His Import Quota Upon This Country

OTTAWA, Dec. 2: (CP)—Canadian trade officials are continuing to speculate on how much liquor the Dominion will be able to sell to United States following the repeal of the Eighteenth Amendment going into effect and the sale of liquor across the line becoming once more legal. Some doubt is expressed here as to whether Canada will be included in the quota system which it has been indicated the United States will apply to foreign countries in placing liquor orders in accordance with tariffs on United States goods.

### Junior Chamber Of Commerce and Sr. Organization

Constitution Submitted For Approval and Will be Formally Adopted Later

At the regular monthly meeting of the Chamber of Commerce last night a copy of the constitution of the Junior Chamber was submitted for its approval and was turned over to the legislative committee for report.

A proposal that the chamber should appoint a highway committee to co-operate with that of the Junior Chamber was held over until the legislative committee had reported. This, it is expected, will take place at the annual meeting in January.

### Paris Bank Announces Heavy Exports During Week of Yellow Metal

No Less Than \$18,000,000 Worth Shipped Out of Country  
Due to Rivalry and High Prices Being Paid

PARIS, Dec. 2:—The Bank of France announces loss of gold from this country to foreign nations during the past week totalling \$18,000,000 in value. The most of the precious metal went to England, Holland and Poland, United States receiving comparatively little. The export is due to the rivalry of various nations to secure gold and the increasing prices that are being paid for the metal.

### ESSINGTON JAP DEAD

Passing of Kakichi Hikida Due to  
Cerebral Hemorrhage, Coroner  
Decides

The body of Kakichi Hikida, 39-year old Japanese, who died during the night before last at Port Essington, was brought to the city yesterday afternoon and, following a post-mortem examination last night, an inquiry was held this morning by Coroner Norman A. Watt as a result of which it was established that death had been due to cerebral hemorrhage. Hikida had been engaged for many years in salmon fishing at Port Essington and is survived by a wife and family in Japan and a brother in Vancouver. The body is to be forwarded to Vancouver for burial.

### Log Export Not Feasible Just Now

Weldon McAfee Gives Valuable Report on Situation at Chamber Of Commerce Meeting

The Chamber of Commerce, at its regular session last night, heard a report from Weldon McAfee on the possibility of exporting cottonwood logs to the Orient. The report outlined what was being done in the south and stated that there was in the Skeena watershed about 200,000,000 feet of cottonwood but, unless other factors entered in, there was no present prospect of this being profitably handled just now.

The report urged the continuation of efforts to secure cargoes here for outgoing vessels. The committee was thanked for its report.

The committee went on record in favor of immigration of agriculturists but not of financing them. It declared in favor of giving work to the unemployed and urged construction or reconstruction of buildings and the extension of credits. It urged balanced budgets, removal of trade obstacles, encouragement of private initiative and enterprise and suggested that governments should keep out of business as far as possible. While expressing interest in the Roosevelt policy they did not favor it for Canada but strongly approved the Empire agreements which it was said had already benefited the country. They urged closer relations with the United States within the bounds of its Empire agreements. The report including the reading of the declaration of policy was listened to with great interest by the members of the local chamber and hearty vote of thanks was given Mr. Johnson for acting as local delegate.

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### WATERFRONT WHIFFS

Fishing Industry Here Now in Doldrums—Biological Officials Leaving For Ottawa at End of Month—Shot Grizzly Bear at Baker Inlet

The opening of December sees all branches of the Prince Rupert fishing industry at a standstill with all boats in port and all activities suspended. A few of the halibut vessels which have been engaged in cod-fishing, due principally to the stress of weather, have given up that line of work. Some of the halibut and salmon fishing vessels are engaged in trapping, a pursuit which it is now customary for a number of them to take up in the winter. Early in the year some of the boat owners will, undoubtedly, commence to better themselves in the way of starting work in preparing their craft for the 1934 fishing season.

John Dybhavn, one of the Pacific Coast members of the Biological Board of Canada, and Dr. Neal Carter, the new director of the Prince Rupert Fisheries Experimental Station, will be leaving Prince Rupert about Christmas for Ottawa to attend the annual meeting of the Biological Board of Canada which has been set for January 1, 2, 3 and 4. D. B. Finn, who has been transferred as director from the Prince Rupert Fisheries Experimental Station to the station at Halifax, will also attend the meeting before proceeding to England to take up a post-graduate course at Cambridge University after which he will assume his new duties in the Maritimes.
