IRISH GOVERNMENT IS RE-ELECTED

SOVIET CHOOSES FIRST AMBASSADOR TO UNITED STATES

MINISTER IS NAMED

Alexander Krionovsky to Represent Soviet Republic as Ambassador To United States

WASHINGTON, D.C., Nov. 20.—Alexander Krionovsky has been named ambassador of the Soviet Republic to United States following the recognition by United States of the Soviet as officially announced at the end of the week. Krionovsky was nominated to the post of ambassador yesterday by President Joseph Stalin and was approved by the United States Department of State as being "entirely acceptable."

Krionovsky, who is fifty-one years of age, is at present vice-chairman of the State Planning Commission of the Soviet Republic. His only previous diplomatic experience has been at Tokyo and he is considered an authority on Oriental affairs.

ELECTION IN SPAIN

Widespread Disorders Throughout Country With Some Killings—Conservatives Returned

MADRID, Spain, Nov. 20.—The holding of the national election in Spain yesterday was attended by widespread disorders throughout the country, at least seven killings being held directly attributable to the voting. Early returns indicate the return of the Conservative government with a sweeping majority of seats for the Rightists.

In addition to those killed, three hundred were injured and further violence is feared.

It was Spain's first constitutional election.

PASSING OF STATESMAN

Rt. Hon. Augustine Birrell Was Chief Secretary For Ireland at Time of 1916 Rebellion

Was His Downfall

Prominent in British Public Life For Thirty Years Prior to That—Popular Personality

LONDON, Nov. 20: (CP)—Rt. Hon. Augustine Birrell, aged 83, who was Chief Secretary for Ireland at the time of the Irish Rebellion during Easter Week 1916, died here today.

"The situation is well in hand," declared Birrell to the House of Commons during the week of the Irish Rebellion.

"Yes," retorted an Opposition member, "the rebels seem to have the situation well in hand."

The General Post Office and half of the rest of what was then Sackville Street, Dublin, were reduced to ashy ruins.

A week or two more and Mr. Birrell vacated the office of Chief Secretary.

At the general election of December, 1918 he did not again offer.

WITHDRAWS FROM FIELD

Unionist Candidate Decides Not To Go To Post in Deferred Election In Vancouver Centre

VANCOUVER, November 20 (Canadian Press)—W. S. Mackenzie, Unionist, has withdrawn from the deferred election contest in Vancouver center in Vancouver Center, leaving twelve candidates in the field for the two seats.

The fight is expected to be centered principally between Hon. Gordon Sloan, attorney general, and Gordon Wismer, Liberals, and W. W. Lefaux and J. S. Taylor, C. C. F., with the Liberals strongly favored to win.

Mr. Mackenzie was the only Unionist nominee.

MR. FOUND IS COMING

Deputy Minister of Fisheries to Pay Annual Visit to Prince Rupert Early Next Month

Advice has been received in the city that W. A. Found, deputy minister of fisheries, will arrive in Prince Rupert December 3 aboard the steamer Catala in the course of his annual western inspection tour and will proceed east by train the next afternoon to his headquarters in Ottawa.

In view of the brevity of Mr. Found's visit here, it is now believed that no session of the International Fisheries Commission will be held in Prince Rupert this fall as had been previously suggested. As far as can be learned here, no important changes in the conservation regulations as regards the halibut fishery are expected to be made by the commission for next year.

Mr. Found will be in the city for an entire day which should give the various interests who may be desirous of taking matters up with him the opportunity of having appointments.

Lord Craigavon and Unionist Party Has Many Acclamations

Win Thirty-Four Seats Out of Fifty-Two Without Contest—De Valera Enters Contest in Order to Further His United Ireland Idea

BELFAST, Northern Ireland, Nov. 20: (CP)—Viscount Craigavon, Premier of Northern Ireland, and his Unionist party, pledged to firm co-operation with the United Kingdom, were assured continuance in office after today's nominations for the general election, polling in which will take place on November 30. Acclamations gave the government thirty-four seats out of a total of fifty-two, a clear majority over all already. The entire cabinet of seven members received acclamations.

President de Valera of the Irish Free State will contest South Down seat but, if elected, will probably not take the seat but direct other Nationalists to further his policy for a united Ireland.

DEAD AT THE PAS

Bishop Charlebois of Roman Catholic Church Passes Away This Morning

A telegram received this morning by Rt. Rev. E. M. Buno O. M. I., Bishop of the Roman Catholic Church for the diocese of Northern British Columbia and the Yukon, announced the death at The Pas, Man., of Bishop Ovide Charlebois J. M. I., one of the best known clerics of the Roman Catholic church in Canada.

The late Bishop Charlebois was born at Oka, l'Assomption, near Montreal, February 17, 1862, and practically all his life had been spent in missionary work for his church in the Keewatin district of Western Ontario and later in Northern Ontario. He was educated at College de l'Assomption and Ottawa University and was Vicar Apostolic at Keewatin before being made Bishop at The Pas.

NEW YORK TO MIAMI

James Weidel Makes Flight in Shade Over Five Hours

MIAMI, Fla., Nov. 20:—James Weidel, noted American speed flyer, landed here yesterday after a flight of five hours and three minutes from New York. He had hoped to make the flight in four hours but was delayed on account of fog.

J. E. Moody of Port Simpson, who has been on a vacation trip to Vancouver and elsewhere in the south, was a passenger aboard the Catala last evening returning north.

MURDER IS CONFIRMED

Hat of Brooke Hart Found in San Francisco Bay Not Far From San Mateo Bridge

SAN JOSE, Cal., Nov. 20.—The battered and water-soaked hat of Brooke Hart, 22-year old son of Alexander Hart, wealthy San Jose merchant, was found floating in the bay near the Alameda shore not far from the San Mateo-Hayward bridge yesterday, thus confirming the confession to police of Thomas H. Thurmond and Jack Holmes that they had murdered the youth by beating him into insensibility and throwing him over the bridge within an hour after having kidnapped him on November 9. On being shown the hat, the boy's father gave up any lingering hope that he had held that the youth might have been still alive. The body has not yet been recovered.

Authorities are pressing for early expiation by death penalty of Thurmond and Holmes for their crime.

REPORT ON CUBA MADE

U. S. Minister Wells in Session With President Roosevelt at Warm Springs Yesterday

WARM SPRINGS, Ga., Nov. 20:—United States Minister Wells to Cuba was in conference with President Franklin D. Roosevelt here for five hours yesterday, presenting an official report to the chief executive on the Cuban situation as it affects United States interests.

Last night Mr. Wells left here for Atlanta, Ga., whence he was to proceed to Washington, being due to arrive in the national capital this afternoon.

It is announced that Mr. Wells will return to his duties at Havana after a brief stay in Washington. This announcement is the cause of some surprise, the general expectation in diplomatic circles having been that he would be recalled.

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LOCAL FOLK AT VARSITY

Prince Rupert Representation Larger This Year and is Playing Prominent Part

Studies and Sports

Irene Mitchell is One Co-ed From Here—Doings of Other Students

Prince Rupert's representation at the University of British Columbia in Vancouver for this session is larger than it has been for several years. Among the newcomers this year are Oscar Fulton, Rupert Ross and Roger Obata in Second Year Applied Science. Ronnie Allen in First Year Arts and Jack Cade in Second and Third Year Arts.

George Minns is back on the job continuing in Applied Science and gets his recreation on week-ends climbing all over Grouse Mountain with the Outdoors Club. Bob Fraser is due to graduate in Mining Engineering next spring and thinks Fifth year is a pipe compared to the others. He spends his spare time running a fraternity and arguing about politics.

Bill Patmore, after a year's absence has shifted from Science to Third Year Arts and is now tolling away the hours on six geology courses. Behind him in the sophomore class is Bishoo Thurber headed for honors in chemistry.

Archie Thompson, who has consistently distinguished himself in his studies each year since entering Varsity, this year has the important post of news manager of the Ubyesey, the official publication of the University of British Columbia student body.

Rupert's sole representative among the coeds is Irene Mitchell of the Teachers' Training Class. She has her worries teaching Vancouver's young hopefuls about Lord Byron's poetry and the Canadian National Railways.

The colors of the northern interior are carried by Bill Sargeant of Hazelton now in his third year. Besides taking a leading part in the Players Club Bill is president of the Arts Men's Undergraduate Society, which includes all the men in the faculty of Arts.

Prominent in Sports
Bill Gwyer, Lloyd Monroe and Jim Pyle are ex-students of Prince Rupert High now attending Varsity. Bill is back in engineering and is playing on the Big 4 Canadian rugby team. Lloyd is in Third Year Science while Jim is in Third Year Arts taking honors in chemistry and, incidentally, playing first-string English rugby.

Ronnie Allen qualified for a position as a sport reporter on the Ubyesey but now thinks he will not be able to go on with it on account of his other work. He is on Varsity's first-string badminton team and also ran third in the half-mile in the recent Varsity-Frosh track meet.

Basketball Popular
Outside of studying, basketball seems to be the favorite student activity of Prince Rupert's scholars at the University. At the top of the list Bill Patmore is ranked as one of the high scorers on this year's Senior B. team, which is just one step below Varsity's Senior A. squad, former champions of Canada. Next, on the Intermediate A. line-up Bishop Thurber and Roger Obata have captured regular positions, while Rupert Ross is playing in the Intermediate B. division.

Among twenty-five new members recently selected to the Varsity Outdoors Club are Jack Cade and George Minns. This club owns a cabin on Grouse Mountain where members can take refuge on week-end from their studies and the noise and smoke of the big city. Prospective members are required to accompany the club on two hikes before they are eligible for election.

In addition to this George Minns is also still keeping up his swimming, while Bishop Thurber is gaining further recognition as a player on the Junior Soccer team. Last but not least Rupert is represented on Students' Council and on the first string Canadian and English rugby teams by Milton Owen, whose father was chief of provincial police in Prince Rupert in the very early days. Milt is president of the Men's Undergraduate Society, and intends to study law.

OF SAME OPINION STILL

In spite of the fact that Premier Pattullo already has a majority of supporters elected and that he does not need to make promises in order to get the Vancouver Centre and Victoria candidates elected, the chief planks of his platform are again stressed in a speech in Vancouver. We mention this because many local people have expressed the opinion that some of Mr. Pattullo's promises were simply election talk and not intended to be taken seriously. He did not so consider them so and he told his audience that. He stressed "work and wages" as one of his chief objectives.

We feel sure everyone will be behind the new Premier in his efforts to secure work and wages for all unemployed. It is what all want.

OTTAWA LINING UP

It is announced that there will be a conference of provincial premiers at Ottawa along the line suggested by Premier Pattullo and that proposals will be made for action along various lines calculated to increase employment, to increase the price of farm products and to revive the construction industry.

This may be a good time for Prince Rupert to secure the construction of a new federal building, which has been talked about for many years. If the Bennett government is about to take a forward step in that direction this city might well look for a share of help.

There have been forecasts of a possible forward policy at Ottawa for some time but, now that it is proposed to have a conference in which British Columbia's new Premier is to be represented, it seems as if something would be done when the next Parliament meets. Evidently Prince Rupert's representative had something very definitely in mind when he was talking about work and wages during the campaign.

himself and his career as a parliamentarian, which had lasted, with some small interruptions, for over thirty years, closed for good. Very little more, too, was heard of him by the public at large.

Agreeable Personality

In his days of prominence Augustine Birrell was easily one of the most agreeable personalities of the House of Commons. Not merely did he make a distinguished figure through his gifts as a front bench man but also by reason of his qualities as a platform speaker and for the delight which he gave to thousands of readers through his essays and other writings.

Birrell was the son of a distinguished Liverpool Baptist minister and was born in 1850. Taking up that solid side of the law which is encountered in the Chancery Division, he became a K.C., a Bencher of the Inner Temple, and Quain Professor of Law. There was nothing, though, of the hard dry lawyer in Birrell's mental outlook. In physical appearance his make-up was not at all unlike that of Thackeray. In temperament, too, Birrell betrayed something of Thackeray's genial cynicism, but those who were privileged to meet him on social occasions were never heard to complain that he strove to dominate the talk.

Sympathized With Irish

That Birrell's tenure of the Chief Secretaryship should have finished so unhappily was doubly to be deplored, for, apart from their differences upon the education question, there was a considerable bond of sympathy between himself and the Irish. When, for instance, he was questioned in the House concerning gun-running by the Ulster Volunteers he spoke with obvious satisfaction of "the genius of the people of Ireland for admiring each other." In his usual take-it-or-leave-it manner he gave the Commons his opinion that no useful purpose

would follow from prosecuting either side.

Birrell's reputation as an essayist opened with the publication of the first of his series of "Obiter Dicta" in 1884. In his wit there was pungency in plenty but never malice. Birrell's last literary work of importance was published in 1923, when he edited "Home Letters of the Earl of Beaconsfield."

Birrell's first wife died in 1879. In 1888 he married the daughter of Frederick Locker, the poet, widow of the Hon. Lionel Tennyson. Mrs. Birrell died in 1915.

Derailment On Union Pacific

Traffic Held Up For Five Hours as Result of Stock Train Leaving Track Near Cheyenne

CHEYENNE, Wyoming, Nov. 20.—Transcontinental traffic on the Union Pacific Railway was held up for five hours yesterday as a result of the derailment of twenty-eight cars of a stock train five miles west of Cheyenne. The derailment was caused by a broken wheel on one of the cars and resulted in considerable damage to the equipment of the train as well as the loss of a number of head of stock.

After a week's interruption owing to high water conditions on the Smithers-Prince Rupert division, traffic is back at normal on the local line of the Canadian National Railways today. ACTIVITY IN MINING

Work Continuing With Eminent Satisfactory Results on Five Properties Near Smithers

Jessie Looks Good

Shipments Made From Glacier Gulch on Which Aerial Tram Has Been Built

SMITHERS, Nov. 20.—Several well known mining properties in the Smithers-Telkwa district are continuing operations this fall with eminently satisfactory results, these including the Jessie Gold, Glacier Gulch, Lake Kathlyn Anthracite (coal), Bulkley Valley Coal (coal) and Babine Gold.

At the Jessie Gold Mines the 400-foot level is being carried forward as a drift on the No. 1 vein with no break in the ore to date. The ore-width in the tunnel is greater than at the corresponding point on the surface. This vein has been established in surface workings for 950 feet in length with the best showing at the westerly end about 800 feet in advance of the present face of the tunnel. Douglas Lay, resident mining engineer, examined the Jessie recently.

On the Glacier Gulch group Stuart Campbell and associates have got out for shipment a carload of hand-sorted gold bismuth ore. Improvements have been made to the road and an aerial tram constructed to bring the ore down from the workings to the end of the road. The ore will probably be hauled down to the railway at Lake Kathlyn station, only two miles distant from the mine, and shipped during this month. The resident engineer for the district was at the property recently.

Lake Kathlyn Anthracite Coal Company is continuing its exploratory work on its property near Lake Kathlyn. The manager states that he hopes to have coal shipments made in the near future.

Bulkley Valley Coal Mines near Telkwa continues active mining operations and the market for its coal is steadily growing. Manager Frank M. Dockrill was in Prince Rupert during the month making arrangements for an increased sale there.

The Babine Gold Mines operation of W. R. Wilson & Sons on Dome Mountain was examined by R. W. Wilson during the month and, on his return to Telkwa, he expressed satisfaction with the progress being made. He was expected to return to the mine within a few days to lay out further work on completion of contracted tunnel work which has been in progress the past two months.
