KETCHIKAN TROLLERS GO ON STRIKE

OPEN VERDICT IS RETURNED IN STEWART ASHLEY CASE

Northern Fishermen In Sympathy With Those On Columbia River

Price Dispute in South Still in Deadlock With Fish Boats Idle, Nets Uncast and Canneries Locked Up—Only Nominal Negotiations Carried on

ASTORIA, Ore., May 5: (Canadian Press)—With fish boats idle, nets uncast and canneries locked while only nominal negotiations are being carried on in the attempt to end the strike of Columbia River salmon fishermen in protest at the prices being offered by the canners for their product, word has been received from Ketchikan that one hundred trollers there had decided to begin a sympathetic strike in support of the four thousand Oregon and Washington gillnetters who have refused to cast their nets until the packers increase the price by two cents.

SEEDING GENERAL

Between Forty and Fifty Percent of Prairie Wheat Now in

WEATHER FAIR

WINNIPEG, May 5:—Except in some of the newer districts in the more northerly parts of the provinces wheat seeding is now general and every section reporting different percentages seeded but in most of the grain growing areas, between forty and fifty percent of wheat has reached the seed bed, according to the weekly crop report of the agricultural department, Canadian National Railways. Weather has been fair, cool and somewhat windy. Land in most localities is in good shape although the high winds have started to move some of the lighter soils and in such districts a warm rain would be beneficial. At a few isolated points a start has been made with barley and oats seeding but such work is confined to districts where these grains constitute the main crops.

Railway Company Takes Over Direction Administration of Steamships and Dry Dock Here

MONTREAL, May 5:—The following official circular was issued yesterday by S. J. Hungerford, acting president, Canadian National Railways:

"In view of changed conditions, it has been found advantageous to restore to the direct administration of the railway company the management of the Canadian National Steamships on the Pacific Coast, the Prince Rupert dry dock and the wharf properties at Vancouver, Victoria and Seattle.

"Effective May 15, these properties will be under the jurisdiction of A. E. Warren, vice-president, western region.

"The services to be maintained this season will be from Vancouver to Powell River, Ocean Falls, Prince Rupert, Stewart, Anyox, Ketchikan, Wrangell, Juneau and Skagway, also services to the Queen Charlotte Islands."

CANADA AND THE EMPIRE

Mr. Justice Murphy Gives Interesting Address to Women's Canadian and Rotary Clubs

TRACES DEVELOPMENT

Ties of Empire Stronger Than Ever Even Though Political Ties Have Been Severed

After tracing the growth of Canada as an independent nation within the British Empire, showing how one after another of the powers formerly held by Britain had been taken over until it seemed that almost nothing was left, Mr. Justice Denis Murphy, in addressing a joint luncheon of the Women's Canadian Club and the Rotary Club at noon yesterday, showed that, more than ever before, the Empire had been welded into a solid whole. The Empire never could have stood the strain, he said, unless there had been some fundamental idea behind it. This idea was the fundamental right of every British subject in regard to law. The law courts always operated in the open and the whole force of public opinion operated to see that everyone got justice. Every person had the right to trial by his fellow citizens. It was because of this feeling of justice and security that the Empire was stronger than ever before. He ventured the opinion that there would be no disruption. While there had been desires for changes there had so far been no suggestion by any of the nations of retirement from the Empire.

The Judge was introduced by Mrs. Parkin, acting president of the Women's Canadian Club, after George Woodland, president of the Rotary Club, had called the gathering to order, welcomed the guests and formally turned over the conduct of the gathering to her. She made a neat speech in which she told something of the visitor who was to address them. At the conclusion a vote of thanks was passed on motion of Bishop Rix and Mrs. G. H. Arnold.

Mr. Justice Murphy explained that government was necessary as the result of the necessity of people congregating together when they were blessed with that awful and wonderful gift of free will. The rule of conduct which guided them was known as government.

The speaker then outlined the growth of government since 1867. At first there was representative government but this gradually developed into responsible government, made up of legislative, judicial and administrative branches. Under the British system the legislative and administrative branches are combined and this was considered superior to the American system where laws had to be passed to create the president a dictator in a time of crisis. In this country Mr. Bennett was a dictator so long as he had the support of a majority in Parliament.

IMPORTING OF LABOR

Resolution of Protest at Cannery Operators' Policy is Passed

The Fishermen's Industrial Union has passed the following resolution regarding cannery operators and fishermen and cannery workers in District No. 2 for submission to the Minister of Fisheries at Ottawa:

"Whereas the cannery operators of this district are employing fishermen and cannery workers from outlying points instead of employing local help, thereby causing considerable hardship on the fishermen and cannery workers of this district in that they have been depending on this employment since last fishing season, it being the only seasonal occupation they can procure in this district; and

"Whereas the imported fishermen and cannery workers have no local interests, financial or otherwise, in this district but, at the close of the season, they return with their earnings to another part of the province, thereby affecting this whole district and the merchants of Prince Rupert in particular; and

Will Spend Considerable Money Developing Rich Mine in Babine Mountains During Coming Season

While, on account of the low price of silver and other metals a number of mines are closed in this part of the country, it is refreshing to hear of one at least in the interior that is planning a considerable program of work this summer. The Omineca Silver King Mines Ltd., with nearly forty claims adjoining the Cronin property in the Babine Mountains north of Smithers, is planning a considerable program of development according to the manager, B. F. Messner of Smithers, who is in the city in connection with the assizes.

While the Silver King, as its name would indicate, is primarily a silver mine, yet its ore goes about seven or eight percent in gold and also has good commercial values in lead, copper and zinc. Evidently then the expected rise in price of silver and copper will at once add to the interest in it. Some ore was shipped from it in 1926 and the richness of the ore was then proved but, since then, much development work has been done. On the one side is the Cronin property with its large body of proven ore and, on the other, most of the present work is being done to show the wide extent of the ore deposits.

It is planned this year to spend about four thousand dollars in completing the road to the property connecting with the town of Smithers, there being about three miles to change from a trail into a wagon road suitable for trucks to travel. When the former shipment of ore was made it had to be packed ten miles. In addition to that, assessment work will be done on all 38 claims and considerable development on the claims farthest from the Babine Bonanza.

Mr. Messner is much enthused over the prospect of silver going up in price. He says he feels confident it will be worth twice as much as it is today before long. In the meantime his company is continuing work and preparing for the good times he thinks are coming.

Died From Poisoning But How Administered Cannot Be Determined

Probe Into Circumstances of Death in Victoria of Young Vancouver School Teacher is Completed With Little New Light Thrown Upon Case

VICTORIA, May 5: (Canadian Press)—The coroner's jury yesterday brought in a verdict that Stewart Ashley, young Vancouver school teacher, died of poisoning and that "we do not consider there is sufficient evidence to decide as to when, how, where or by whom it was administered." The principal evidence at the inquest was given by

ARSON CASE BEING HEARD

Evidence Outlined by Crown Prosecutor and Three Witnesses Heard This Morning

A new jury was chosen this morning at the Assize Court presided over by Mr. Justice Murphy and again the arson trial of Ernest Claude Dawson was started. Crown Prosecutor L. S. McGill outlined the case stating that it was proposed to show that the home of Mrs. Mary Dawson was burned down on Christmas night by accused, her son.

The family had all gone out to Christmas dinner with a married sister of the accused and only the accused and his wife had returned about four o'clock in the afternoon and they left again before eight o'clock. The house burned down and an investigation followed, showing that accused was in the vicinity, that the house was locked so that neighbors were unable to get in to put out the fire so the house and contents were destroyed. A quantity of goods belonging to accused and his wife were found later in sheds some distance from the house and these were not injured.

E. Haan produced plans to show the location of the building and the layout of the house.

Fred Cook told of writing a policy for \$1500 on the house and \$700 on the furniture, the policy having been delivered to the Dawson family early in December. The company settled for the full amount, \$2,200. Part of this was assigned to the mortgagee, Mrs. Dorothy Lewis, a relation by marriage of the accused.

William John Dawson, father of accused, told of the Christmas Day movements of the family and admitted that his son had taken the insurance policy to be placed in a strong box and he had not seen it since. They (witness and his wife) had lost everything except the clothes they wore.

Moved Effects

The elder Dawson testified that four trunks, two club bags and a number of cartons, all containing a wide variety of personal articles belonging to accused or his wife, had been removed from the house three weeks before Christmas to an old garage on the lot next door and to a woodshed. The removal had been made because the contents of the cartons had become affected by water which had melted on the floor of the bedroom of the house as a result of hoar frost forming on the wall of the bedroom. Witness had helped the accused, his son, to remove the stuff. The cartons were

DIES OF STABBING

John Russell Victim of Affray on Vancouver Waterfront—George Adams Charged With Attempted Murder

VANCOUVER, May 5: (Canadian Press)—John Russell, victim of a stabbing affray on the night of May 2, died in the Vancouver General Hospital yesterday. George James Adams, occupant of a neighboring shack to that of Russell on the waterfront, is being held on a charge of attempted murder. Mrs. Russell, wife of the dead man, is held as a material witness.

According to the police, Mrs. Russell went rowing with Adams and, on their return, they were met by Russell and a fight ensued in the boat on the beach in the course of which Russell's abdomen was slashed.

identified by witness and special attention was paid by the crown to certain articles such as razors belonging to accused and a brooch which belonged to witness' wife and was an heirloom. Accused, his wife and two children had also occupied the 8 by 11 bedroom where all these goods had been stored.

At the time of the fire, witness testified, his son, accused, had no income. He had been declared bankrupt, witness having filed a claim for \$1050 against him and witness' wife a claim for about \$1800.

Under cross-examination by Mr. Harvey witness told of the nature of Christmas decorations in the house. Some of these had been close to the airtight heater and the chimney pipe. The airtight heater was a borrowed one and it was liable to explode, it had been found. The son had no interest in the insurance.

There was no heating either in the garage or woodshed and things would freeze there, witness admitted.

"Whereas the fishermen and cannery workers of this district are domiciled in and around Prince Rupert, many having families, and have been more or less drawing government relief since last season, and there being barely sufficient work to employ all the local unemployed fishermen and cannery workers without bringing in workers from other parts;

"Therefore we, the members of the Fishermen's Industrial Union of Canada, assembled to the number of one hundred and fifty in meeting held at Prince Rupert on May 1, vigorously protest the action of the cannery operators in importing fishermen and cannery workers from outlying points as it is not only unfair discrimination but encroaches upon the very means of our existence; and

"Be it further resolved that we petition the government to interfere with the action of the cannery operators in their policy of hiring help from outside points to the detriment of this whole district."

CANADA AND THE EMPIRE

(Continued from Page 1)

Growth of Canada

The growth of Canada from a colony into a free and independent nation was traced showing how one by one the ties that bound the country to Great Britain were cut until today the Imperial Parliament has no right to legislate for Canada and the only tie with the rest of the Empire is the Governor-General who is appointed by the King on the advice of the Canadian government. In the judicial department the Privy Council still was the court of highest appeal but Canada had the right to change that if she wished.

Today Canada had the right to appoint her own ministers to foreign countries instead of dealing indirectly through the British representative but in cases where Canada had no minister, she continued to borrow the services of the British ministers. She had ministers in Washington, Tokio and Paris.

Canada affixed her signature to the Versailles Treaty and was an independent member of the League of Nations. The Governor-General represented the King only and not the British government. The present Governor was chosen by Premier Bennett and appointed by the King on the advice of the Canadian Premier. "There does not seem to be much left politically of the British

Empire but everyone knows that the tie of Empire is stronger than ever," declared the Judge in conclusion.

BASEBALL

BOSTON, May 5: (Canadian Press)—The three-way tie for third place in the National League was broken up yesterday with Boston Braves, although defeated here by the Cincinnati Reds, going into at least temporary possession of the spot. Brooklyn Dodgers lost a close game to the league-leading Pittsburgh Pirates at Ebbetts Field while the Chicago Cubs were dropping a double-header to the Giants at the New York Polo Grounds. The Dodgers and Reds are now tied for fourth place while the St. Louis Cardinals, defeating the Phillies at Philadelphia, advanced to a tie with the Cubs for sixth place.

In the American League, the Chicago White Sox and Cleveland Indians, winning over the Philadelphia Athletics and Washington Senators respectively by margins of one run in each case, advanced from a third place to a second place tie ahead of the Senators who had been in exclusive possession of that position. The New York Yankees consolidated their hold on first place by defeating the Detroit Tigers at Detroit.
